Most Important Significance Of UF Drive Pointed Out

The featured speaker at the annual Central Douglas United Fund dinner pointed out a significance of the UF drive which is often overlooked, but which he believes is the most important of all.

Dr. William Jones said the important thing about a United Fund is not the size of the budget, the cleverness with which a drive is organized or whether a goal is achieved. "The real significance is ultimately that it's the only venture in the community in which all citizens... give expression of the faith by which we live."

Dr. Jones, who is dean of administration at the University of Oregon, earlier noted that the primary element of the credo by which Americans live is "affirmation that human personality is the

most valuable thing in the world."

The belief that we should develop and conserve human personality on a fraternal, brotherly love basis is an adjunct to that.

The mid-looking, but lively speaker said that to "build for ourselves a faith, a credo..." is the way individuals can make a contribution to the welfare of a world.

A dinner session such as he addressed is a good place "to renew the faith by which we live," he concluded.

The former Whittier College president substituted for Dr. Elmo Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College, who could not be present to speak because of illness.

Dr. Jones was introduced by UF President Elmer G. Baldwin. Newby elected president Louis Fuller was not present.

Long-Bell Lumber Co. Offers Wage Increase

A contract between Long - Bell Lumber Co. and Local 140 of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO), gives employees in the Bridge mill and woods operation a 4 1/2 per cent wage increase retroactive to Dec. 1.

Other mills employing CIO labor in the area are expected to follow suit, according to the Port Umpqua Courier, Reedsport.

Meanwhile, negotiations between the Gardiner and E. K. Woods sawmills and Local 2624 of Lumber & Sawmill Workers (AFL) are at a standstill.

The employers have offered an hourly wage increase of 8 1/2 cents an hour, which the union has declined. Instead, it has demanded terms won by the CIO union.

Marines Cling Today To Suribachi's Slopes

TWO JIMA (AP) — U.S. Marines today clung to Mt. Suribachi's steep slopes under intense "enemy" fire — 24 hours after they stormed onto Iwo Jima's black sand beaches in the shadow of mock atomic bomb blasts.

War game umpires said shock troops of the 1st Battalion of the 2nd Marine Regiment would be pinned down for hours until reinforcements could reach them.

More than 9,000 men of the 3rd Marine Division were "fighting" across the narrow southern portion of pork-chop-shaped Iwo. In what the Navy termed a massive atomic age amphibious training maneuver.

State Department Under Squeeze On Arms Shipment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department found itself under heavy pressure from all sides today because of its White House-approved action in embargoing all shipments of arms and military equipment to the Middle East.

There are the pressures: 1. Saudi Arabia was urging that the government "soon find a way" of delivering 18 Walker Bulldog tanks which were caught at the port in New York early yesterday when the embargo was imposed.

2. An Israeli Embassy spokesman said his government "a little point" in imposing a general embargo in order to stop the tank shipment to Saudi Arabia because, he argued, the result could be gained by suspending that shipment alone. About \$10,000 of scheduled shipments to Israel are affected, he said.

3. A Senate investigation of the whole tangled affair was demanded by Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. George said he wants an explanation from Secretary of State Dulles when he returns from a Bahamas vacation.

Benson Urges Early Passage Of Farm Measure

DES MOINES (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson declared to an audience in the heart of the corn belt, "The challenge before us is to get the Eisenhower administration farm program passed quickly."

The job must be done, he told more than 1,000 persons attending the National Farm Institute, "in time to go into effect this year, to alleviate farm distress, attack the surplus problem, and improve the farmer's income."

Outside anti-Benson pickets marched up and down carrying critical signs.

Earlier at a news conference, Benson said he believes the President will run for a second term, and added: "I'll be perfectly willing for him to have another secretary of agriculture."

Benson expressed pleasure that the Senate Agriculture Committee approved the President's soil bank plan. He described it as "the heart of the administration's new provisions for a broadened farm program."

Private funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Roses Monday at 11 a.m. The Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church of Roseburg will officiate. In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that donations be given to the cancer fund. Donations may be left at the Chapel of the Roses or at the post office.

'Study, Survey' Ordered At Washington U.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — The Legislative Council's executive committee Saturday ordered a "study and survey" of the athletic administration at the University of Washington.

The Council's subcommittee on education, headed by State Sen. William A. Glassberg of Marysville, was assigned the study. Glassberg, a lawyer, was a basketball star at the university.

The executive committee, which held preliminary hearings on the recent football controversy at Washington, backed away from a full-scale investigation, with witnesses called to testify under oath.

Reds Challenge Premier In Greek Vote Sunday

ATHENS (AP) — A coalition of seven opposition parties ranging from right wing to Red challenges the government of Premier Constantine Karamanlis Sunday in nationwide elections.

The coalition, called the Democratic Union, charges that Karamanlis is a puppet of Britain and the United States.

Shubert Ordered To Sell Twelve Large Theaters

NEW YORK (AP)—Showman Jacob J. Shubert and associates have bowed to a government anti-trust suit and agreed to ring down the curtain on their ownership of 12 theaters in six cities.

They have also consented to give up their theatrical booking business. They have two years to sell the theaters and the booking enterprises.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman signed the consent judgment yesterday ending the government's six-year suit against the Shubert Theatrical empire.

The government launched its suit in February 1950. Shubert and co-defendants were charged with restraining and monopolizing trade in the production, booking and presentation of legitimate attractions in the United States in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act.

Named as defendants with Shubert was his brother, the late Lee Shubert; Marcus Heiman; United Booking Office, Inc.; Select Theater Corp.; and L. A. B. Theatremont Corp.

The Shuberts had 40 theaters unofficially valued at 40 million dollars when the suit started.

Two Air Force Officers Stage Revolt In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Two Air Force officers launched a rebellion Saturday in a remote area of Northern Brazil, apparently aiming a handful of troops and indians to their cause.

Planes and troops were mobilized in the northern states to put down the challenge to the government of President Juscelino Kubitschek, inaugurated Jan. 31. There were no unusual troop movements or tension in Rio de Janeiro.

This was the account of the uprising by official sources.

Major Haroldo Coimbra Veloso and Capt. Jose Chavez Lameiras flew from here, landing at the remote Jacareacanga emergency field in the southern part of Para State. They took three other emergency fields and arrested an Air Force major who was leading a score of soldiers to apprehend the rebels. There were indications the soldiers may have joined the rebels.

The rebels flew north and seized the airfield at Santarem, a town of 15,000 in the Tapajoz River some 450 miles west of Belem, Para's capital.

has had two years theological study with a Bible institute, in addition to 10 years formal schooling. He said he had found that "God is real" while serving time in South Dakota.

He freely admitted a long record, but pointed out that he had stayed out of serious trouble since released from prison in South Dakota in 1950, up to the time he cashed the check.

His first felony conviction was at the age of 18. Two years later he was convicted of grand theft and escape in California; four years after that he passed a bum check in South Dakota. He violated parole and had to go back until November 1950.

The ex-convict of several well-known prisons said there is "no cure in prison." Prisons are "for punishment only."

The judge conceded that that may be true, but pointed out that one reason for sending one person to prison is to deter another from committing a similar offense.

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — An automobile collision on an icy highway killed a couple from Quincy, Wash., and injured two students Friday.

Leslie Cook, 68, and his wife Norma, of Quincy, were killed in the wreck 20 miles south of Klamath Falls.

Ron Hart, 22, Eugene, and John Lee Gregory, about 16, Headsburg, Calif., students at Klamath Falls, were hospitalized here. Hart's address is 15 N. Adams St., Eugene.

House Committee Approves Sharp Increase In Funds For National Park Facilities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Foreseeing a steady rise in the popularity of national parks, the House Appropriations Committee Friday voted a sharp increase in funds to improve park facilities.

Reporting its version of the annual Interior Department appropriation bill scheduled for a House vote next week, the committee recommended spending 15 million dollars for construction of physical facilities in national parks.

President Eisenhower had requested only \$5,200,000 for this purpose in his original budget. He added another \$8,250,000 to that in a special request Feb. 2, saying the money was needed to start a 10-year program of improvements.

The committee, approving more even than Eisenhower's enlarged request, cited an increase of about two million persons annually in the number of visitors to the parks, with 54 million people expected to visit them next year.

The committee also approved an increase of \$470,000 in funds for the Forest Service to step up the program for sanitation and care of public campgrounds in forest areas.

The Park and Forest Service funds were included in a bill appropriating \$415,963,200 to finance the Interior Department and related agencies for the fiscal year starting July 1. Most of the money is for use of the Interior Department.

The total was \$10,785,000, or 2 1/2 per cent, less than Eisenhower requested but \$79,067,573 more than Congress appropriated for the current year.

Largest allotment in the bill was \$83,000,000 for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. This was \$3,600,000 less than the President sought. It does not include tribal funds administered by the bureau.

The Bureau of Mines was allotted \$21,697,500, a cut of two million dollars.

The National Park Service would get \$67,688,000.

For the Fish and Wildlife Service the committee earmarked \$17,813,500, the full amount requested. It made no cut in the \$96,773,000 requested for the Forest Service.

38 Marines Perish In Crash Of Huge Plane

21 miles — 9 minutes — from a landing at Alameda Naval Air Station on a flight from El Toro and Camp Pendleton Marine Bases in Southern California.

The RD5, Marine equivalent of the DC4, carried five crewmen. The others, clad in dungarees, were being transferred to Treasure Island Navy Base for reassignment. One passenger was from El Toro; the others from Camp Pendleton.

The pilot was Maj. Alexander Watson, 32, of Santa Ana, Calif., a Silver Star winner in the Korean War.

Major Watson's last report was at 1:15 p.m., notifying Oakland Municipal Airport he was starting an approach toward the nearby naval air station.

The fog and mist was so heavy helicopters failed for hours to find the wreckage 1,300 feet up in the dense brush country 3 1/2 miles from Niles on the eastern side of San Francisco Bay.

The area has claimed 123 lives in three major plane crashes within 4 1/2 years. Besides the 38 killed in this accident, 35 were killed March 20, 1951, in a Transocean Air Lines DC4 and another 30 died Aug. 25, 1951, in a United Air Lines DC8B.

In another air accident yesterday at Owensboro, Ky., the worst injury was a broken rib when an Eastern air lines plane missed a runway, sheared off a wing and somersaulted onto its back with 20 passengers and 3 crewmen.
