TAIPEI, Formosa — Nationalist Chinese planes sank a big armed junk and damaged another Monday afternoon near the Red-Heid island of Pingtate in Formosa Strait, air force headquarters here reported.

It said the junks opened fire and the planes retaliated, returning to their base unscathed. Pingtan is off the Chinese mainland, about 80 miles west of Formosa's northern tip.

Wage Agreement Averts Bus Strike

MINNEAPOLIS — Thousands of Twin Citians, putting aside their car pool plans and traffic worries, took buses to work as usual today after settlement of a transit wage dispute.

Announcement of acceptance of a new contract came only about seven hours before a strike had been scheduled.

The Twin City Rapid Transit Railroad and Warehouse Commission today for fare increases.

They would be necessary, Company President Fred Ossana said because the new contract gave bus drivers a 13-cent, three-step wage increase which would bring drivers' hourly pay to \$2.14 March 1, 1957.

Ossana estimated the pay raise and employee fringe benefits would cost his firm more than one million dollars above its present expenses.

The present fare is 20 cents cash or five tokens for 99 cents.

The firm has 1,375 drivers and other employees.

Lawyer Says American Bar Overstepped Itself

DENVER — A veteran trial lawyer says the American Bar Assn. "far overstepped itself" in adopting a rule barring photographers and radio and television broadcasters from courtrooms during trials.

Charles T. Mahoney of Denver, a member of the Colorado Bar Assn., made the statement in appealing for revocation of Canon 35.

The Canon bars cameramen and broadcasters from courtrooms on the ground their function destroys the dignity of the courts. Justice O. Otto Moore of the Colorado Supreme Court is hearing arguments on the measure. The week-old hearing will be resumed Monday.

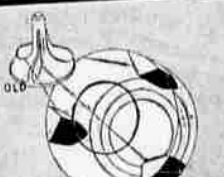
