

### Speaker At Drain C. C. Meet Extols Liberty Principle

A man frequently mentioned as a Republican candidate for U. S. senator left politics out of his talk Saturday night when he spoke at the annual banquet of the Drain Chamber of Commerce.

Phil Hitchcock, former state senator from Klamath County and now professor of political science at Lewis & Clark College, Portland, spoke instead on American freedom.

He said all American freedoms are based on a recognition of God. They can be preserved, he said, only if they are seen in that light.

Liberty and freedom enjoyed in this nation, Hitchcock reminded, had been paid for with human lives.

He warned that if the world is to be saved from tyranny, it will be because Americans are faithful to the responsibilities of leadership which have been placed in their hands.

The tyrannies under which Europe has suffered, Hitchcock said, are an outgrowth of the extreme liberalism which recognizes no authority higher than the will of man and defies the state.

### Texas Convicts Damage Dormitory In Fiery Riot

RICHMOND, Tex. — Tear gas bombs and fire hoses broke up a riot and a quarter long riot by screaming, cursing convicts at Harlem Prison Farm No. 1 near here Sunday.

Approximately 75 armed officers surrounded the two-story concrete dormitory and blocked off all nearby roads in the area after the convicts started smashing windows and setting hundreds of mattresses on fire.

There apparently was no attempt to escape. About half of the 400 prisoners at the farm took part in the riot. All but 12 of the convicts are of Latin-American descent.

O. B. Ellis, manager of the Texas prison system, said the riot was started by about 12 prisoners who he said "appeared to be under the influence of drugs."

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### Quota Set For National Guard Recruiting Drive

A recruiting goal of 20 men has been set for Co. D 186th INF in the one-day membership drive of the National Guard set for Feb. 19.

In announcing the goal, Capt. Horace J. Pendergrass said particular emphasis would be placed on reaching the parents of prospective recruits.

Through enlistment in the National Guard, Capt. Pendergrass said a young man can receive his military training while serving his friends at home, can earn extra money and build up a retirement pension, and has an opportunity to learn new skills which are valuable to him in civilian life.

Besides his instruction in soldiering and many technical fields, the Guardsman can attend regular Army service schools and receive pay while doing so. Also, home-study extension courses can be taken, opening the way to faster promotions.

For further information on their sons' careers in the National Guard parents are invited to visit the Roseburg armory on the day of the recruiting drive. Special arrangements have been made for Guard personnel to answer in detail all questions relative to enlistment.

Guard members will devote the first two hours of recruiting day to drill, following which they will engage in an intensive membership drive for the rest of the day. In addition to receiving parents at the armory, they will visit the homes of prospective recruits. Recruiting information can also be obtained by calling the armory.

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## Stevenson Would Exclude Race Integration Squabble From Presidential Contest

PORTLAND, Ore. — Adlai Stevenson says the question of integration of races in the public schools should be taken out of the presidential contest.

He said in a statement Saturday he could think of no greater service to his country than to exploit for political ends the tensions that have followed in the wake of the Supreme Court decision.

There had been reports from California that Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) was gaining Negro support there over Stevenson for the nomination. Negro spokesmen said they had been unable to get even "a mild statement" from Stevenson on civil rights.

Expressing surprise, Stevenson said his attitude "has not changed since I first had a part in integrating Negroes in the naval service 15 years ago."

Referring to the Supreme Court desegregation order, Stevenson said he agreed "we must proceed... with all reasonable speed. But we must recognize that it is reason alone that will determine our rate of continued progress."

Democracy Faces Test  
More than half the 17 states allowing segregation have shown "heartening results" in integration, he said, but in "the five or six where public opinion does not yet sustain the court's decision, we are faced with one of the ultimate Democracy Faces Test."

to preserve peace in the Middle East. There has been talk of an international army to guard the frontiers between Israel and Arab countries.

Soviet Action Criticized  
The Soviet Union held the Eisenhower-Eden declaration "cannot but disturb the peace of the Near East and Middle East and cannot but disrupt the independence and sovereignty of nations of that area."

Eisenhower and Eden had declared the Soviet bloc's supply of arms to the Middle East "added to the tensions in the area and increased the risk of war."

Monday night's Soviet statement also attacked the Baghdad Pact and other "aggressive military blocs" and continued:

"The Washington declaration said specifically that the signers claimed they wanted the settlement of the controversy between Israel and her Arab neighbors. That would be fine if it were so. But in that case why are these decisions taken without the participation of interested nations, behind their backs?"

This paragraph of criticism echoed the tone taken by the Arab nations toward the same declaration. It was another indication of Russia's rapid moves to align herself with Arab countries and to undercut Western influence in that region.
