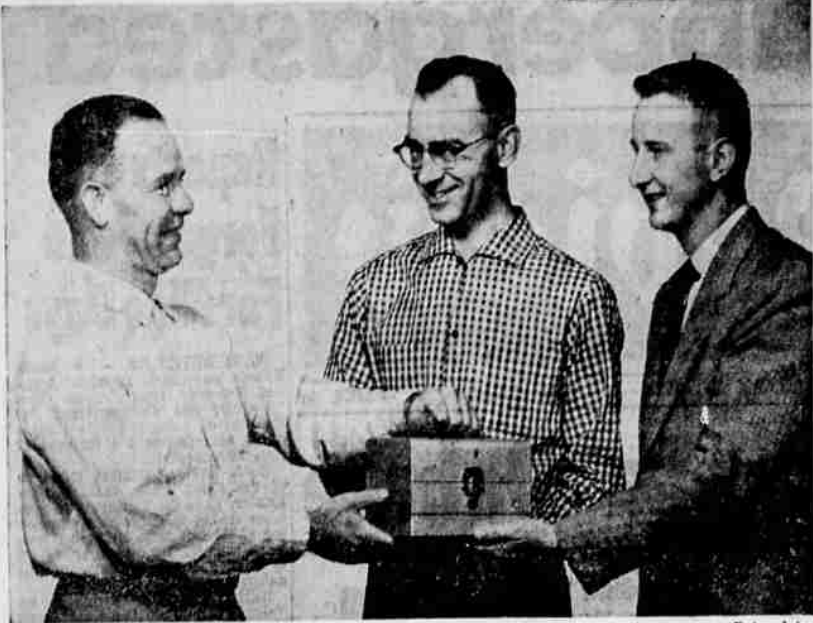

Sec. Benson Says Farm Bill Heads In 2 Directions

WASHINGTON — Describing as "inconsistent" a farm bill combining the soil bank with high-price supports, Secretary of Agriculture Benson says "We cannot go both directions at the same time."

He contended in a statement Friday the higher price supports would spur new farm production offsetting the cuts the soil bank is designed to bring about by taking land out of production.

The Senate Agriculture Committee included both provisions in an election year farm bill it completed Friday. The measure brought both general and detailed criticism from Benson, who called on the Senate to "strike the bad features" and "pass the kind of bill that will give farmers the help they need."

Some of his criticisms were voiced also by Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) who predicted that President Eisenhower will veto the bill if it is passed by both houses without substantial change.

But Chairman Ellender (D-La.) of the agriculture committee, although conceding a bitter floor battle, predicted the measure will pass the Senate "pretty much as it came out of our committee."

Stevenson Not Likely To Seek Oregon Primary

PORTLAND, Ore. — Adlai Stevenson, taking time out from his own campaign, visited in Portland today to do his bit to help re-elect Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.).

Stevenson supporters had pretty well given up slender hopes he would consent to come into the May 18 presidential primary, seeking Oregon's 16 votes for the Democratic nomination.

Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman, said it looked as though neither Stevenson nor Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee would enter the presidential poll. Both are concentrating on selected larger states.

In the case, Morgan told a reporter, Oregon would send an uninvited delegation to the Democratic National Convention. Kefauver swept the party's 1952 primary as the only avowed candidate.

A candidate's consent is not required in the Oregon presidential primary, but no move has been made to file in behalf of either of the two Democratic rivals. Delegates run on their own, and Morgan said he knew of no organized effort to sponsor a pro-Stevenson slate.

Stevenson arrived here yesterday from a 10-day tour of California. Morgan said the former Illinois governor agreed to stop here to help Democrats raise state campaign funds and to support Morse.

Stevenson speaks tonight at a \$25 a plate Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner.

Malta Holding Strategic Vote

VALLETTA, Malta. — The people of Malta voted Saturday in a referendum to decide whether to make this small island virtually a part of the United Kingdom.

The voting started with the 300,000 Maltese, heroic defenders of this strategic British naval base in the central Mediterranean, sharply divided.

The issue threatened to split the long standing alliance between the Roman Catholic church and the island government, now in the hands of the labor party of Premier Dom Mintoff.

Lines of men and women over the voting age of 21 formed at the booths. The voting continues all day and Sunday and the result is expected to be known by Monday night.

Under Mintoff's scheme Malta would become a virtual part of Britain and would have three seats in the British Parliament, just as Northern Ireland, Wales, Scotland and England are represented.

Four Persons Die When Auto Hits Snow Plow

NORTH BEND, Wash. — The lives of four persons were wiped out in one stroke Friday when a car carrying five persons smashed head-on into a snow plow on the Snoqualmie Pass Highway 11 miles east of here.

Three of those killed in the impact were children.

The State Patrol identified the dead as:

Lind E. Forsgren, 28, the operator of a power substation at Doris, in Kittitas County.

Robert Forsgren, 6.

Scotty Forsgren, 5.

Robert McConnell, 5, Forsgren's nephew, Tacoma.

In Nelsens Memorial Hospital at Snoqualmie with serious injuries was Forsgren's wife.

The State Patrol said the grinding crash occurred during a light snowfall on a curve near Camp Mason.

Merlin C. Larson, 45, of North Bend, the operator of the snow plow, escaped injury.

He told the State Patrol he saw the Forsgren car approaching and "bang, it hit me."

Mercy Airlift Gathers Speed

LONDON — Europe's mercy airlift gathered speed Saturday as helicopters and cargo planes showed food and fuel down to thousands of snowbound villages.

Twenty Siberian blizzards blanketed 20 European countries under deep snow, frozen seas and rivers and brought hunger and hardship to hundreds of thousands.

The shivering continent counted 253 dead.

Latest death toll figures showed France was still the hardest hit with 66 dead. Italy was next with 42, Britain 40, Greece 26, Germany 25, Turkey 16, Denmark 14, Netherlands 10, Austria 8, Switzerland 4, Sweden 4, Yugoslavia 2, Spain 2, Cyprus 2, Belgium 1.

Off England's east coast, a 30-knot wind piled the 5,408-ton Brazilian freighter Loide - Honduras and the 549-ton British tug Rumania on a sandbank.

More than 100 ships were ice-bound in the famed Kattegat between Sweden and Denmark as aircraft from both nations joined forces in directing icebreakers churning a path through the ice.

Eisenhower To Undergo Full-Scale Examination

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower arranged to go to the Army's Walter Reed Hospital here Saturday for the start of a new full-scale physical examination.

The outcome could be an important factor in whether he seeks reelection.

The White House announced that Mrs. Eisenhower would accompany the President to the hospital.

James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary, said Eisenhower would remain at the hospital for from 2 to 3 hours for preliminary medical tests.

The entire examination is scheduled to be completed some time Tuesday. Results will be made public then or Wednesday morning.

Kefauver Files Delegates Slate

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) filed his slate of Democratic delegates Friday to the state's presidential primary March 20.

Kefauver leaves by plane today to keep some speaking engagements in Michigan. He will make a Minnesota swing Feb. 18-20.

In a news conference after his filing, Kefauver said he thought the Senate would pass the farm bill because "Democratic members feel that farmers' income should be raised."

With respect to desegregation in schools, he said the only effective medium to accomplish it would be "public opinion, justice and the using of your influence in getting people to do the right thing."

"The ruling of the Supreme Court is the law of the land," he went on. "I think it is high time that intelligent, thoughtful leaders of both races get together and find a solution. Nothing should be done to hurt or destroy the public school system."

Monday Services Set For Canyonville Women

Funeral services for Mrs. Martha Marie Lee, 37, Canyonville, will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary Myrtle Creek.

Mrs. Lee died Thursday night in a Canyonville hospital, following a heart attack.

Mrs. Lee was born Feb. 22, 1898, in Ohio. She married Robert Elmer Lee in Santa Ana, Calif., in 1942. They came to Douglas County 10 years ago from Los Angeles, Calif.

She was a member of the German Lutheran Church.

Jake Leicht Takes Up Life Insurance Work In Roseburg

Jake Leicht, former state parole and probation officer for this district, has entered the insurance field as a representative of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States.

He is now undergoing a comprehensive training program to equip him to be a competent life underwriter, according to John M. Byrne of Eugene, district manager of the company.

Leicht moved to Roseburg in the fall of 1953. He had been with the parole and probation office in Salem and Klamath Falls before that time. He and his wife live at 169 W. Bodie St.

After graduation from the University of Oregon, Leicht played professional football with the Baltimore Colts for two years, then coached at The Dalles for three years before going to work for the state.

At the university, Leicht was chosen by The Associated Press and the New York Sun on all-America teams in 1945 and 1947. He was an all-coast selection in 1945, 1946 and 1947, despite being sidelined by injuries during part of the 1946 season. Leicht also was a track star at Oregon, running the 100-yard dash in 9.6 and the 220 in 21.1.

While serving as a lieutenant with the Army Air Forces in World War II, Leicht was named by Yank magazine to the all-service football team for 1945.

Scientist Stabs Four Associates

SOUTH PASADENA, Calif. — A scientist in a Beckman industries plant stabbed four fellow workers Friday and then attempted suicide, police reported.

He booked Dr. Robert J. Dwyer in the prison ward of Los Angeles General Hospital on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon.

The stabbings occurred in the Area division of the Beckman plant, and there was no apparent motive, said Detective Lt. George Sprague.

Carle C. Brawner, 40, Monrovia, staggered out of a rear office and cried for help. Sidney Johnson, 43, Burbank; Herbert Quan, 31, Los Angeles; and Dr. D. Dwight Taylor, 54, Altadena, were slashed with a three-inch blade pocketknife as they battled to subdue Dr. Dwyer.

Several men picked up chairs and forced Dr. Dwyer back into the rear office, where he retreated into a closet.

Dr. Taylor, who heads the staff of 11 men directing government classified work at the plant, said Dr. Dwyer is a doctor in physics from Harvard University and an expert in spectroscopy.

Velvet-Voiced Murderer Held

SAN FRANCISCO — Sheriff Earl Hollen of Princeton, Ind., flew into San Francisco Friday night to reclaim Leslie Irvin, a velvet-voiced but brutal murderer who escaped jail at the Indiana city.

Irvin, 31, was convicted of one robbery-killing and charged with five others. His victims were found with their hands tied behind their backs.

Irvin was arraigned on a fugitive warrant Friday but gained a continuance until Tuesday to obtain counsel. His Evansville lawyers, Theodore Lockyear Jr. and James Lepp, said they were through with his case.

The Evansville pipe insulator escaped while waiting death in the electric chair at Michigan City, Ind. Police picked him up here because he just "didn't look like he belonged" to the stolen diamonds he was trying to pawn.

"On your 109th birthday," the President wrote, "please accept my congratulations. This anniversary, I am certain, will be rich like its predecessors in memories and in warm wishes from friends in many parts of the nation. With them I am delighted to join once again in saluting you."
