Guided Missile Research Chief Said Dissatisfied

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force's top research chief was reported Tuesday to be demanding a showdown with superiors on the status of this country's guided missile program.

Trevor Gardner, assistant secretary for research and development, was said to be ready to resign because of dissatisfaction with the service's research program, especially in guided missiles.

He was reported to have gone to Miami to see Secretary of Defense Wilson who is vacationing there.

Friends said several months ago Gardner, who became assistant secretary more than a year ago, was then privately expressing displeasure with the Air Force's attitude toward research.

At a news conference last summer in California, Gardner said he believed the Air Force should seek 100 to 200 million dollars in extra funds for research during the current fiscal year which ends next June 30.

Later, Air Force officials let it be known no supplemental money would be requested.

Gardner also has been described as unhappy over Wilson's refusal to spell out in more detail the work of the service, particularly the Air Force, in such fields as ballistic missiles.

The present Air Force spending budget for research is \$31 million dollars. It has asked for 610 million in the next fiscal year beginning July 1.

Before Gardner came to Washington he was head of development engineering on research and atomic bomb projects at the California Institute of Technology had under contract with the government.



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147 People Ask Aid From Salvation Army

Springfield Chamber Manager Dies Suddenly

PORTLAND (AP) — Ken Reckard, 48, manager of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, died at a hotel here early Tuesday while attending the Washington-Oregon Chamber of Commerce executives' conference.

Death at 5:30 a.m. apparently was due to a heart attack. However, an autopsy was ordered.

Reckard was nominated secretary of the Oregon Chamber Executives Assn. Monday night and was elected to the post by the organization's executive board Tuesday morning before word of his death was received by officers.

The board then named R. Frank Tucker, Klamath County Chamber manager, to succeed him.

Reckard became manager of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce last month, succeeding Frank Lockman who resigned. Prior to coming to Springfield, Reckard had served for four years as manager of the North Bend Chamber.

Widow, Priest's Bodies Found In Motel Room

HERNANDO, Miss. (AP) — An Illinois widow and a 45-year-old Catholic priest died in bed this week after registering at their motel as "the Connollys."

Coroner J. F. Gore ruled their deaths accidental. He said gas escaping from a heater in their closed motel room asphyxiated them.

The priest was identified by the Roman Catholic diocesan chancery office in Springfield, Ill., as the Rev. Thomas Connolly of Macon, Ill. Sheriff W. A. White of Desoto County said here the woman was Mrs. Edward Minor, Springfield, Ill.

In Springfield, the Sangamon County sheriff's office said the woman was Mrs. Ethel Minor, about 45, and a resident until recently of Stonington, Ill. The office said she had been a widow about a year and was survived by a 22-year-old daughter, who is in a convent preparing to become a nun.

Father Connolly was pastor of St. Stanislaus Church at Macon and the mission of St. Francis de Sales at Moweaqua, Ill.

Jason Lee Will Seek Congressional Post

SALEM (AP) — Jason Lee, Salem lawyer, announced Monday he would seek the Democratic nomination for Congress in the First District.

The seat now is held by Rep. Walter Norblad, Stayton Republican.

Lee was graduated from the University of Oregon Law School in 1939, was administrative assistant for the State Tax Commission until 1951, and has been practicing law here since that time.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson will reply at 10:30 to 11 p.m. EST Feb. 22 to Edward R. Murrow's controversial Jan. 26 "See It Now" television show on agriculture.

Announcement of this date was made Tuesday by Benson and the Columbia Broadcasting System.

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Idaho Power Co. Tax Writeoff Move Blocked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six senators, four House members and a public power group called on the government Tuesday to reject applications for tax concessions filed by the Idaho Power Co.

The company has asked the Office of Defense Mobilization to certify that its proposed dam-building plans in the Snake River valley contribute to the national defense. This would permit the company to write off, for tax purposes, part of the cost of the work in four or five years. The normal period is 20 or more.

All those protesting such certification are proponents of the federal Hells Canyon Dam, which couldn't be built if the private utility's projects go up in the same portion of the Snake.

The Power Commission has licensed Idaho Power to build three Snake River dams—at Hells Canyon, Oxbow and Brownlee—but that decision has been taken to the U.S. Court of Appeals here.

In letters to ODM director Arthur Flemming, the public power advocates attacked the plans to grant tax write-offs on the Oxbow and Brownlee Dams but didn't mention the company's Hells Canyon project.

The legislators protesting—all Democratic sponsors of bills to authorize the federal dam at Hells Canyon—are Sens. Morse and Neuberger of Oregon, Warren Magnuson and Jackson of Washington and Murray and Mansfield of Montana and Reps. Ploof (Idaho), Metcalf (Mont.), Green (Ore) and Don Magnuson (Wash.).

The American Public Power Assn. joined in a separate letter signed by its general manager, Alex Radin.

The Congress members said the Department of the Interior has recommended to ODM that Idaho Power be granted "a total write-off of 71 million dollars of the Idaho Power estimate of 103 million dollars" total cost of the Brownlee and Oxbow projects.

They demanded that the department and the utility "be required to prove their allegations that Oxbow and Brownlee power would be used in the interest of national defense."

The Very Rev. Carman Consecrated Coadutor

PORTLAND (AP) — The Very Rev. James W. F. Carman Tuesday was consecrated bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon in solemn ceremonies at Trinity Church here.

The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill of New York City, presiding bishop of the U. S. Episcopal Church, the Rt. Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, and the Rt. Rev. William Remington, former Eastern Oregon bishop, had leading parts in the consecration rite.

Carman, formerly of Trinity Cathedral, Phoenix, Ariz., will aid Bishop Dagwell in administrative work in the Oregon Diocese and will succeed the bishop on the latter's retirement, now planned for 1958.

January Unemployment Total In State 51,200

SALEM (AP) — Oregon had 51,200 unemployed persons in January, or 6,600 fewer than a year ago, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Tuesday.

About 4,400 persons were added to the rolls last month as heavy rains and a long cold spell forced closure of many lumber and construction operations.

Most of the added jobseekers were in Western Oregon.

Compensation paid to workers in January totaled \$2,804,572, highest figure since March, 1954. But the increase was caused by larger benefits approved by the 1955 Legislature.

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Dulles Counters Communist Weather Balloon Claims; Says U.S. Within Rights

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles said the United States would be disposed to respect the protests of countries which—like Russia—have objected to flights by American weather balloons over their territory.

At the same time, however, Dulles told a news conference he believes this country has the right to send such balloons anywhere in the world.

Dulles said Russia's protest will be answered in the next day or so. He would not predict precisely what the United States will say.

But Dulles said thousands of what he called meteorological balloons have been released by the United States in the Pacific, North America and Western Europe. He said they probably have crossed the territories of 20 or 30 countries.

Dulles said he did not know just what international law would apply, but that he thought the whole problem might be the subject for consideration among governments.

Earlier Pentagon officials had indicated they don't intend to stop sending up weather balloons just because the Russians object.

The huge bags lift cameras and other instruments to a height of 30,000 to 50,000 feet. Dulles said the balloons housing these instruments also carry requests in many languages, including Russian, offering rewards for the return of the instruments when found.

The information being sought is not primarily or even at all military, Dulles said, in effect rejecting Soviet implications of espionage by gas bag. He also said he thought that information on the weather-controlling jet streams, gathered by the balloon instruments, would be made available to all countries.

On other subjects, Dulles told reporters:

1. The United States is carefully studying Premier Bulganin's new note to President Eisenhower proposing a "friendship treaty" to see whether there is any point in it on which something constructive could be built. Dulles thus indicated he and the President are trying to figure out a way to make a positive

Remanufacturing Plant At Glendale Now Being Built

Work has begun to construct a remanufacturing plant at Glendale for production of pallet materials, odd-dimensional lumber and specially wood items, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Articles of incorporation were filed Tuesday in Salem for the company to be called Pallet Materials Inc. The filing reported 5,000 shares at no par value. Incorporators are Jack Day, Nels Haglund and Deak Miller.

The incorporators told Mrs. Fox they expect to be ready for production within 20 days. Work has already begun on grading the property for the mill across from the Superior mill east of Glendale.

When production starts, the firm expects to employ five men. The operation and labor force may be increased later, Haglund, a Gold Hill lumberman, will be manager.

Morse, Neuberger Vote Against Gas Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here is the way senators from the Pacific Northwest voted Monday night on the 53-58 roll call by which the Senate passed the bill to exempt natural gas producers from direct federal regulation.

For — Republicans Dworshak and Welker of Idaho.

Against — Democrats Jackson and Magnuson of Washington and Morse and Neuberger of Oregon.

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State Emergency Board Meeting Scheduled Friday

SALEM (AP) — The State Emergency Board, which meets here Friday, will receive requests for \$125,500 in emergency fund.

Requests include \$74,000 for new construction at the state fairgrounds, \$42,500 for expanded quarters for the State Civil Defense Agency, and \$20,000 as a supplemental appropriation for the new power house to be built outside of the state prison walls.

The low bids on the power house project were almost \$20,000 more than the appropriation.

The Emergency Board, which is a legislative committee that makes appropriations when the Legislature is not in session, will have a vacancy for the rest of this year. It normally has nine members.

When Senate President Elmo Smith became governor last week, that left the vacancy that can't be filled.

Vacancies are filled by appointment by the Senate president or speaker of the House, depending on whether the vacancy is that of a Senate member or a House member.

There now is no Senate president, so there is no way to fill vacancies caused by the resignation or death of a Senate member of the board.

Another Candidate Files For Portland Mayor Post

PORTLAND (AP) — Another candidate for mayor of Portland in the May primary election was announced Monday.

George C. McAdams, who works for the city's public works department, filed for the office. He joined Earl Mossman, ex-showman, and Charles J. Watt, bottling company executive, who filed earlier.

Lamar Tooze Files For U. S. Senator

PORTLAND (AP) — Lamar Tooze, Portland attorney, said Tuesday he would seek the Republican nomination for U. S. senator.

He said he had announced last fall he would do so if Gov. Paul Patterson did not and last week's sudden death of Patterson has put him back into the race. Patterson, a strong vote-getter, had announced only three days before his death he would seek the office in an attempt to wrest it from Democrat Wayne Morse.

Tooze, 61, served in both world wars and is commanding general of the 10th reserve division.

He is a 1916 graduate of the University of Oregon, has long been active in Republican Party affairs and was a delegate to both the 1948 and 1952 national conventions. At the 1948 convention he nominated Gov. Earl Warren of California for vice president.

Also seeking the Republican nomination is Elmer Deetz, Canby dairyman.

Minimum Wages Upped In Two Canning Branches

PORTLAND (AP) — An increase in minimum wages for women and minors in two branches of the canning industry was announced this week by State Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen.

He said the Oregon Wage and Hour Commission decided unanimously that those working in cherry stemming will get a boost from 35 to 66 cents an hour as minimum. Those in nut processing and cracking will advance from 40 to 66 cents.

Nilsen said other improvements also were ordered for such employees, including time and a half pay after 10 hours and double-time after 12 hours.
