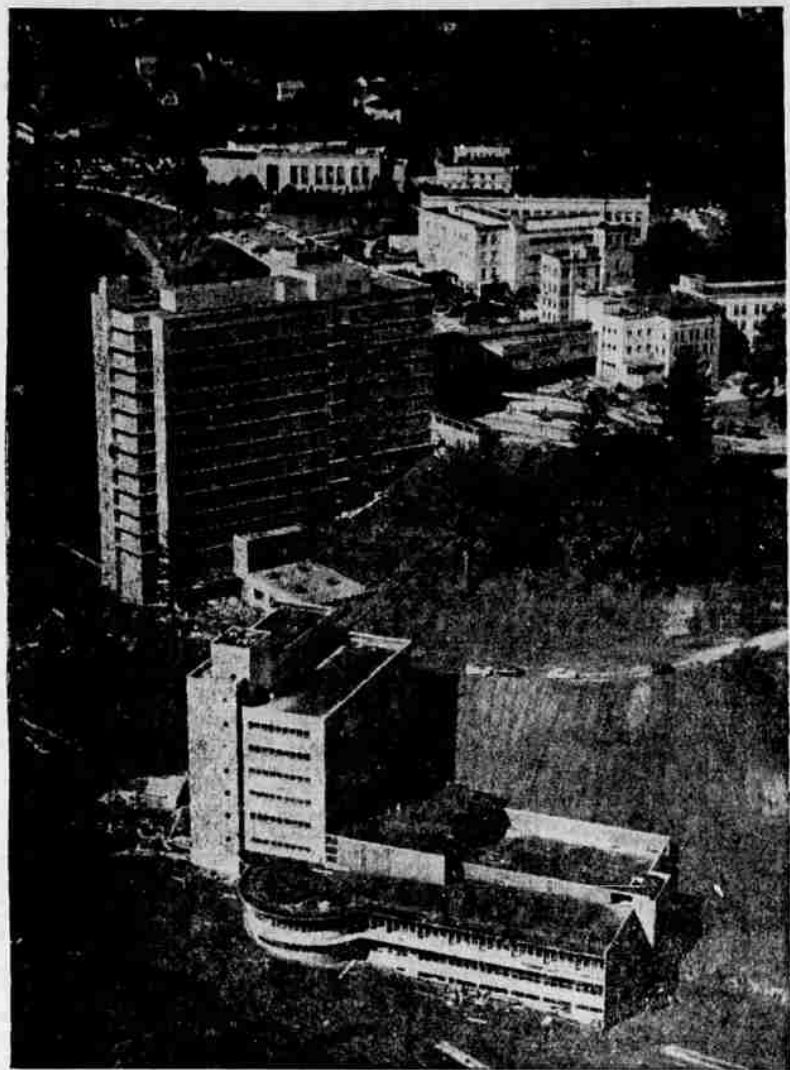


University Medical School Hospital Dedication Slated



DEDICATION is scheduled March 3 in Portland for the University of Oregon Medical School Hospital, a spacious, modern and functional structure under construction since 1953.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON MEDICAL SCHOOL, Portland—Fourteen floors—each of them designed to contribute toward man's endless fight against disease and death—will be open for public inspection this Saturday immediately following formal dedication of the new \$6,300,000 university of Oregon Medical School Hospital.

The dedication of this modern and functional structure which has been under construction since the spring of 1953 on the tree-clad campus of the University of Oregon medical school, will take place at 1:15 p.m. Medical and nursing students will conduct guided tours of the building, with additional tours scheduled for the following day, Sunday, between the hours of 1:00 and 5:00 p.m.

The hospital's spacious classrooms with the latest in audio-visual and instructional aids, the research laboratories with their bubbling test tubes and colored gases, and the patient rooms, functional and convenient, will greet visitors when they tour the 277-bed hospital. For this is a teaching and research hospital designed to acquaint Oregon's men and women of medical science with a variety of human ailments. It also will provide them with the latest information on the ways to treat disease, and will equip them with the new knowledge constantly being found through medical research.

Those visiting the hospital will have the opportunity to observe new facilities for patient care which illustrate the changing pattern of medicine. These include: rooms that have lead-lined walls and floors where patients may be treated with radio-active isotopes; rooms for asthma studies where every particle of dust and allergens will be filtered out; and more rooms for skin temperature studies where heat can be controlled to a fraction of a degree.

Those taking guided tours of the Medical School Hospital will have pointed out to them such things as the intercommunication system between each bed and the nurses station—saving countless steps and much valuable time on the part of both patients and nurses; piped-in oxygen to each room and ward; a pneumatic tube system where charts may be whisked in seconds from the medical records department to the hospital's admitting department and on to the nurses station at each level; and dumb-waiters on each floor for linens and food service.

Psychological factors as well as physical conveniences also have been taken into account in the hospital's planning. The rooms and corridors have been planned with an eye toward color: soft pastels, in contrast to the usual aseptic white and cream. Cheerful drapes may be found at the lovely view windows affording a vast hilltop panorama of the City of Roses and beyond to Mount Hood and the Cascades. Picture-type windows between the corridors and rooms in the Doernbecher Memorial Hospital for Children unit will allow doctors and nurses to closely observe the activities of these sick little patients.
