His proficiency on the horn was quickly recognized. During his junior year at the university he was heard in recital. He played with the college band and orchestra.

Following graduation, Garrett taught school in Echo, where he directed the music program for the Eastern Oregon school. While there, he traveled weekly to Walla Walla, Wash., to play with the City Symphony.

In the spring of 1954, he appeared as solo artist with them.

Continuing his music study, Garrett earned his master's degree at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor last spring. Young, 25, he came to Roseburg last fall. His wife, whom he met in Michigan, teaches music at Central Junior High.

County musical experts consider him an outstanding French horn artist, according to symphony Director Wendell Johnson.

This week, Garrett explained that the French horn was once considered a crude "hunting horn." It originally was used to announce the start of the animal chase in early days. The modern instrument has a liquid clear tone which sounds like the outdoors, Garrett continued.

He believes the concerto selected by the symphony players is "the best of the four written by Mozart."

Eligibility Rules For Voters Set Forth; April 17 Last Day To Register For Primaries

Registration of voters for the May 18 primary election will continue through April 17, according to County Clerk Charles Doerner. The clerk's office in the county courthouse will register voters until 8 p.m. on that date; registrars outside the office will be available until the close of regular business that day.

To vote in the primary and general elections a person must be a U.S. citizen and a qualified elector of the state.

Anyone may become an elector, by registering to vote, if he is at least 21 years old, is able to read and write the English language, and who has conducted his residence in Oregon, and has not been deprived of his political rights because of a judgment entered against him for having committed a felony.

Open Bible Standard Superintendent To Speak

The superintendent of the Oregon district for Open Bible Standard Churches will speak in Riddle Tuesday night.

He is the Rev. Harry Strachan, pastor of Klamath Temple in Klamath Falls. The Rev. Mr. Strachan will speak publicly at the Church of the Open Bible, starting at 7:30 p.m., according to Riddle Pastor Novis Thompson.

He will be in Roseburg Wednesday to attend an Oregon District fellowship rally.

Doerner especially stressed the last qualification: A person who has been convicted of a felony (punishable by a penitentiary sentence) should not attempt to register or to vote until such time as his political privileges have been restored.

Law Reviewed

According to law, persons losing electoral privileges through commission of a felony may have their rights restored by the following procedure: "At the end of one year after full satisfaction of a judgment based upon conviction of a felony, the convicted person who has forfeited his privileges as an elector by reason of the conviction and who has conducted his residence in Oregon as a good law abiding citizen may apply in writing to the governor of the State of Oregon for the restoration of privileges of an elector. The application shall be filed by the applicant with the State Board of Parole and Probation."

All persons registering to vote subscribe under heavy penalty of law that they are qualified electors, Doerner reminded, and if their privileges as an elector have been forfeited they should not try to

unless their privileges have been restored.

Special Registration

For persons who will become 21 years of age or who will have completed six months residence between April 17 and May 18 a special 30-day period is set up for them prior to April 17 in which they should register.

Persons who have had street number and name changes, either by the City of Roseburg or the county planning commission, need not re-register unless they have actually moved from one place to another.

Most changes already have been reported to clerk's office. Those not reported will be corrected after the primary election when the pool books containing signatures and corrected addresses are available to the clerk's office.

Douglas County citizens who are not registered to vote in the May 18 primary should sign up with an official registrar by April 17, according to County Clerk Charles Doerner.

Besides the clerk's office in the courthouse, citizens may register with Opal Ireland at the Labor Temple or with Alda Hartfield, 1363 W. Harvard Ave.
