

Old Football Friends Part At Mississippi State; Pal Replaces New Husky Mentor

STATE COLLEGE, Miss. (AP)—Long-time buddies Darrell Royal and Wade Walker parted on Wednesday, with Walker taking over as head coach at Mississippi State to fill the vacancy left when Royal accepted the challenge of the same post at the University of Washington.

Royal was named to the top football job at Washington Tuesday and Walker quickly got an offer to succeed him here.

"I hope to go up there this week," Royal said. "I've read about the situation up there and I'll admit the challenge the job offers in the future will be a challenge to me."

He said he had no definite plans, but that he would be glad to run anything.

Knows of Disagreements

The 51-year-old former star quarterback at the University of Oklahoma said he did not know the details of the Washington situation, but knew that there had been some disagreements at the university.

Royal will succeed John Cherberg, who was fired in January by athletic director Harvey Cassill. The firing followed a revolt of players on the football team in November and because, Cassill said, Cherberg had failed to restore harmony as he had promised. Cassill resigned earlier this month.

Also mixed up in the squabble was disclosure of a "downtown fund" by influential Seattle alumni to help athletes. Cassill denied knowledge of improper use of the fund, which has brought requests for a legislative inquiry.

Split-T Attack Planned

"I plan to run from a split-T at Washington," Royal said. "But I don't know anything at all about the team. I haven't even seen a movie of any of their games."

George Briggs, Washington's new athletic director, said at Washington that Royal will be given freedom in selecting his assistants.

"I'd like to take one on the staff here with me," Royal said, declining to name the one. "I hope to have a five-man staff there. I'll probably handle the backs on offense. I hope to have as assistants an end coach, a defensive backfield coach, an offensive line coach and a freshman coach."

Royal said he did not apply for a job and was "mightily flattered" when they offered it to him. He said he planned to go to the university soon, with his wife and three children to follow, later.

Five Coaching Prospects

Briggs called Royal "one of the finest coaching prospects in the U.S. today."

Advised that Washington had Negroes on its football team, Royal said, "It doesn't make any difference. All I'm interested in is football players."

Royal became head coach at Mississippi State in 1954 and led his team to a 6-4 record. He had been head coach of Edmond in the Canadian professional league in 1953 and served previously as assistant at Tulsa and Mississippi State.

Neither school mentioned the salary of his new head coach. State said Walker would be offered a four-year contract and Washington indicated Royal would be signed for more than one year.

Royal succeeded Murray Warmath as State head coach when Warmath moved to Minnesota. This year Royal's Washington team will play Minnesota.

Washington Fans Pleased With Royal Appointment

SEATTLE (AP)—University of Washington football fans, who seldom have time to really get acquainted with the school's latest coach, were rolling a new name over their tongues Wednesday.

This time it is Darrell Royal, coach at Mississippi State, and thus far the reception has been good.

Seattle Golfer Loses In Medalist Playoff

ORMOND BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Marge Burns of Greensboro, N.C., medalist in the South Atlantic Women's Golf Tournament, Wednesday faced Fran Emerson of Dayton, Ohio, in her first match.

Anne Quast, 18-year-old Seattle University sophomore from Marysville, Wash., matched Miss Burns' score of 72—one over par—but lost in the qualifying round but lost a sudden death playoff for the medal.

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Sports Eugene Again Tops In Poll

Eugene, which clinched a state class A-1 tournament berth with two lopsided victories over the weekend, again was voted Oregon's best high school basketball team in this week's Associated Press poll.

But for the first time in several weeks Eugene, the defending state champion, was not the unanimous choice of sportswriters and broadcasters who balloted.

Franklin of Portland drew one first-place vote on the strength of its 79-60 victory over powerful Jefferson Friday night. The win, attributable mainly to 42 points by Franklin's awesome 6-9 center Bjorne Jensen, moved Franklin from third to No. 2 in the poll.

Jefferson, which had edged Lincoln earlier in the week, dropped to No. 3. Jefferson needed only one victory to nail down a tournament berth and still led in the city league, where its only two losses had been to Franklin.

Medford's subbed Grants Pass twice over the weekend to retain No. 4 position. Medford and Klamath Falls, the latter unranked, will represent the Southern Oregon district in the tournament.

Beard moved up from sixth to No. 5 after a 61-53 victory over Sweet Home. Milton-Freewater also advanced a notch, from No. 7 to sixth, after two convincing week-end wins.

Marshfield Drops

Making room for those two advances was Marshfield's fall from fifth place to No. 7.

Franklin, the strong Eastern Oregon team which only late in the season began to get general recognition throughout the state, remained at No. 8 while the last two in the top ten switched places from a week ago. Beaverton wound up No. 9 and Lincoln No. 10, just a point apart.

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Olympians Had Wes' Number, AAU Man Says

NEW YORK (AP)—Even if Wes Santee had been cleared of charges of accepting excessive expense money, it's doubtful if he could have appeared in the Olympics, an AAU official said today.

"I'm certain we never could have entered him in the games because the international federation wouldn't permit it after reading his testimony," said Irving Schoolman, a member of the Executive Committee which imposed the ban.

"However, on the basis of his testimony, we had no recourse but to suspend him."

The AAU yesterday released the report of a committee appointed to investigate Santee and it served to confirm the already-published resume.

Developments Noted

It also brought about the following developments:

1. Finky Sober, who wrote the report that led to Santee's conviction in effect, challenged the star miler to try to upset the Executive Committee's jurisdiction in the case.

2. AAU Secretary - Treasurer Dan Ferris said Santee could run in the All-Service Championships in Los Angeles in June.

3. Santee's lawyer, Charles P. Grimes, refused to comment on the report.

4. Sober, head of the AAU Track and Field Committee and an attorney, said:

"The only leg they (Santee and Grimes) would possibly have to stand on is the matter of jurisdiction. But the AAU constitution points out that the national organization has complete priority over any action of a national organization."

Court Threat Made

Grimes said when Santee was suspended that he would take the case to the courts on the basis that the Executive Committee did not have jurisdiction in the case—that any evidence gathered by Sober should have been sent back to the Missouri AAU, which cleared Santee of similar charges last year.

Sober's report revealed exactly how much above the allowable expenses Santee was charged with accepting—\$1,235. Here it how it was broken down: \$670 for three meals in Fresno, Los Angeles and Modesto, Calif., in eight days; \$290 for meals in Cleveland and Chicago on successive nights; \$150 for meals in Compton, Calif., and Stockton, Calif., a week apart; and \$125 for meals in Philadelphia and Washington on successive nights.

Ex-Roseburg Man Has Book Published

The manuscript of a former Garden Valley fruit farmer has been published in book form by the Caxton-Printers of Caldwell, Idaho.

He is George C. Bailey, now retired, who lives on Puget Sound in Washington. The 164-page book is called "Tall Trees Surround Us."

About it, the Seattle Sunday Times says: The story of the Pacific Northwest's past is so much the story of men and women chopping, digging and sweating out homes in the wilderness that "Tall Trees Surround Us" will fit comfortably into the regional record.

Bailey and his wife spent two years on a quarter-section homestead in the Couer d'Alene Indian Reservation of northern Idaho from 1910 to 1912. The two years of homesteading were memorable to the couple.

"The Baileys found their heavily timbered land unsuitable for agriculture, so they sold out and bought a fruit farm in Garden Valley, Bailey later worked in the State Employment Service here. They lived here 18 years, and then six years ago, they retired and moved to Edmonds on Puget Sound."

Again the Times quotes Bailey as saying: "Getting out the book was a long pull. I made it only because of my wife's excellent memory and because her mother had saved the letters we wrote to her in those pioneering years, thus preserving a detailed record of our experiences."

"He expects, however, to continue his writing hobby."

Two Men Jailed

7 Children Burned In Arkansas Fire

MARIANNA, Ark. (AP)—Seven Negro children perished near here late last night when fire destroyed their four room frame house.

The pregnant mother, Mrs. Viola Edwards, was burned critically, but the father and two other children escaped.

The dead were identified by their 33-year-old father Lonnie Edwards as Willie, 12; Patricia Ann, 8; Lula Jean, 6; Garland, 4; twins Joseph and Josephine 2; and Jerome, 1.

Mrs. Edwards was taken to a Little Rock hospital where attendants said about two thirds of her body was covered by severe burns.

Edwards told an ambulance driver that he awoke to find the fire virtually had engulfed the frame house, seven miles south of here. Edwards and two children, Lonnie Jr., 5, and Eudora, 7, raced to safety.

Mrs. Edwards stumbled and fell as she fought to escape. Edwards said she regained her feet, however, and got outside the house.

Lonnie Jr. and Eudora were treated by a physician in Marianna for minor burns. Edwards wasn't injured.

Cause of the fire wasn't immediately known.

He has been extremely active in civic and fraternal affairs. He was formerly commander and district commander of the American Legion. He is a past master of the Masonic Lodge and past president of the Yoncalla, Polk and Marion County postmasters.
