Vets' Employment Clinic Scheduled Here March 19

A veterans' employment clinic will be held in Roseburg on March 19, according to Don Frear, Douglas County veterans' service officer.

The clinic, one of several scheduled in Oregon, will be conducted by the U. S. Civil Service Commission in cooperation with the major veterans' organizations and eight federal and state agencies.

The clinic will be headed by George A. Reid, Seattle, regional veterans' federal employment representative. He will advise on job opportunities and examination qualifications, as well as rights and benefits of veterans' preference in federal employment.

Information also will be given by representatives of the following agencies: Veterans Administration, State Dept. of Veterans Affairs, the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Physically Handicapped, U. S. Dept. of Labor, State Employment Service and the Bureau of Veterans Re-employment Rights.

The evening meeting will be in the Veterans Memorial Building on Garden Valley Road.
