

General Motors Income
Listed At \$1,189,000,000

MIAMI, Fla. — General Motors Corp. achieved a record-breaking net income of \$1,189,000,000 equal to \$1.19 per share of common stock and also set new highs in dollars sales, employment and payrolls in 1955.

The figures were disclosed by Harlow H. Curtis, president, at a news conference preceding the opening here Saturday of the GM Motorama of 1956.

Curtis said dollar sales totaled \$12,117,000,000; up 27 per cent from 1954 and 24 per cent higher than in the previous record year of 1953. The new net income figure was 45 per cent higher than in 1954 and up 45 per cent from the previous record set in 1950.

Pay Envelopes Stuffed With Paper; Payer Gone

NEW YORK — When 70 employees of a Brooklyn firm, the Columbia Combining Corp., opened their pay envelopes Friday, they found them stuffed with paper. Some found their envelopes empty. Others found wads of scrap paper. A few more fortunate found coins or small bills.

It all should have added up to \$6,500, police said, but only \$3,000 was accounted for.

Also missing Saturday was Arthur Freedman, 385-a-week 30-year-old accountant of the Bronx. Police said he filled the envelopes last Thursday.

Police quoted his wife as saying he had told her he was going to take a better job with a branch of the firm in St. Louis.

Archbishop Of York Accuses Graham Of Distorting Gospel

DURHAM, England — The Archbishop of York accused American evangelist Billy Graham here of giving "a very distorted view of the apostolic Gospel."

Describing Graham as "a man of utter humility and simplicity," the Church of England's new No. 2 prelate, Dr. A. M. Ramsey, wrote in the Durham Diocesan Quarterly magazine.

"There is evidence he has genuinely claimed to preach only the first steps of Christianity and directed his hearers to churches for the rest."

There is also evidence (notably from his recent mission in Cambridge) he has taught the grossest doctrines and flung his formula "The Bible says" over teaching which is emphatically not that of the Bible.

Dr. Ramsey's article was titled "The Menace of Fundamentalism." It attacked the Protestant movement which insists on the infallibility of the Scriptures and such biblical miracles as the virgin birth and the physical resurrection of Christ.

He quoted Graham as saying the Bible "is a book written by God through 30 secretaries" and commented that this "is an error analogous to the error of the doctrine of transubstantiation where the supernatural part supplants the natural part thereby overthrowing the notion of sacrament."

"The theology of Christ bore your punishment; believe and be saved," when accompanied by the fundamentalist's pulp cliché "The Bible says," is a very distorted view of the apostolic Gospel," the archbishop concluded.

Graham at present is conducting a revival tour through India. Attendance at his meetings there has been reported as the largest he has ever had.
