

Roseburg Snaps Marshfield Jinx, Stuns Buc's By 61-54

Indians Even District Mark

One of the smallest basketball crowds ever to attend a game in the Roseburg gym watched one of the highest upsets ever pulled by a Roseburg team as the Indians surprised high-ranking Marshfield 61-54 on the Indian floor Saturday night.

The win gave Coach Bill Harper's charges a 2-2 mark in district 5-A-1 play for second place and revived the title hopes after Friday night's dismal loss to North Bend. Marshfield is now 2-3 in the district.

It was Roseburg's first basketball win over a Pirate school in its 11-year history. Saturday night, however, while showing plenty of heart and size, the visitors failed to impress with any great skill.

Roseburg Play Alert
Roseburg, meanwhile, played alertly, taking advantage of numerous defensive errors by the visitors to break in for easy layins. The locals' zone defense, set up in

the second period, stopped the Pirate passing game and turned the tide when numbers of Marshfield passes were intercepted.

The zone defense also helped the Roseburg backboard game at which they were badly outstripped by the team going by the superior Pirate height.

Guard Lee Burghardt, performing smartly, was particularly effective at getting in for the easy cradle. Set off to the side of the basket, the 5-10 senior found the basket open for five free field goals at key times in this way.

Ordering Tallies 20
Running - mate Bill Oerding at guard turned in the night's high point showing with 29 points, getting six of them on free throws without a miss. Oerding turned in a stellar performance both offensively and defensively.

The Indians had to fight from behind to turn the tide and with the help of the zone defense were able to do just that in the second period. Marshfield led the way after one quarter, breaking a 4-6 tie to go ahead.

Roseburg finally caught up again at 23-21. After taking a 25-23 lead and watching Marshfield tie it again at 25-25 and 27-27, the locals led the rest of the way except for one third period deadlock.

Woolstenhulme Hits 4
By halftime, the count was 31-27 locally, with forward Dick Woolstenhulme's four points at the period's end the payoff.

The teams exchanged baskets in the early third quarter with the Pirates catching up at 33-33. A layin by center Jerry Droscher after a scramble for the ball and Burghardt's drive and layin turned the tide for good, making it 37-33.

The period ended 43-39. The best was yet to come. Burghardt's layin and free throw, Oerding's eight-footer from the side, his driving layin and his 15-footer, plus Droscher's free throw, gave the locals the game's biggest lead 53-41 with five minutes left to play.

Marshfield Threatens
Marshfield threatened again with six straight points for a 53-47 Indian margin and 2:40 left to play. But that was the best they could do the rest of the way as Pirate attempts to get the ball from the half-court Indians sent the locals to the foul line regularly.

Medford Claims Berth In Basketball Tourney

The first team to clinch a berth in the Oregon class A-1 high school basketball tournament next month is Medford, runnerup to Eugene last year and currently No. 4 in the Associated Press poll.

Medford, which has been one of the 16 teams in the big meet at Eugene by downing Astoria 65-49, Saturday night for its 14th victory in 18 games.

But meanwhile two of the top 10 teams in the poll were jolted by upsets.

Roseburg, unranked, surprised fifth-ranked Marshfield, 61-54. It was Marshfield's fifth loss against 11 wins.

Milton-Freewater, No. 8, also suffered its fifth defeat in 16 games, losing 59-56 to unranked Baker.

It was Baker's second upset win in two nights. Friday it upended sixth-ranked Pendleton.

Pendleton bounced back Saturday, however, with a 72-41 win over La Grande to make its season record 12-4.

The win gave the locals a clean two-match sweep on the coast for the weekend.

It was strictly no contest after Roy Sinclair had given the Pirates their only win on a decision in the 115-pound event. Roseburg won 10 of the 12 matches and got a draw in the 11lb.

Hal Zurcher To Head SOL

Little Chance Seen For Roseburg Entry

Plans for forming a six-team Southern Oregon League, not including Roseburg, were drawn up at a meeting of league officials in the Roseburg City Hall Sunday.

As one of their first official acts, the group elected Hal Zurcher of Roseburg to serve as president of the league.

Harry Chipman, news editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, was elected secretary.

Informally before the meeting, Zurcher said that he would not undertake the effort this year to promote a SOL team in Roseburg.

As things developed, the league handed Zurcher the gravel for the presidency during the 1956 campaign and assigned future league meetings to Roseburg.

Entry Deadline Set
Teams definitely entered in the SOL for the 1956 season were defending champion Drain, Medford, Bend and new member Coos Bay-North Bend. The league set a March 4 deadline for further entries.

It was indicated that both Coquille and Bandon would re-enter again this year by that time, filling the six-team limit. Coos Bay-North Bend was readmitted into the league by vote.

Zurcher said that Grants Pass officials would be contacted in addition to those at Coquille and Bandon.

A tentative starting date of the June 16-17 weekend was set for play. The representatives felt that the later date would be advantageous for securing college and high school players without interrupting their schooling.

Team representatives included Roy Helsler, Drain manager; Bill Askin, business manager from Medford; Bill Head, a director of the Coquille club; team manager Paul Gehman and F. Lee Genna, Bend; Bob Shaw and an agent manager Curly Leninger, Coos Bay-North Bend.

Zurcher succeeds Don Faber of Medford in the presidency. Walter Reese of Grants Pass was the 1955 secretary.

No definite date for the next meeting was set, but Zurcher plans one in March.

The tournament's opening game at Corvallis, Ore., matches the champs of the Pacific Coast Conference and the California Basketball Assn. and Monday Naulls' UCLA team led the PCC while Russell's San Francisco Dons topped the CBA. And there's little chance either will be pushed out.

Naulls hit for 37 points Saturday as the Bruins dropped Stanford into sixth place.

UCLA beat Stanford, 50-48, Friday and, 81-72 Saturday in an overtime.

That left UCLA with an 8-0 PCC record against 8-2 for second place Southern Cal. USC whipped Washington State twice, 76-53, and 85-54.

This Friday and Saturday, Stanford plays at USC, UCLA at Oregon State, Washington State at Cal and Washington at Idaho. Oregon is idle.
