Huskies Also Beaten To End Title Hopes

The Pacific Northwest's chances of grabbing the Pacific Coast Conference basketball title vanished into the realm of wishful thinking Friday night.

The University of Washington Huskies conceivably could gain at least a share of the title but even under the most strenuous stretch of the imagination it seems remote.

California dashed cold water on the Huskies' ambitions Friday night by whipping Washington, 74-62, at Berkeley.

The unbeaten Bruins, meanwhile, routed Oregon, 95-71, for victory No. 11. In the other two conference games on the schedule, Stanford topped Washington State, 81-76, and Idaho upended Oregon State, 58-55.

Bears In Second
California's victory over Washington was the seventh in a row for the Bears, who now sport a 9-2 record, good for second place. The Bears just had too much scoring punch for the Huskies, with four Californians breaking into the double figures.

Earl Robinson topped the Cal point parade with 18. Bruno Boni got 14 for the Huskies. Cal led at the half, 38-30.

Larry Beck pumped in 36 points for Washington State but his one-on-one effort wasn't enough to boost the Cougars past Stanford's speedy Indians.

The Indians made better than 50 per cent of the field goal attempts. Bill Bond led the Stanford team with 27 points.

Nauls Leads Bruins
Willie (The Whale) Nauls was the Bruins' big scorer against Oregon as he hit for 28 points. His 16 first-half total helped the Bruins to a 44-31 halftime margin.

UCLA sparred with the Ducks for the first few minutes and then kept off. Coach Johnny Wooden pulled his regulars midway through the first period and gave the subs a workout.

Oregon could manage only eight field goals in 31 attempts during the first half. Charlie Franklin got 17 points for the losers.

Idaho used a light defense as the key that opened the door for the Vandals' second victory of the season.

Vandals Lead Early
The Vandals moved in front early in the game and left the floor at the half with a 37-31 advantage. Oregon State climbed back into contention and the two teams battled at close quarters until the final 10 minutes when Idaho clamped on a defense that kept off. Coach Johnny Wooden pulled his regulars midway through the rest of the way.

With Idaho trailing 55-54 with only a minute to go, Gary Simmons popped in a field goal to give the Vandals the lead and they kept the ball under wraps until game's end, allowing Oregon State only two missed field goal attempts.

Dave Gambee got 16 points for OSC and Bill Bauscher got 13 for Idaho.

Riddle 50, Tigers 44
Riddle's Irish moved into a sixth place tie with Days Creek after dropping Canyonville 50-44 Friday night on the Riddle floor.

The Irish led all the way but were forced to stave off numerous Canyonville rallies that came within one point of tying.

The score was tied 44-44 in the opening minutes before Riddle pulled away to a 10-8 quarter lead. Canyonville cut it down to 16-15 in the second period, but fell behind 24-19 at halftime.
