Neuberger Contends BPA Rate Sacrificed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) contends administration "abandonment" of power dam sites to private utilities in the Pacific Northwest has "sacrificed" the Bonneville Power Administration's industrial power rate.

He made his statement in the Senate Tuesday in commenting on an announcement by officials of the Kaiser Aluminum Co. that the company can buy steam power from the Ohio Valley for 4 cents a kilowatt hour.

This, Neuberger quoted a company official as saying, means the industry is "no longer dependent upon locations close to large hydroelectric installations which are remote from industrial markets."

Neuberger told the Senate the Pacific Northwest "was in the mill race for payrolls with Bonneville's 2.2 mill rate and with plenty of power to sell at that rate."

"But," he added, "the Northwest is on the beach economically with surrender to the private utilities and their industrial charge of two or three times the Bonneville rate for large consumers of power."

"Steam power at four mills in the Ohio Valley, plus favoritism in the Northwest to private utilities with their 8.2-mill industrial rates," the senator said, "can only result in the drying up of our region's brightest hope for a source of new payrolls to absorb the employment slack taking place in lumber."

COUNTERS STOLEN
