

Ford Employees Given Over Million For Ideas

DETROIT (AP)—Ford Motor Co. employees collected more than a million dollars last year for ideas they submitted under the company's employee suggestion plan.

John S. Bugas, Ford vice president for industrial relations, reported today the \$1,022,228 in awards topped the million-dollar mark for the first time since the plan was started in 1947.

Employees submitted 77,815 acceptable suggestions and earned 15,749 awards averaging \$64.91. The maximum payment allowable is \$3,000.

Single Guided Missile Can Carry As Much Explosive As World War II Bombers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Air Force Quarles said here today that a single guided missile — or even one fighter-bomber — can deliver on a target "as much explosive force as all the World War II bombers combined."

Quarles made no specific mention of hydrogen bomb capacities. But in a talk at a jet age conference sponsored by the Air Force Assn. he said the Air Force has "immensely more fire power and global capacity" than it has ever known before.

"I do not believe that we will ever again have to employ our air power and weapons as we did in Korea," Quarles said.

"If we are again forced into armed combat we will use the

weapons most appropriate to targets and missions.

"It must be clear to any aggressor that he can expect to be opposed with the kind of weapons necessary to make his aggression both painful and unprofitable," Quarles said. The U.S. must accept the possibility of a sudden, direct attack, and cannot expect a "World War II type buildup."

"This has dictated a 'significant change' in policies for industrial preparedness and for industrial dispersal. Thus, Quarles said, the Air Force has decided that:

1. Whenever it has a choice, it will build new production sources away from lucrative target areas.
2. We intend to keep the pressure on to encourage dispersal.
3. Reliance will be greatest on factories with self-contained power sources, geographic protection, and general ability to withstand an attack.
4. Preference will go to flexible productive facilities — to plants with "resourceful" equipment and personnel, availability of additional labor, provisions for storing extra materials, and capability of taking on added responsibilities under emergency conditions.

Earlier the Civil Aeronautics Administration warned that U.S. airport runways — except for the 10,000-foot field at Boston — may prove to be too short for ocean-hopping jet airliners.

Moviegogoer Eases His Conscience With 30 Cts.

ASHLAND, Ky. (AP)—A moviegogoer who fussed about his age to get into a theatre on a children's ticket has eased his conscience—10 years later.

John Godfrey, manager of the Paramount Theatre, said he received a letter stating:

RONN, Germany (AP)—The Refugee Ministry announced Monday that Hugo Reimann, son of West Germany's former Communist Party boss, has fled from Communist East Germany. A spokesman said Reimann, 31, checked in at the refugee reception center at Glessen, Hesse, about 10 days ago.

House Committee Gives Disaster Bill Approval

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee has approved an extra 25 million dollars for emergency relief in states hard hit by recent hurricanes and floods.

Subject to House and Senate approval, the additional money would boost to \$28,116,250 the amount available to the Civil Defense Administration between now and July 1 for disaster relief.

Heavy drains on the fund in recent months, the committee noted, have reduced it to \$3,116,250, with requests pending for \$14,700,000 for use in Northeastern States, California, Nevada and Oregon.

Use of funds for these claims would leave \$13,400,000 for future emergencies.

California could get the largest share of the 25 million approved Friday.

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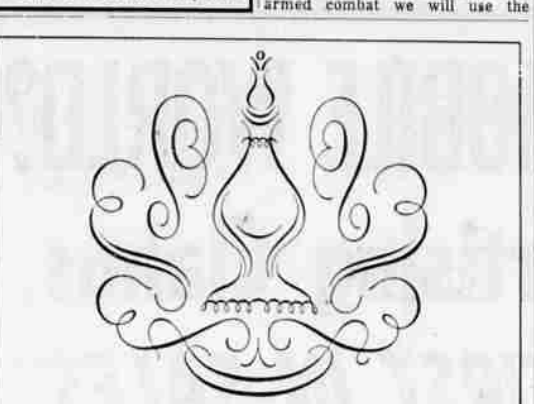
