Arms Shipment Quiz Unanswered

WASHINGTON (AP)—Testimony by Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr. left unexplained today details of last week's midnight decision to embargo arms shipments to the Middle East.

The order suspended temporarily the delivery of 18 tanks to Saudi Arabia, but the shipment was allowed to proceed when the ban was lifted 43 hours later. Hoover was questioned about it Friday by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The key question which had been kicking around Washington since the embargo was imposed was, who initiated the action. There had been reports in the State Department that the initial step was taken by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty at President Eisenhower's vacation headquarters at Thomasville, Ga. It was understood on good authority that following disclosure of the tank shipment Hagerty had telephoned Hoover and suggested stopping it while the whole issue was re-examined.

Longtime Resident Of Yoncalla Passes

Bertram G. Cutlach, Rt. 1, Yoncalla, longtime resident of Douglas County, died Thursday at the age of 81.

Born in England, Feb. 14, 1875, he came to the United States with his parents in 1883. They settled in the area east of Yoncalla. He had resided there ever since. He was preceded in death by his two brothers, Harry and Percy. He had never married. Survivors include several cousins in the U.S.A. and England.

Funeral services will be held at the Yoncalla Methodist Church Wednesday at 2 p.m. The Rev. Mr. R. W. Knight will officiate. Vault interment will follow in the Yoncalla Cemetery. Mills Funeral Service of Drain is in charge of arrangements.

Russian Congress Officially Ends, Adopts Directive

MOSCOW (AP)—The 20th congress of the Communist party ended Saturday after adopting a directive for the Soviet Union's new five-year plan and electing a new central committee.

The man who had dominated the 11-day session, party chief Nikita Khrushchev, was in the chair for the final session and it was he who formally declared the congress over.

The five-year plan directive provides for a massive increase in the output of heavy industry during the coming five years. The frequently stated object of the Soviet leadership is to overtake and surpass the United States in industrial development.

The list of members of the new central committee, which replaces that elected while Stalin was still alive at the 16th party congress in Oct. 1952, was not published immediately.

The congress approved resolutions endorsing collective rule for the Soviet Union, applauding party boss Khrushchev's foreign relations program and okaying—without unspecified reservations—the new five-year plan.

French Authorities Say Force Kills 27 Rebels

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP)—French authorities reported Saturday a hard-hitting helicopter task force swept down on a Nationalist band in the mountains and killed 27 rebels and captured 47 in a violent fight.

The task force also captured 13 submachineguns, about 60 hand rifles and an "important stock" of explosives.

In the rebel-infested Constantine area, a small rebel band set up a hasty roadblock Friday and massacred eight French civilians, including two women and a 7-year-old girl. The incident took place south of Algiers on the road to Tablat.

Frozen Europe Begins To Thaw

LONDON (AP)—Frozen Europe began to thaw out from the edges today as sunny spells melted snows in Italy and southern France.

But great areas of the Continent remained congealed under "dying blizzard blasts from Siberia." Giant snowdrifts reared across the Iberian Peninsula stalling trains and knocking out power lines.

Known deaths in the 26-day deep freeze mounted to 842 amid warning signs the thaw might prove almost as disastrous as the freeze. Rescue teams in France and Italy swapped snowshovels for sandbags as rivers swollen by melting snows threatened villages and farms.

A creeping landslide at Vasto, Italy, continued to engulf the community as streams of slush poured down the mountainside. Four hundred villagers were homeless. Others were being evacuated.

Springlike sunshine returned to most of the Mediterranean area with temperatures reaching 56 degrees in Rome and 59 in Marseille. Inland the thaw was slower in arriving.

Christmas Comes Late To Yuba City

YUBA CITY, Calif. (AP)—Two Santas are here today to give the children of this flood-ravaged town some of the belated cheer, and presents, they missed when they had to flee the day before Christmas.

About 1:30 a.m. Dec. 24 a Feather River levee broke at nearby Shanghai Bend, letting in a wall of water which smashed hundreds of houses and flooded almost the entire town of 12,000.

There wasn't much warning and when the waters finally went down 39 dead were found, some in automobiles silted over their tops. Sixteen thousand acres of farm land south of town are still inundated.

"Santa Claus rudely awakened," headlined the town weekly as the two jolly fellows in red appeared Friday to start the gift-giving at a carnival on the Main St.

One asked which of the squealing children had been good and which had been little monsters.

But it was Gov. Goodwin J. Knight who got the greatest applause. That was when he told the several thousand people gathered in the cool spring sunshine the state must build a giant dam on the river to control future floods.

Graham Waives Sanity Hearing

DENVER (AP)—With two words, John Gilbert Graham Friday waived a sanity hearing and asked to stand trial on his plea of innocent to a murder charge.

Asked if he assented to a defense petition asking withdrawal of an earlier plea of innocent by reason of insanity, Graham muttered: "Yes, sir."

The 24-year-old father of two was ordered to trial April 16. He is accused of murdering his mother, Mrs. Daisie E. King, 54, one of 44 persons who perished Nov. 1 when a dynamite bomb exploded aboard a United Air Lines plane near Longmont, Colo.

Graham had been scheduled for trial March 5 to determine whether he was sane at the time of the crime. At his request defense lawyers asked that his insanity plea be withdrawn.

32 Killed, 40 Seriously Injured In Train Wreck

BERLIN (AP)—At least 32 persons were killed and 40 seriously injured in a train wreck Saturday in Saxony, Communist East Germany, APN, the official East German news agency reported.

The news agency said the accident occurred near the railroad station at Bornitz between Riesa and Oschatz, 100 miles south of Berlin.

A fast freight train, drawn by two locomotives, slammed into the side of an express passenger train coming from Dresden, the agency added, and all three locomotives were derailed.

SUB FOUND SAFE

LONDON (AP)—The Admiralty Friday called off a search for the British submarine Acheron, sighted safe in gale-swept Arctic seas after being feared lost for nearly six hours.

Communists Refuse To Account For Prisoners Of War

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP)—The Communist side of the Military Armistice Commission Saturday refused to account for 2,720 missing Korean War prisoners, including 450 Americans.

It returned the list of names presented by the United Nations Command (UNC) last Nov. 26 and said, "We are not responsible for them."

Rear Adm. Walter E. Moore, senior UNC representative, angrily termed the reply "not satisfactory."

Earlier the Communists charged the UNC was trying to make "ineffective and useless" the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC). The four-nation body polices the Korean Armistice. The Reds also suggested all foreign troops be withdrawn to speed unification of Korea.

The UNC indicated last November there was little hope any of the missing 2,720 men were still alive. Moore said at the time:

"What we want is names, ranks, serial numbers, notification of deaths and of the whereabouts of bodies of those reported dead."

The name of U. S. Air Force Capt. James A. Van Fleet Jr., son of the former U. S. 8th Army commander in Korea, was included.

The Americans were made up of 24 soldiers, 190 airmen, 13 Marines, three naval men. The others were all South Koreans except 46 members of United Nations units that fought in Korea.

Crippled Globemaster Lands Safely In Iceland

LONDON (AP)—Rescue planes shepherded a crippled U. S. Air Force Globemaster to a safe landing in Iceland Saturday after two dead engines nearly forced her pilot to ditch in the Atlantic.

The U. S. Air Force reported that all 16 airmen aboard were safe as the big four-engine transport landed at the Air Force base at Keflavik.

The plane was en route from Goose Bay, Labrador, to Prestwick, Scotland, when the grim two-hour battle with failing engines began about 600 miles west of Iceland.

Air-sea rescue planes were dispatched from Keflavik after the pilot radioed he was losing altitude and was considering ditching in the sea.

Later the pilot messaged he was managing to nurse the craft along on the two remaining engines.

Roseburg Postal Employee, 42, Dies

Walter Lloyd Rorer, 42, resident of 512 NE Parrott St., Roseburg, died today at a Eugene hospital after a short illness.

Rorer was an employee of the U. S. Post Office in Roseburg and was a veteran of World War II. He was born at Roseburg March 29, 1913.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, Umpqua Post 16 of the American Legion, Roseburg Elks, SPEBSQSA.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Jennie Rorer of Roseburg; a brother, Avery L. of Rollins, Mont.; three sisters, Mrs. Lawrence (Carol) Hercher of Dillard, Mrs. Merle (Bernice) Austin of Roseburg and Mrs. Roy (Helen) Peterson of Woodland Hills, Calif.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, Tuesday at 11 a.m. The Rev. Henry Peck of the Melrose Community Church will officiate.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Funeral Home which is in charge of arrangements. Interment will follow the funeral services in Civil Bend Cemetery.

Wilkins added: "Montgomery whites claim not to be able to understand (their) Negroes. We'll, I'll be glad to explain. Their Negroes are sick and tired of segregation, of the insults and mistreatment and daily humiliations. It is that simple. Their cups have run over."
