

Ellsworth, Neuberger, Morse At Odds Over What Issues They're Willing To Debate

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposal by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) for a bill to "partner" the construction of Green Peter and Cougar dams got a "wait until the campaign" reply Saturday from Sen. Morse (D-Ore.).

At the same time, Ellsworth rejected a challenge by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) for a series of debates covering both the pending bill which would authorize local interests to join the government in building and operating the two Oregon dams—and the Al Sarena mining controversy.

Ellsworth had proposed that he and Morse meet "in more or less formal debate" on the dam bill in Eugene and Albany, Ore., during the March 29-April 8 period when Congress will be in Easter recess.

He said he felt it "timely and appropriate for us to appear on the same platform... so that the people of Oregon, and especially those in the areas concerned, can hear clearly and sharply stated the arguments for and against this legislation."

Morse, who opposes the bill as a "giveaway," told a newspaper that he "will be delighted to debate Mr. Ellsworth when the campaign is on but I have no intention of diverting my energies and time in any debate while Congress is in session."

He said Ellsworth "should be doing everything possible to help (Rep.) Edith Green, Dick Neuberger and myself get the maximum appropriations possible for the building of Cougar Dam, Green Peter, Hills Creek and other much needed projects in our state as federal projects rather than partnership giveaways to selfish interests as he proposes."

"When the campaign is on," he added, "I intend to make clear to the voters of his district his sorry record in betraying the public interest in our natural resources which is exactly what he proposes to do with his sick partnership scheme."

The debate proposal originated two weeks ago when Neuberger challenged Ellsworth to meet him on the question of whether the Interior Department's grant of 15 mining patents in the Rogue River National Forest of Oregon to Al Sarena Mines Inc. was in the public interest.

Adenauer's Man Loses In Ruhr Valley Vote

DUESSELDORF, Germany (AP)—Chancellor Adenauer suffered a sharp political defeat Monday. His party was ousted from power in the booming Ruhr Valley state of North Rhine-Westphalia.

One of Adenauer's top lieutenants, State Premier Karl Arnold, was voted from his job by an unusual coalition of right-wing and leftist political parties in the bustling Ruhr. Arnold, one of the founders of Adenauer's Christian Democratic Union, was replaced as premier by a Socialist, Fritz Schnhoff.

The change in the government of North Rhine-Westphalia means that Adenauer's strength in the upper house of the West German Federal Parliament will be sharply reduced. It may mean the chancellor will be unable to carry out some of his plans for West German rearmament.

Bar Assn. Unit Opposes Trial TV, Broadcasting

CHICAGO (AP)—Opposition to photographing, broadcasting or televising court trials was reaffirmed by the American Bar Assn.'s Council of the section of judicial administration.

The group recommended adherence to canon 35 of the code of judicial ethics which holds that judges should not allow such activities.

The action was unanimous in the light of current proposals to admit cameras, radio and TV equipment to courtrooms, the chairman of the council said.

In another accident, Robert Henry Kralicek, 34, Myrtle Point, lost control of his car as he started to pass a truck near the Roseburg Lumber Co. plant at Dillard, police said.

The Kralicek car skidded into the rear of one driven by Johnnie Ernest Glover, Rt. 1 Box 888, Roseburg. The Glover car was swung around, and Kralicek's ended up in some brush along the highway.

Victims Recovering

Two men injured in an accident Friday night in the Glendale area are reported recovering satisfactorily. Vern Newton, a passenger, is still in Forest Glen Hospital, Canyonville, with a 10-inch scalp laceration and compound fracture of an arm.

The driver of the car, Gaylord Bricey, who lives on Starveout Road near Azalea, was released after treatment for a broken nose and lacerations and contusions.

Mrs. G. B. Fox, Glendale correspondent, said the accident occurred on the snow-slicked Glendale road about three miles east of Glendale near the George Miller residence. The car skidded off the road and hit an oak tree. The men were treated at Glendale Clinic, then taken to Canyonville.

Earlier Saturday, a car skidded on a slick bridge, hurtled out of control, and plumed over an embankment north of Monmouth, on Highway 99-W.

Paul Lee, about 23, Corvallis, the driver, was killed when he was thrown clear and the car rolled on him.

Patricia DeWitt, 24, Salem, a passenger, was taken to a Salem hospital with injuries.

The Army took on some of the aspects of a battlefield as Guardsmen demonstrated a small-caliber mortar.

Guardsmen fired two training rounds from the mortar. One struck the Armory roof and exploded, setting part of a fireproof ceiling afire. The second failed to explode and got stuck in the rafters.

Firemen were called to put out the fire, raising a long ladder to reach the 24-foot ceiling.

After they had taken care of the flames, one of the firemen prodded at the lodged mortar with a pike pole. It fell to the floor and exploded, startling one fireman so that he fell a short distance from the ladder.

The unit commander, Capt. Horace Pendergrass, explained that both shots went awry. The charges in the noses of the short-range training rounds are about the size of .22 caliber shells.

No casualties were marked up from the series of incidents.
