Flood Waters Cut Attendance At Report Meet

Flood waters cut attendance at the annual report meeting of the Southern Oregon Production Credit Assn. to 40 Tuesday at Riverside Grange. Those who braved the weather learned the association's total net worth for 1955 was \$129,264.

The Dec. 31, 1955 financial statement lists assets of \$2,007,328 and debts of \$1,577,964. Expenses were \$70,983 plus a \$5,242 provision for losses and estimated losses. Association income totaled \$93,877, with net earnings coming to \$17,652.

Melvin J. Lattie, Medford, a director of SOPCA, read the 32nd annual report. He said the earning increase was approximately \$7,000 better than 1954.

Lattie said the association made 431 loans for a total of \$2,875,393 in 1955. This compared to 419 loans for \$1,981,385 in 1954.

Prior to the financial report, Paul Matson, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane, outlined the work of his bank. He noted "unless the credit is helpful to you and the association, there is little use in granting it." He commended the work of the SOPCA directors.

Before ending the session (being conducted in the chill of an unheated room because electrical power had gone off), Lattie said the association hopes to have a home building in Medford completed in midsummer. It will belong to SOPCA. He added that credit life insurance, made available to members two months ago, was "being accepted quickly by most members." It is not compulsory. The cost, Lattie said, was \$100 for \$10,000 loan.

Arrangements for the meeting were handled by Ralph Arensmeier, Roseburg, field representative and assistant secretary-treasurer of the association. The SOPCA meets in Roseburg, Coquille and Medford each year in annual session. Wednesday the report is given in Medford. Two men have been nominated for a single directorship. They are Lattie and Leslie Phillips. Results will be announced later by Arensmeier.

Trico Timber Co. Enters High Bid

Trico Timber Co. of Dillard was high bidder on \$2,000 board feet of Umpqua National Forest timber 41 miles east of Roseburg this week.

The timber was appraised at \$2,216 and sold for \$2,824. The 80,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine was appraised at \$27.40 per thousand board feet. Trico paid \$32.50 per thousand. The 2,000 board feet of hemlock and other species sold for the appraised price of \$12 per thousand.

Youngs Bay Lumber Co. of Roseburg was the only other bidder.

BILL INTRODUCED
WASHINGTON, D.C.—A bill which would authorize \$653,000 for the Juniper division of the Wapinitia Reclamation Project in Oregon was passed Monday by the House and sent to the Senate.

The project would regulate the flow of Clear Creek and provide supplemental water for 2,108 Juniper Flat acres.

Smith River Road Improvement Set By County Court

Farm people living along the Lower Smith River Road have been promised a hand by the Douglas County Court in getting their road in a condition where it can be used safely by both school buses and logging trucks.

The increase of logging traffic resulted because of the first sales in the Smith River salvage program in the area of the new access road system.

It's to the point now where logging trucks pose a danger to loaded school buses using the 14-mile stretch of county road from Gardiner east to where the access road system begins, according to County Judge Carl C. Hill.

He and Commissioner Frank Ashley were interviewed recently in a meeting with the Lower Smith River people in the Smith River Grange.

Hill said a county survey crew already is in the area staking out improvements to the roads. It's the county's plan to both widen sections of the road and cut down some of the sharp, blind turns.

Hill said the improvements had been on the county road program for some time, but the logging traffic increase had "brought on" the problem faster than had been anticipated.

No improvements are contemplated immediately to the Gardiner Hill section of the road, a paved piece winding for about three miles over the steep hill separating the lower Smith River country geographically from the coast.

Jury Awards Payments On Disability Claim

An award of compensation for permanent partial disability equal to 80 per cent loss of use of an arm was made to Ralph E. Heckman in a Douglas County Circuit Court jury verdict Tuesday.

Heckman sought an award of 100 per cent from the State Industrial Accident Commission. The commission previously approved a 20 per cent award.

The compensation is for back injuries Heckman received March 11, 1954, while an employee of Gardiner Lumber Co. He slipped and fell on snow and ice while blocking for a lumber stacker.
