Roseburg's underdog Indians fought the visiting North Bend Bulldogs hoopers to a standstill through most of the first half. But the Indians faded in the second half, and the Bulldogs gained steam.

North Bend broke into the lead for good midway in the second quarter and surged away to win the District 5-A-1 game solidly, 69-52, at Roseburg Friday night.

Coach Bill Harper's charges missed the services of speedy Brady Montgomery at guard, and timing, particularly on passes, went awry in the second half.

Indians Strike First
At the game got under way, the Indians showed signs of fashioning a solid upset. The tip at the center line to launch the game went to Jerry Droscher, and he dunked the first Roseburg basket with only two seconds gone in the game.

Moments later, North Bend tied the score at 6-6, but the Indians again surged ahead, finally building a 13-8 lead. They were still on top, 17-14, but from there, it was a toe-to-toe struggle well into the second quarter.

Except for a brief 8-7 lead by the Bulldogs, the Indians paced the entire first quarter, ending it on top 17-16. Going into the second quarter, the local quint nabbed the lead at 21-18 on a Droscher hook and Dick Woolstenhulme jump shot. North Bend tied it up at 21-21. Seconds later, Bill Oerding fast broke into the clear to give the Indians their first lead, 23-21.

Jack Shanley stole the ball for a lay-in which gave the Bulldogs their biggest lead up to that point, 26-23.

Threat Ended
The Indians hit a pair of free throws to cut it to 26-25, but that was the last Roseburg threat. From that point the visitors took command.

In split seconds, little Bert Why pumped two field goals home. The tense battle up to that point began to tell on the Indians as their passing went sour. By the half, the North Bend lead was 30-16, 10 points, 37-27.

Halftime was only a breather for the now highly potent Bulldogs. They continued their hot shooting, but the Indians didn't lose ground. Just as the quarter ended, Woolstenhulme whined a long push shot through the net and the score was 51-40 in favor of the Bulldogs. That was as close as the Indians ever got again.

A substitute guard took up any slack in the Bulldog scoring in the last quarter by racking his entire 10 points for the game.

Shanley took high point honors with seven field goals and two free throws for 16 points. Close behind was Roseburg's Woolstenhulme with three field goals and eight free throws for 15 points.

On Tuesday the Indians host Marshfield in another conference game at 8 at the high school gym.

Uclans Boost League Lead On Close Win

The Bruins of UCLA took a tight grip on first place in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race Friday night as they managed to squeeze by Stanford in a heart-stopper.

Willie (The Whale) Naulls bucketed 24 points for the Bruins as they edged by the Indians 50-48 and ran their record in PCC play to 7-0.

The loss dropped the Indians to third place behind Southern California's Trojans, who toyed with Washington State, 76-55. In other games, Washington bopped Oregon, 58-50, and California whipped Idaho, 54-44.

Washington relied on Bruno Boin and Bob Bryan to choke off an Oregon rally late in the game. The B-boys collected eight points apiece in a red-hot finish after Oregon had closed the gap to 49-47 with 10 minutes left on the clock.

The Huskies held Oregon to a paltry three points while Bryan and Boin kept the net bouncing, with aid from the rest of the Husky crew.

Washington got out in front on the long-shot artistry of sophomore John Tufts early in the game and held a 34-28 lead at the half. Oregon's late rally was the only time the Huskies were threatened.

Charlie Franklin of Oregon topped the scorers with 21 points. Boin hit 17 for Washington and Bryan got 11.

Southern California had an extremely easy time with the Cougars. The players hardly had time to get a nodding acquaintance with their opponents when the Trojans started to leave the Cougars behind.

Larry Beck, Washington State's sharp-shooting forward, pumped in 19 points, the top scoring effort, while Bill Galbraith contributed 14 more in WSC's losing cause.

The Trojans were out in front at the half, 41-25.

California clamped a tight zone defense on Idaho to keep the Vandals constantly on the outside looking in. Idaho managed to make only nine field goals during the entire contest.

The Vandals kept in the running on their shooting from the free throw line but it wasn't enough to offset the disadvantage of California's excellent defense against field goals.

California hit four straight field goals at the close of the first period to take a 29-21 lead at the half. Idaho kept the game close for the first four minutes of the second half and then faded, although the Vandals closed the margin late in the game when Cal's subs took over.

Bob Blake of Cal was the game's high scorer with 20 points. Gary Simmons' 14-point effort was high for Idaho.

Stanford held the ball for the final minute against UCLA, hoping for a last second shot to tie the contest. Bill Bond missed the tie-maker, however.

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
