KLAMATH FALLS — Marcelus Norwest, 26-year-old Klamath reservation rancher, was sentenced to 10 years in Oregon state prison Monday for the gun slaying of Jackie Jones, 25, former Eugene divinity student.

The shooting last October climaxed an argument in Chiloquin over a case of beer. Norwest pleaded guilty to manslaughter. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg passed sentence.

Portland Minister To Conduct Services

The Rev. Lester Moore of Portland, Northwest director of World Gospel Mission, will conduct a missionary service at the North Roseburg Church.

Evangelical United Brethren today at 7 p.m. Accompanying the Rev. Mr. Moore will be Jonathan and Barbara Tamplin, missionaries from Bolivia, South America. The son of missionary parents, Tamplin has the benefit of experience gained both in growing up on the mission field, and in serving as a missionary himself in the jungles of South America. Tamplin is a missionary pilot—having pioneered the way for missionary aviation in that area. Flying his plane, "The Wings of Peace," he has been ministering to the savage jungle Indians of Bolivia—in much the same manner as the five men who recently gave their lives in an effort to reach the savage Aucas of Ecuador.

A colored motion picture showing river expeditions, the use of the airplane, and missionaries hacking their way into the jungles will be shown. A free-will offering will be received.

Near Catastrophe Seen In Debris Left By Stream

Debris lines the bank of a small stream on Buckhorn Road about 10 miles east of Roseburg as testimony to a rumbling blowout of the Esile Paris house and barn during last week's high water.

Paris estimates that a 40-foot wall of water must have come roaring out of the tiny canyon through which the small stream cuts. Apparently logs, mud and other debris formed a dam across a deep, narrow part of the creek about a mile away from the house. Then with the pressure of last week's water built up behind it, the dam apparently gave way hurling great logs and tons of smaller material down toward the house.

On the stream's route to the house, two well-anchored trees appear to have blunted the full force of the mammoth battering ram. Great piles of big logs tumbled up behind them. If they had not been stopped, they could have battered the house and barn to rubble.

As it was, the smaller debris swished on and was finally strewn around one side of the house. Meanwhile, back in its banks, the stream would seem hard pressed to give up a healthy drink of water.

Portland Labor Council Plans Radio Newscast

PORTLAND — The Portland Central Labor Council decided Monday night to put on a 15-minute radio news program five days a week if it can raise the \$15,000 needed annually for the project. The council approved establishment of a committee representing the State Federation of Labor, the labor council and CIO unions to work out financing and management of the broadcast.

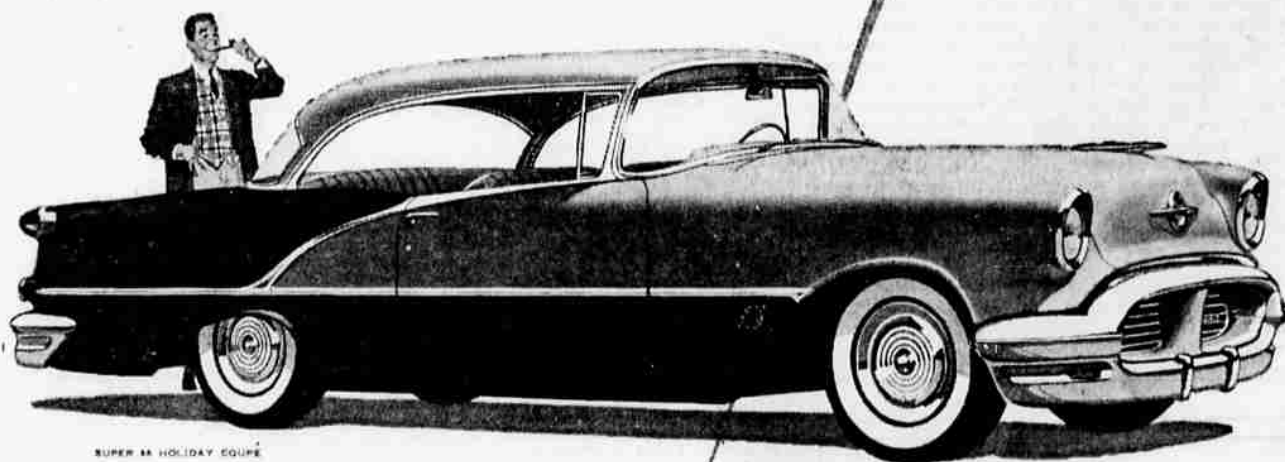
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
