

Glendale Area Man Dies At Canyonville

Joseph M. Poe, 62, who lived on Highway 99 between Glendale and Wolf Creek, died at the Forest Glen Hospital in Canyonville Monday following a series of strokes.

Funeral services are scheduled Wednesday afternoon at 2 at the L. B. Hall Mortuary chapel in Grants Pass. Interment will follow at the Hillcrest Memorial Park.

Poe was born in Hutchinson, Kan. He had lived for the past 11 years in the Glendale area and was employed by the Robert Dollar Lumber Co.

He is survived by his wife, Nina; a son, Michael of Bakersfield, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Nora Lee Krewson of Oxnard, Calif., and Frieda McNeil of Glendale; two brothers, Edgar of Trinidad, Calif., and Cecil of Kennewick, Wash.; and seven grandchildren.

Drivers Held Blameless In Rear-End Collisions

Two rear-end collisions in traffic were investigated Monday by Roseburg police, but in each case, all drivers were held blameless. There were no citations, and no one was injured.

A car dashed onto Diamond Lake Boulevard from Northeast Atlanta Street Monday noon. A log truck driver, Harlan Abe Tharp, 35, of Rt. 2 Box 326A, stopped quickly to avoid hitting the car.

But Mrs. Marion Elva Brown, 3034 N.E. Douglas Ave., couldn't stop her car in time to avert hitting the log truck from the rear. The car which caused all the trouble drove on without stopping, police said.

The Brown car received an estimated \$200 damage, and the truck took only minor damage.

Janita Mae Ross, 26, Camas Valley, stopped in traffic on Stephens Street near the Lane Avenue intersection at 5:30 p.m. William Henry Adamson, 50, of 1774 W. Estelle St., couldn't stop in time to avoid hitting the Ross car. There was about \$115 damage done to the two autos, police estimated.

Roseburg Men Face Felony Crime Counts

Two men facing felony charges asked time to see attorneys when arraigned in district court Tuesday.

They are Charles Lee Kegley and James F. Arterburn, both 28 and of Roseburg. Kegley is charged with forgery in a contract signed by Felix G. Cardinal of Cardinal Tire Service. It is alleged Kegley forged a \$28.50 check. Judge Warren A. Woodruff set bail at \$2,000.

Arterburn is charged with embezzlement, with bail set at \$2,500. He is accused by L. H. Fitzsimmons of converting property to his own use. The property of Fitzsimmons is valued at \$475, the complaint states.

Both men were arrested by sheriff's deputies. Arterburn was picked up for probation violation, then charged with embezzlement.

Only Two Roads: Peaceful Coexistence Or War, Says Khrushchev To Congress

MOSCOW — Nikita S. Khrushchev told the world Tuesday "there are only two roads, peaceful coexistence or war," and declared the Communist bloc is now invincible.

The Soviet Communist Party boss pictured the Western position as weakening while the Soviet Union and its Red associates grow stronger. But the warning was accompanied by a statement that war is not inevitable.

Khrushchev spoke before cheering delegates at the 20th congress of the Soviet Communist Party in the Kremlin, the first such gathering of the post-Stalin era.

He laid down a five-point foreign policy in which improvement of relations with the United States, Britain and France was one key point. Maintenance of the "defense potential of the Soviet Union" was another. Khrushchev said Russia must not lag behind the Western powers in armaments.

"The principle feature of our epoch is the emergence of socialism (communism) from the confines of one country and its transformation into a world system," Khrushchev said.

"Capitalism has proved impotent to hinder this world historic process. The simultaneous existence of two opposed world economic

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diverting money for roads. He said feeling is that "it is unwise to take money from one pocket and put it in another."

There have been numerous requests by educational groups to have "very substantial sums from the O & C revenues" go to schools, Hill reviewed. The effort is widespread in western Oregon, where 18 counties receive revenue from O & C lands. Much of the money goes for construction and maintenance of roads.

As to the proposed new access roads, order of precedence will be considered at a conference this spring, Hill said. Among the new roads proposed are ones on Rock Creek, Cow Creek, Camp Creek in the Loun Lake area and Smith River extension into the Drain area to connect with Gunter Road.

Other proposed work: Construction of roads on Spencer Creek, Twin Sisters, middle creek of Cow Creek and west fork of Cow Creek areas; surfacing of Emsond Creek Road and completion of a Smith River log dump.

Hill, Ashley and BLM men will go to Riddle Thursday to study the Cow Creek proposals.

In other executive committee action, counselors Guy Cordon of Washington, D.C., and Frank Sever of Portland were asked to follow closely a bill Sen. Wayne Morse proposes to introduce into Congress.

The proposed measure would provide five yearly appropriations of 25 per cent of gross O & C revenues for access roads, Hill said. The formula of distribution of funds under a 1937 act would be only slightly changed. Another factor is that the appropriation would be turned over to a government agency with the O & C counties having little to say in the matter or power to review the program, Hill said.

Hill doesn't believe the bill would make much difference in the present set-up, because of the "fine cooperation" now existing between the counties and federal agencies, but it could.

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the United Nations if it becomes necessary to act with military forces to prevent an outbreak of war.

State Department informants said the expression of Soviet concern about the United Nations charter appeared hypocritical.

They said that they were "unaware" that Russia got U. N. approval for the sale of Communist arms to Egypt, or for the speeches of Premier Bulganin and Communist boss Khrushchev endorsing India's claim on Kashmir last fall, or for the anti-NATO Warsaw pact of Eastern European satellites.

All three of these maneuvers have had a considerable impact on international affairs and have affected the interests of various countries, officials said.

Sen. George (D-Ga.) said he opposes sending troops into the tense Middle East lest Russia seize the action as an excuse to move in its own armies.

The five principles of Soviet foreign policy outlined by Khrushchev were:

"1. Respect for coexistence.

"2. Strengthened relations with the people's democracies (Soviet satellites).

"3. Strengthened friendly relations with India, Burma, Afghanistan and countries not belonging to aggressive military blocs.

"4. Work for better relations with the United States of America, Great Britain, and France in all fields especially economic, technical and cultural.

"5. Remain vigilant while there are still people who wish to threaten peaceful coexistence and maintain the defense potential of the Soviet Union."

Hicks came to Roseburg in 1942 from Warrenton, Ore. He entered the real estate business in 1943. In 1952, he moved from a downtown location to the Harvard Avenue location which he had constructed.

Although his future plans are not definite, Hicks said he and his family will remain in Roseburg. They plan to travel this summer.

Tuesday Warren said he and Byers planned to open business offices Wednesday in the same location.

Board Adopts Budget, Sets School Bond Vote

25 of this school year, the total enrollment was 5,233. With the additional 336, it will reach 5,569.

The biggest item in the budget, of course, is cost of instruction. The budget figure for next year's edition is \$1,318,420.19. The budget for 1955-56 called for \$1,222,336.82. The increase was explained as simply meaning that more children in the district educational system mean a need for more teachers.

Also added in this figure is approximately \$10,000 for increases of teacher salaries at the beginning teacher level.

Here is the way the other general items in the budget stack up.

GENERAL CONTROL (includes salaries for superintendent, clerk, clerical assistants and half of the assistant superintendent's salary, as well as cost of supplies, elections, legal service and other expenses). The budget figure for 1956-57 is \$31,126. This year it is budgeted at \$49,970.

OPERATION OF PLANT (includes janitors and other employees' salaries, supplies, fuel, water, light, power and telephone). Budget figure is \$215,325. This year, it is \$207,380.

MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS (includes personal services, repair, maintenance and replacement of furniture, equipment and buildings, upkeep of grounds). Budget figure is \$96,628.79. This year, it is \$85,897.76.

AUXILIARY AGENCIES (includes health services, transportation, and school lunches). Budget figure is \$208,762.50. This year, it is \$205,048.50.

FIXED CHARGES (includes insurance, rent, retirement). Budget figure is \$123,572.08. This year, it is \$95,216.17.

CAPITAL OUTLAYS (includes sites, new buildings, additions and alterations, library books, furniture, fixtures and equipment and assessments for betterments). Budget figure is \$98,268.88. This year, it is \$38,476.44. The big increase is in furniture, fixtures and other equipment). It jumped from \$5,000 to \$60,476.84.

EMERGENCY FUND. Remains at \$25,000.

DEBT SERVICE (includes principal and interest on debts). A total \$270,660.75 must be paid. This year, \$283,422.50 is being paid.

The millage rate for the district, if the budget is passed, is not known. At present it is 58.1 mills. On the basis of present valuation of the district, it would be in the neighborhood of 64 mills. However, County Assessor Morris Bowker does not know what increase the valuation will be in the district.

Between the 1954-55 budget and the 1955-56 budget, the increase was slightly over \$50,000. The increase in assessed valuation has grown steadily smaller in each of the last three years. At 64 mills an increase of \$50,000 in assessed valuation would bring in only about \$3,200 more.

A public hearing was also scheduled for March 9. It will be in the board room at Central Junior High at 8:30 p.m.

Two Houses Near Glendale Burn; Other Homes Saved

Two houses in a heavily populated area near Glendale burned to the ground early this morning and threatened other homes of the addition. The approximately 40 homes in the addition are not in a fire district.

Correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox reports the fire apparently broke out in a small cabin occupied by Mac Nelson, his wife and their 14-year-old son. The cabin is located in the Humphrey Addition east of Glendale.

The fire, which started at about 6 a.m. today, is thought to have started from an overheated stove in the cabin.

The cabin is located behind the home of Nelson's cousin, Floyd Ward. Ward's house also caught fire and burned.

It was feared for some time that fire would spread to the adjoining homes of John Coale and Vaughn Johnson. Everything was moved out of the Johnson house. Neighbors rigged up hoses and were about to wet the house down when a fuse in a nearby transformer blew out and no water was then available.

Luckily, at that moment, a fire truck from the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. arrived on the scene and managed to save the house. The truck had come from 10 miles away. The closer Glendale Volunteer Fire Dept. truck could not be sent out because the addition is not in the fire district.

Nothing was saved in the Nelson cabin, but considerable furniture and personal belongings were carried out of the Ward home. Living in the Ward house were Ward, his wife and seven children. The oldest child is in the eighth grade. Four are not of school age yet.

Members of both families are now staying with relatives.

Neither house was insured, and neither of the men of the families was employed at the time of the fire. No one was injured as a direct result of the fire, but Ward, who has been unable to work for the last two years because of a severe back injury, received medical attention for shock.

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Dissolutionists Reject Green Dist. Committee

The Green Sanitary District board of directors Monday night suggested formation of a committee to "obtain better understanding of the sanitary conditions of the district" but the plan was rejected by the opposition in the beleaguered district.

The plan called for a committee of six, three to be selected from the group seeking dissolution and three from those opposed to dissolution. A seventh person would be selected to serve on the board from outside the district, according to board President Warren Engdahl.

The suggestion was presented to the dissolutionists for study. However, they rejected it. The group for dissolution then presented a letter to the board requesting that the board dissolve the district and make it impossible for a new district to be formed for five years, Engdahl said.

Attorney Ed Murphy said the board can call an election to dissolve without petition, but it cannot agree to dissolve the district.

W-D Fire Chief Says Department Not Inspecting

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Morton Tompkins, Farm Leader, Dies

SALEM — Morton Tompkins, whose voice was a power in Oregon agriculture and resources development for nearly a quarter century, died here Tuesday. He was 71 and had been ill for a long time.

He was a member of the State House of Representatives in the 1929 and 1931 sessions; was a member of the first advisory committee of the Oregon State Department of Agriculture, appointed in 1931; was a vigorous advocate of public power; and was state master of the Grange from 1942 to 1950.

After his first legislative session the Oregon Voter called him an "alert, sincere and capable exponent of rural taxpayers' viewpoint."

His strong support of a Columbia Valley Authority for river development frequently carried him into controversy with more conservative elements.

Oregon Today Observes State's 97th Birthday

This is not only Valentine's day in Oregon—it's the state's 97th birthday.

On Feb. 14, 1859, President James Buchanan signed the bill that gave Oregon statehood. It took about a month for the word to reach the new state.

The principal observance will be in the schools, where teachers will tell children how Oregon became the Valentine State.
