Huskies Grab Skiing Honors

BANFF, Alta. (AP) — The University of Washington took all the top spots in the three-way 10th annual International Collegiate ski meet here during the weekend.

The Seattle squad edged out the University of Alberta in the giant slalom and downhill events and Wenatchee Junior College in the cross-country event to amass a combined team standing of 294.2.

The two Canadian entries in the seven-team meet placed second and third. The University of Alberta group tallied 278.2 points to clinch second place. The University of British Columbia was third with 288.5.

University of Washington skiers took top spots in the Alpine combined and three-way combined individual standings. Jack Haase of Walla Walla, Wash., scored 282.3 of a possible 300 points to lead the three-way combined list. Walt Taulbee came first in both the downhill and slalom events to receive a perfect score of 200 in the Alpine combined standings.

Former Olympic skier Gordon Morrison of Banff, coach of the Alberta entry, scored 191.9 points in the Alpine combined standings for second spot. Dave Stevens of Bozeman, Mont., a Montana State College entry, was third with 191.4. In fourth spot was Don St. Lewis, of Seattle, a Wenatchee Valley Junior College entry, with 190.1.

Ted Buttner and Helen Bitner scored 1,146 for high mixed doubles kegling Sunday night at the Roseburg Alleys.

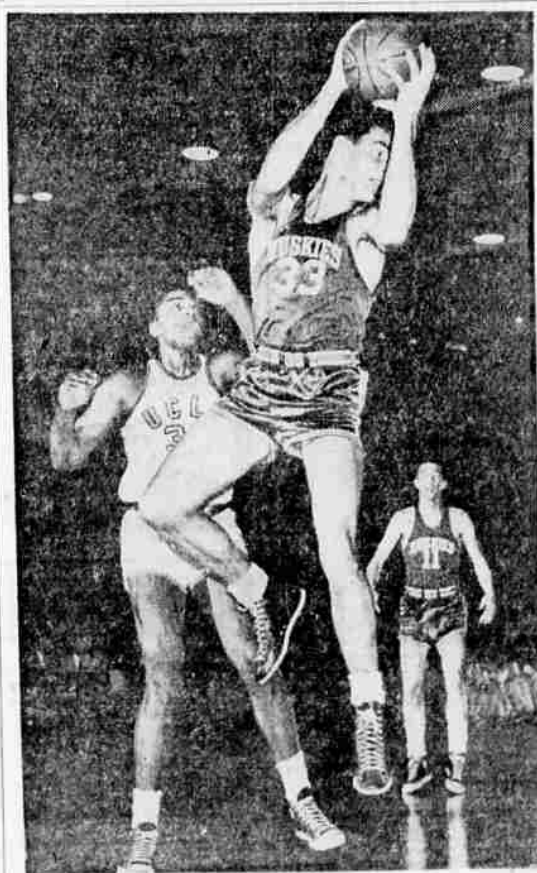

CHICAGO (AP) — A resolution approving the second annual Global World Series was passed Monday by the National Baseball Congress.

The series will be assigned in the United States early in September, involving the same eight nations which competed last year at Milwaukee.

Champions from Asia, Europe, Canada, United States, Colombia, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Hawaii will take part.

The winner of the annual national tournament in Wichita beginning Aug. 17 will represent the United States.

Pete Elliott Names Nebraska Assistants

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Pete Elliott, the new Nebraska football coach, Monday rounded out his staff by naming Don Scarbrough, head football and basketball coach at Northwestern State College at Alva, Okla., as an assistant.

Scarbrough, a 31-year-old University of Tulsa graduate, will be an assistant professor at \$6,500 a year, according to athletic director Bill Orwig.

The appointment fortified the "Oklahoma" flavor of the new Husker football staff.

Elliott came to Nebraska from the University of Oklahoma where he was backfield coach for seven years. Elliott's backfield coach, Bill Jennings, and line coach, Doc Andros, both are Oklahoma University grads.

Only Gene Stauber, the new freshman coach, is an "outsider." He moved to Nebraska from the University of Idaho and is a University of Toledo graduate.

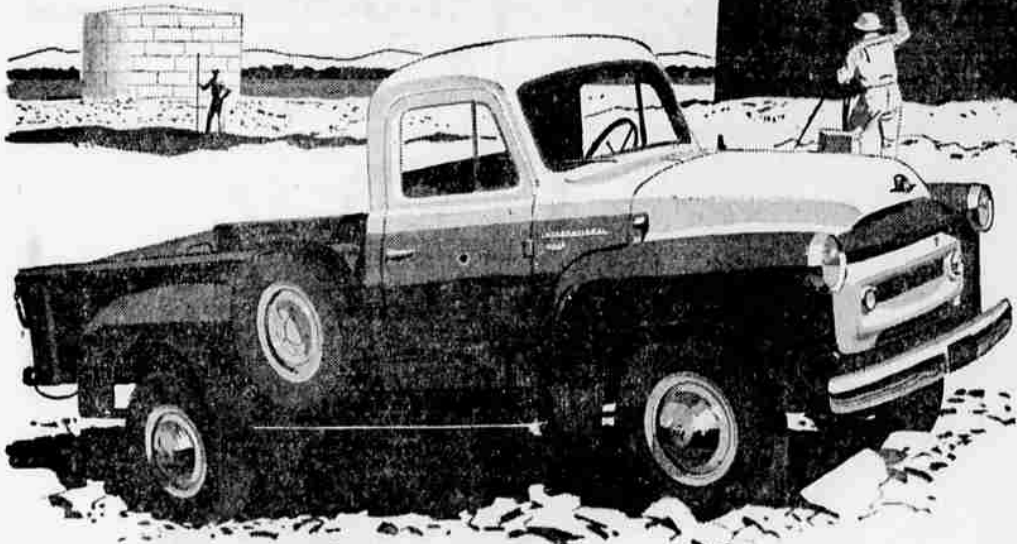
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
