Drunken Driving Charge Against Crosby Dismissed

TACOMA, W. — A drunken driving charge against Pvt. Phillip Crosby, 21-year-old soldier son of crooner Bing Crosby, was dismissed Thursday shortly after a notice of a damage claim was filed against him as the result of a Tuesday night accident.

Deputy Prosecutor Wallace Cavanaugh said a blood test taken on young Crosby immediately after the accident indicated he was telling the truth when he said he had had only two bottles of beer.

Cavanaugh said the test showed 640 milligrams of alcohol in Crosby's blood. Anything over .150 is considered intoxication. The prosecutor said results of the test were not available to his office at the time the drunken driving charge was filed against Crosby Wednesday.

The Europe-bound soldier was released later Wednesday on \$250 bail after his arrest in connection with hitting Asa N. Brightwell, 73, of Tillamook, who was struck down by the Crosby car in front of his home Tuesday.

All that was filed in the damage action was a summons. Legal rules provide that the complaint must follow within five days.

Attorneys for Brightwell's wife said the quick filing action was a move to assure local court jurisdiction over Crosby, who is on leave status and is due to report within 30 days to Ft. Dix, N.J., for transfer to Europe.

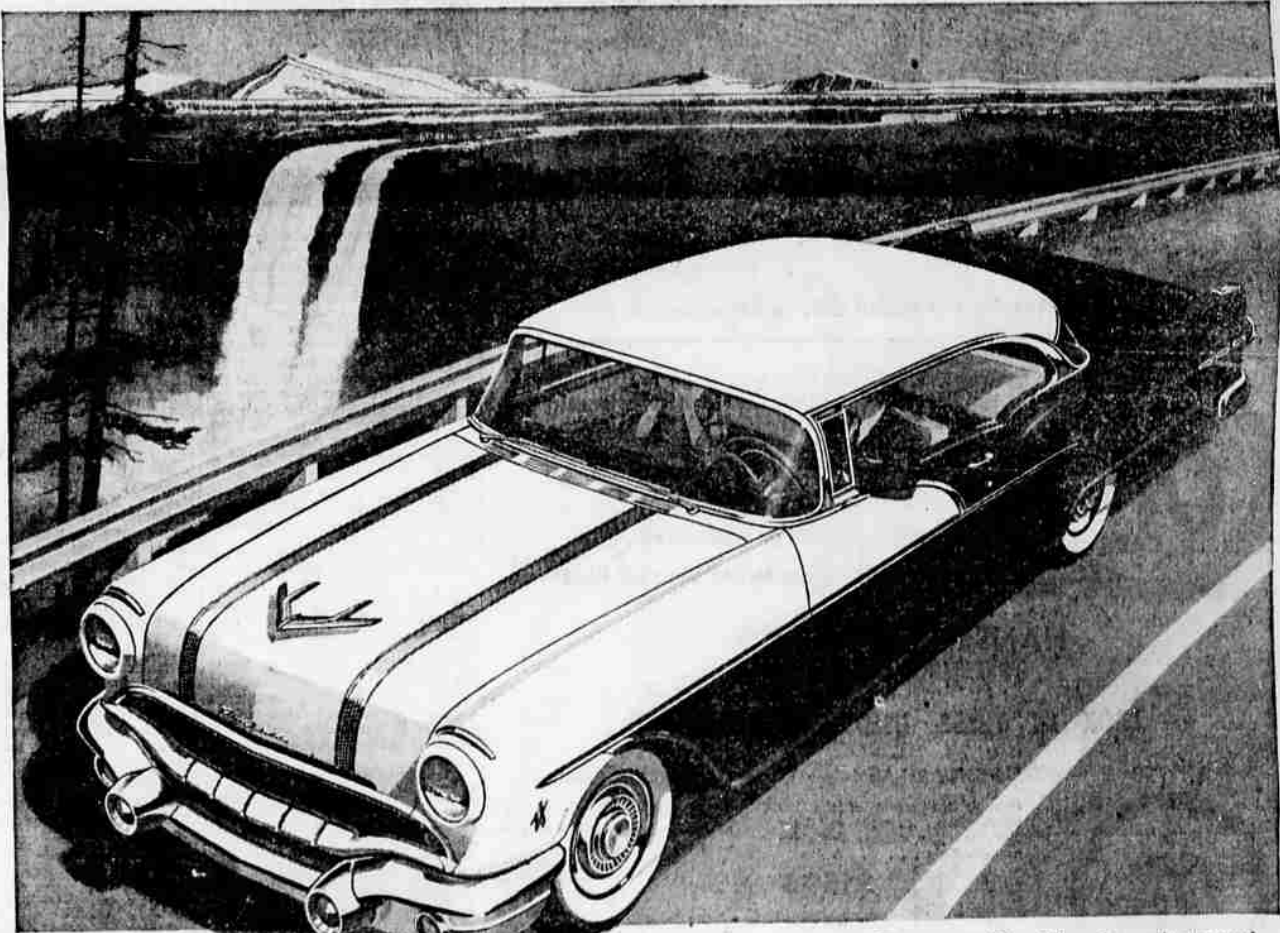
Meanwhile, Brightwell's condition was reported "quite good" at Madigan Army Hospital.

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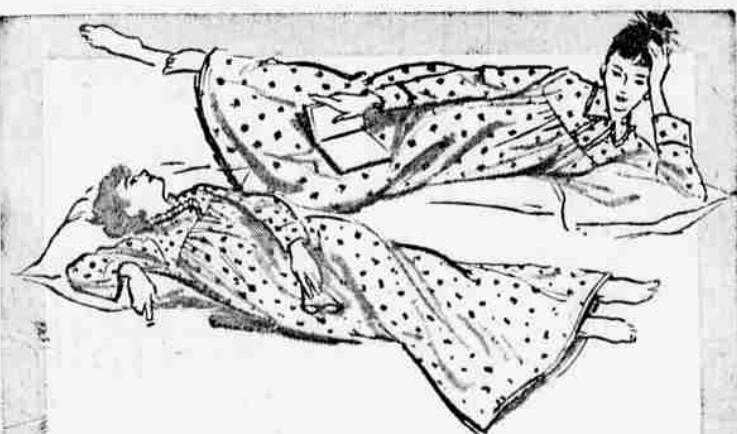

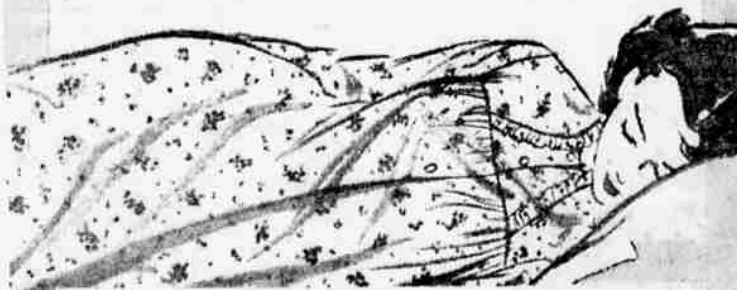
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
