New Storm Brews At UW Over Athletic Director Pick

SEATTLE (AP)—Its search for a director of athletics at an end the University of Washington turned Thursday to the problem of finding a new football coach—a problem aggravated by hints of new trouble brewing on the controversy-riddled campus.

Ending a week of speculation, the university Wednesday hired George C. Briggs Jr., 31, to replace Harvey Cassill, who resigned last week after a campus and alumni furor over his firing of Coach Johnny Cherberg.

Briggs, assistant director of athletics at the University of California, since 1953, was recommended to the Student Board of Control by H. P. Everest, university vice president, and unanimously approved by the board.

After Briggs had accepted, Dr. Henry Schmitz, university president, pledged his "complete support" and in a statement said he hoped the appointment "ends for good... the recent football controversy" which started with a "players' rebellion" last November.

There were signs, however, the new athletic director might be heading into a new storm. Before the student board meet-

ing Wednesday, a group of alumni called on Schmitz to present their recommendations for Cassill's successor. The list did not include Briggs.

After the conference, spokesmen for the group said they planned to circulate petitions calling for the dismissal of Everest.

The university has been the scene of recurring turmoil since last November when a group of players called on Cassill to protest against what they called Cherberg's "tyrannical" coaching methods.

Cassill backed Cherberg who later was conditionally rehired by the Board of Regents. Last month after a new lineup Cassill fired Cherberg and last week, in the middle of a ruckus over the firing, Cassill resigned.

Existence of a "downtown fund" supported by alumni and businessmen for needy athletes came to light during the latest row.

Briggs, in accepting the new job, said at Berkeley his first duty would be to "seek out and recommend" a new coach to replace Cherberg, but he said he had no one in mind.

The man most frequently mentioned for the post is Joe Kuharich, coach of the professional Washington Redskins.

Since the firing of Cherberg, Seattle and Spokane newspapers have listed Kuharich as the "probable" No. 1 choice. The Spokane Chronicle said Wednesday Cassill reached a verbal agreement with the Redskin coach before he resigned.

However, Cassill has not confirmed the report; Kuharich has denied having any contact with the university, and Briggs said Wednesday night:

"So far as I know there has been no commitment to Kuharich or to anyone else."

Briggs said he will move here from Berkeley to take over his new assignment in mid-March.

Paulson, Wilkinson, McAllister Lead Shoot

Dean Paulson, James Wilkinson and Lewis McAllister led Wednesday night's Roseburg Rifle Club shoot in three classes.

Paulson fired a 84 for high expert, Robinson had a 376 for high sharpshooter, and McAllister scored 356 for high marksman.

Other high scoring included Paul Robinson 376 and Bill Jones 374 in the expert class, Pete Serafin 376 and Garland Hartman 375 in the sharpshooter class and Lee Eaton 342 and Gene Arthur 325 in the marksman class.

Shooters next week in the Oregon-California Winter League will be Paulson, Wilkinson, Don Krogel, Serafin, Robinson and Hartman.

The local club won its first match in four by outscoring Scotts Valley, Ore. 15-13-1481. Paulson fired high gun for Roseburg with a 383. In a fourth match the Roseburg club lost to Coos Bay 1526-1521.

No complete standings have been yet made available, but the local team has a 1-3 record with four matches unreported and two more matches left to go.

Seattle U Ace Regains Lead

SEATTLE (AP)—The High Guy of Seattle U. was back on top in the Northwest collegiate scoring picture this week, regaining the lead in his duel with Jimmy Winters of Portland U. for the front spot in the region's basketball sun.

Dick Stricklin, Seattle's 6 foot 7 inch center, ran his total to 447 points to lead the 5-9 Winters by a meager 4. Stricklin's average of 21.3 per game also was high for the region.

Three players had topped the 400-point mark when the books closed for the week Saturday. The third is Bill Hollingsworth of Southern Oregon College, who built his total to 418.

It took 268 points for a player to land in the Top Ten. Marv Adams of Whitworth grabbed 10th position.

Two little fellas were in fourth and fifth places, Loren Anderson of Seattle Pacific with 399 points and Cal Bauer of Seattle U. with 391.

No report was received this week on Ted Schadewitz but the Eastern Oregon College ace held sixth on the basis of his previous week's total of 384.

Next in line were Lloyd Hoffine of Southern Oregon, Bill Machamer of Linfield and Dave Gambee of Oregon State. Idleness last week dropped Gambee from second to ninth. The leaders:

St. Francis Of Brooklyn Remains Unbeaten

Is St. Francis of Brooklyn really one of the neglected giants of college basketball? Or are the Terriers, rated No. 13 in this week's Associated Press poll, simply pulling a fast one by knocking off a few "big names" which aren't what they used to be?

The Terriers barged past Brooklyn College 94-74 last night—giving them 192 points within 24 hours—and stretched their unbeaten string to 18 games. NIT-bound St. Francis and San Francisco are the only major unbeaten teams.

Some were ready to rank the Terriers right behind top-rated San Francisco—nursing a record major college winning streak of 45 games after watching St. Francis wallop Manhattan, a so-so contender for the postseason berth, 98-73 Tuesday night.

Compared To Russell

And some New York observers, maybe a little eager to end the famine of standout local players and their scores, were even comparing the Terriers' 6-7 Al Inniss favorably with the Dons' All America Bill Russell.

Inniss, a sophomore, took the reins in stride against Brooklyn College and came down with 37 rebounds, a Terrier record, while scoring 17 points. Capt. Dan Mannix, a 6-1 senior, was tops with 23 points.

The Terriers, whose only "name" victims have been St. John's, Seton Hall and Manhattan, have three regular season games left—against tourney hopeful St. Joseph's (Pa.) Saturday and Iona and Siena next week.
