An ordinance was passed this week to make it illegal in Oakland for children under 14 years old to be left unattended in locked cars for more than 15 minutes. The ordinance was passed by the Oakland City Council.

The council also received a letter from Martin Bros. Box Co. asking support of a highway access road on Stearns Avenue instead of the one approved by the council on the Cemetery Road, according to Mrs. Edith Dunn, News-Review correspondent.

The Oregon Water Corp. asked for an easement on the Stearns property so that wells for city water can be drilled.

The council also discussed possibility of having a special census made and financing a playground project.

It was announced that the Green River ordinance pertaining to peddling went into effect on Jan. 19.

Student Demonstrations To Be Banned In Spain

MADRID (AP)—Spain's dominant Falange Party declared Friday its militants will permit no further student demonstrations to spill blood in Madrid streets.

Government sources said a 19-year-old Falangist who was shot through the head in Thursday's demonstrations was still alive in an "extremely grave" state. Originally the student had been reported killed.

Twenty others were injured, four of them seriously, and 50 were arrested in the attack by several hundred students on provincial headquarters of the Falange.

The attack continued three days of demonstrations and fighting between students and Falangists.

Glendale School Board Adopts New Teacher Salary

The Glendale school board has adopted a new teacher salary schedule which is designed to bring the Glendale schedule in line with other newly adopted schedules throughout the state of Oregon and the county, according to the board.

The minimum salary for a teacher will be \$3,500. The starting salary for a teacher with a bachelor's degree will be not less than \$3,850. The highest starting salary for any teacher will be \$4,120. This will require a master of arts degree plus 45 quarter hours of graduate work.

Increases of \$200 will be granted for the first three years, \$150 for the next three and \$100 for the rest of the schedule. Maximum salary for any teacher with a bachelor of arts degree will be \$5,450 with 12 years teaching experience.

Teachers entering the district may be accredited with five years experience if it is warranted, and teachers already in the system may have as much as nine years experience credited.

A policy has been adopted that no teacher will receive more than a \$400 raise in any one year. It is also the policy that no teacher entering the system for the first time will be granted a salary higher than teachers already in the system with the same training and experience.

The board is now studying insurance to its buildings.

West Will Build Upper Nile Dam

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The West and not the Soviet Union is going to build a \$200-million dam on the Nile River, the biggest construction project in Egyptian history.

Egypt agreed yesterday to accept a 200-million-dollar loan from the World Bank to help finance the huge construction three miles wide and 300 feet high. With that, the way is eased for the United States and Britain to supply another 200 million dollars in direct grants for the project, expected to cost \$1,300,000,000.

Egypt will put up the rest. Western diplomats hailed the agreement as an important victory over the Soviet Union in the battle for influence in the strategic Middle East. The Russians also had offered to help build the big dam at Aswan, 600 miles up the Nile from Cairo.

Some Egyptian officials saw the agreement as evidence of the government's determination to remain neutral in the East-West cold war.

Portland Chiropractor's License Is Revoked

PORTLAND (AP)—The state Board of Chiropractic Examiners Thursday revoked the license of James E. Sivils, Portland chiropractor.

Sivils was accused by witnesses at the hearing of agreeing to perform an abortion. The witnesses, Mrs. Frank S. Jackson, secretary of the board, and Helen West, both of The Dalles, testified that Sivils had agreed to perform the illegal operation for \$400 cash. They said they posed as mother and daughter in their conversation with Sivils.

Sivils said he never had any intention of performing such an operation but that he "went along with their plan" in attempt to determine why they had come to him.

Sivils refused to surrender his license to the board and said he would appeal the board's decision.

Convicted Strikers Fired By Westinghouse Corp.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—The 47 strikers convicted Thursday of contempt of court resulting from a demonstration at the Westinghouse plant Jan. 3 have been fired from their jobs, plant works manager E. L. Smith announced Friday.

David Clayman, union attorney, said the convictions would be appealed.

Spokesmen at the plant said the 45 persons acquitted of the contempt charges had their job suspensions lifted and could return to work "if they chose."

Siamese Twin Girls Die When Separation Fails

HANOVER, N.H. (AP)—Siamese twin girls born a month ago with a common heart and liver are dead.

One died Thursday and the other shortly before midnight after doctors performed an eight-hour operation at Mary Hitchcock Hospital to sever the survivor from her dead sister.

Douglas County Republican Central Committee for consideration by the court for commissioner before the court adopted the stand it took on the appointment.

No Democrats have filed for the office.

The office of sheriff has proven popular, and, in many quarters, it's felt that more candidates will appear before the March deadline date.

Ira C. Byrd, the present sheriff, has filed on the Republican ticket. He has no opposition so far.

Two former deputy sheriffs are trying for the position from the other side of the fence. They are Cecil Bever and Dallas Barnett, who seek Democratic nomination.

Two Republican candidates each have filed for surveyor and treasurer, including the incumbent in each case. Fred Darby, the present surveyor, will be opposed by Arthur Boyer, and Treasurer Oliver Johnson has opposition in Warren C. Powell.

Coroner L. L. Powers and County Clerk Charles Doerner, both Republicans, have filed for re-election and have no opposition yet, although some is looked for on the ballot for coroner.

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults says he's still considering whether to run. He's a Republican. Neither has County School Supt. Kenneth Barneburg, who was elected on a non-partisan ballot, made up his mind.

Charles S. Woodrich is a candidate to succeed himself as Douglas resident circuit judge in the Second Judicial District. Here again, possible opposition has been mentioned around the courthouse. But no one has put in a bid to run against Woodrich.

The judge is elected by voters of four counties—Douglas, Lane, Coos and Curry—Although his permanent bench is in the Douglas courthouse. Names of candidates appear on a non-partisan ballot. A majority of votes in May assures election of a judge. If there is no majority, then the two men with the most votes must run off in November in the general election.

Of the 29 candidates so far, seven are running for justice of the peace in one of three justice court districts in the county.

At Drain, Judge Clarence Leonard has announced he'll retire. John McCool, a deputy sheriff, and Warren T. DeLaVergne, an attorney, have filed for his bench.

At Sutherlin, Ward Watson has filed for re-election in the Calamity District. He'll be opposed by Yo Han Kim, a realtor, and James C. Irwin, Sutherlin municipal judge and building inspector.

A. V. Mohr has filed for re-election at Glendale. Robert Proffitt also has filed for justice of the peace there.

rattled over the playground reports of Nice and Cannes, then came a blizzard. Streets were full of cars standing at crazy angles where drivers abandoned them after sliding around on the ice.

Germany reported low temperatures in several parts of the country. Weissenburg, near Nuernberg, hit 29 below zero, lowest there since 1855.

East German Communist papers printed complaints about the shortage of ear muffs in state stores and the lack of heat on elevated trains.

Southern Italy expected warmer weather, but blizzards still raged over Milan in the industrial north. Sweden was slightly warmer, although Stockholm reported 3 degrees below zero.

As ice closed in, all Denmark's icebreakers concentrated on keeping four main ports open to handle the nation's trade.

Ice also suspended ferry service on the Rhine and on Dutch rivers. This was the death knell.

Drain And Yoncalla Ordered To Fence Garbage Dump

The Douglas County Health Dept. has requested that steps be taken to fence the garbage dump used by Drain and Yoncalla, according to correspondent Mr. George Edes of Yoncalla.

She reports that at this week's Yoncalla City Council meeting, a motion was made to set a date for the two city recorders and the garbage haulers to make arrangements for the fencing.

The action grew out of a charge that cattle are eating garbage and dying from it.

In other action, the council:

1. Ordered all bills paid.

2. Heard a report from water and street superintendent D. Gordon that the city streets are being graded and gravel spread.

The council approved a motion that the city haul gravel for use on parkways and in alleys, but the property owners will have to pay for the gravel. Anyone interested can contact Pete Hedgers or Gordon.

3. Passed a motion that all tile sold to individuals will be for cash only. The money must be paid to the recorder before tile is delivered.

4. Approved a motion that the city marshal check all business licenses.

5. Approved a motion that after March 1, the city will alter its orders for gas and supplies for city equipment among three local service stations.

6. Was informed the budget committee will meet Thursday, Feb. 16, to prepare the budget for the next fiscal year.

Miss McDowell, a native of Moscow-Rose Valley, Pa., is a graduate of Wilson College, Chambersburg, Pa., and was a director of YWCA at the University of Washington and the University of Oregon before coming here in 1952.

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Coastwise Ships Slated To Run

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Shipowners Assn. of the Pacific Coast declared Thursday night that 10 strikebound lumber schooners would sail next week even if deck officers do not come to terms.

The Masters, Mates and Pilots Union has been striking the 10 coastwise vessels for four months, demanding more pay.

George Olson, association president, met with four other maritime unions involved and then announced the ships would sail.

"If strikers do not return, we will employ deck officers who are not members of the striking union," Olson said. "Officers of the four other unions have assured us that their members will work with the officers we select, as long as they are employed under union conditions."

The other unions are the Sailors Union of the Pacific, the Marine Firemen's Union, the Cooks and Stewards, and the Marine Engineers Beneficial Assn.

Ten coastwise ships have been tied up since September because of the strike.

Meany Denies Union Blacklisted Senators

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—AFL-CIO President George Meany flatly denied Thursday the merged labor union organization has prepared a list of members of Congress it wants reelected or defeated this fall.

Other AFL-CIO leaders reported privately, however, that at least nine Republican senators have been designated for AFL-CIO opposition.

The nine, all Republicans, were reported to be Senators Duff (Pa.), Capehart (Ind.), Thye (Minn.), Kuchel (Calif.), Welker (Idaho), Goldwater (Ariz.), Millikin (Colo.), Wiley (Wis.) and Butler (Md.).

AFL-CIO leaders participating in winter meetings here also were reported to have decided to support Sen. Morse (Ore.) but to withhold any organized labor support in the prospective Senate race in Ohio between Gov. Frank Lausche, Democrat, and Sen. Bender (R-Ohio).
