Friendship Day Scheduled For Adventist Church

Members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church of Roseburg will participate in a special "friendship day" Saturday, in an effort to encourage better church attendance, according to Inez Hitchman, church reporter.

Oregon Elks Assn. Grants \$5,478 For Eye Clinic

A grant of \$5,478 has been made by the Oregon State Elks Assn. to the children's eye clinic at the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland to help continue its visual program for underprivileged youngsters. Announcement of the grant was made in Roseburg by Dr. Alton Dalros, eye clinic representative for Roseburg, Lodge 326.

Dr. Dalros said about \$82,000 has been given to the clinic since it was set up in 1949 by the Elks. The clinic plans to use \$1,304 to equip a treatment and minor surgery room in the new university hospital. The clinic has quarters on the 10th floor.

Last year, the clinic's research program was greatly expanded, according to Dr. Kenneth Swan, head of the clinic and the ophthalmology department. The disease called retrolental fibroplasia, which causes blindness in premature babies, has been reduced by more accurate control of oxygen, he said. A total of 129 examinations were conducted on the eyes of 32 premature babies.

The big new research project of 1955 was on glaucoma—hardening of the eye ball. The OSEA already has given the clinic \$723 to buy an electronic recording apparatus to make direct measurements of the hydrostatic pressure of eyes with glaucoma disease.

James D. Woolsey Asks For \$26,724 Accident Damages

James D. Woolsey has filed suit in circuit court for \$25,000 general and \$1,724 special damages for injuries received last Oct. 7 in an explosion at Tri-City.

The suit is against California-Pacific Utilities Co., Arch K. and Maude Fowler, Felton T. and Jane Doe Robinson and Ora D. Havely. Woolsey, 27, was injured and burned when he turned on an electric light in an unoccupied house next to a converted garage in which Woolsey was residing.

He entered the house to investigate, when he smelled gas. When he turned on the light, an explosion blew out the sides of the structure and tossed Woolsey about 30 feet. He was hospitalized about eight weeks with bruises, contusions, lacerations and second and third degree burns, the complaint states.

He claims the Fowlers and Robinsons, as owners of the property, (1) negligently disconnected a gas heater in the house, (2) failed to close a valve leading from a storage tank, (3) failed to tell the plaintiff, (4) failed to plug the supply line to prevent gas from escaping and (5) failed to inform the gas company.

He accuses Cal-Pac of failing to supply a suitable device for locking the storage tank valve and failing to turn off the gas supply to the house.
