Baseball On Sunday Lost To Vancouver

VICTORIA, B.C. (AP) — Those 13 Sunday double-headers scheduled by the new Vancouver Mounties of the Pacific Coast Baseball League were wiped off the program Friday by pure silence.

The provincial Legislature failed to introduce enabling action that could have erased the "blue law" which bans Sunday sports.

Vancouver voters approved the introduction of Sunday play in a plebiscite Dec. 14, hoping to ease the way for the baseball team which was transferred north from Oakland, Calif.

The issue has been kicked back and forth between the Vancouver City Council and the government during the current session of the Legislature. The council declined to ask the government for an amendment to the City Charter, apparently hoping instead for a special act.

The last hope died as the Legislature wound up a marathon session without action. A bill to amend the Vancouver City Charter was introduced but carried no Sunday sports provision.

Unless some new means of changing the situation is found, the league will have to reschedule the 13 double-headers planned for Vancouver. When the Western International League operated a team here the weekly double bills were played on Mondays.

Oregon State's Prothro Denies UCLA Athletes Received Finances In Excess

CORVALLIS (AP) — Tommy Prothro, Oregon State College football coach and a former aide to UCLA coach Red Sanders, said Friday that UCLA players were given off-campus jobs.

But he said that in the six years he has known UCLA "no athlete received from any source any more than his actual school expenses. I'm confident I would know if he had."

Prothro said he personally does not "know too much about" the case of George Stephenson, a former UCLA football candidate who has charged that UCLA assistant coaches negotiated "under the table" financial arrangements. Stephenson said such arrangements gave UCLA players \$40 a week over the \$75 monthly allowance by the Pacific Coast Conference for campus jobs when he was at UCLA.

Prothro, who was at UCLA at the time Stephenson was there, said, "Most coaches feel that because an athlete gives up his spare time when he could be working to maintain himself, that he should get an opportunity to earn his actual school expenses, if he can get no help from home."

"I believe that UCLA has done this with off-campus jobs, but has limited the amount that can be made on this outside job, so that

Three Grab State Prep Meet Berths

Three teams won tournament berths as Oregon high schools opened a full weekend of qualifying play Friday night.

Franklin of Portland, the No. 2 team in the latest Associated Press poll, nabbed a berth by downing Grant, 71-56, as the regular Portland league schedule ended. That victory, plus Benson's upset win over Jefferson, 65-60, gave Franklin a tie for the Portland crown with Jefferson, the state's No. 3 team.

Washington upset Lincoln, the state's No. 10 team, 51-42, to bring on a playoff for the third tournament berth allotted to Portland schools. Washington and Lincoln wound up in a tie for second place in the league. The playoff between the two will be scheduled later.

Two Teams Qualify
Two teams qualified in the district 8 tournament of class A-1. South Salem defeated Bend, 65-55, for one spot, and Corvallis downed North Salem, 54-42, for the other. Bend and North Salem will meet Saturday night for the right to oppose a district 5 team for a tournament berth.

Previously qualified in class A-1 were Jefferson, Central Catholic, Beaverton, McMinnville, Eugene, Medford and Klamath Falls.

In district 3 Milwaukie nosed out Central Catholic of Portland, 22-21, and Astoria defeated Gresham, 53-49. That threw Astoria, Gresham and Milwaukie into a deadlock for the district's second tournament berth.

Cottage Grove Loss
In district 3 Marshallfield edged Cottage Grove, 66-62, to put the two teams in a tie for the district's second tournament spot.

In district 7 Milton-Freewater downed Baker, 54-49, to earn the right to play Pendleton next Tuesday for one tournament berth. The loser will meet Baker for the second berth.

No class A-2 teams won berths Friday night, but the field was narrowed.

In district 2 Toledo nosed out Newport in overtime, 62-60, to even their title playoff series at a game each. A third game will decide the matter.

Turner defeated Sherwood, 50-43, and Stayton downed Willamina, 45-39, in district 3-A-2.

AAU Asks Court To Block Injunction Granted Santee

NEW YORK (AP) — Judge Charles D. Breitell of the appellate division of the New York State Supreme Court, ruled Saturday that Wes Santee, America's fastest miler, was eligible to compete in Saturday night's Knights of Columbus meet in Madison Square Garden.

The Madison Square Garden meet. They asked the court to set aside a temporary injunction blocking the enforcement of its lifetime suspension of Santee.

The injunction was granted Thursday. His attorney, Charles P. Grimes obtained the writ from Justice James B. M. McNally.

That's how it stood when Jay-Ehret Mahoney, AAU attorney, brought his appeal to the appellate division.

"I'll move for a cross-motion to make the suspension of the injunction even stronger," roared Grimes when he heard of the AAU's action. "I'll ask the appellate division to clarify the order by issuing an injunction requiring the AAU to inform every athlete that Santee is not under suspension and that they may run against him without injuring their amateur standings in any way."

The other mile entries — including Fred Dwyer, East Orange, N. J.; Ron Delany, Villanova; Jim Bailey, Oregon; George King, New York University, and Jim Doolin, Manhattan — merely were hoping something definite would be decided by posttime.

Despite the fact that Justice McNally said "the other boys are protected" by his order, they remember all too well the ominous warning of AAU chieftain Dan Ferris. He warned a week ago that any athlete competing against Santee would lose his amateur standing or not.

It is pertinent to note that while the AAU may be defeated in New York, the state court's action would not be binding on the International Olympic Committee or the International Amateur Athletic Federation. American Avery Brundage is president of the IOC. He was not available for comment.

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Oregon Miler To Quit Controversial K-C Race

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Jim Bailey, the University of Oregon NCAA mile champion, will not compete in the Knights of Columbus mile if Wes Santee, barred from competition by the AAU, runs.

Leo Harris, the university's athletic director, said Bailey had advised him of this in a telephone conversation late Friday night.

Harris quoted Bailey as saying that he had talked with Australian representatives and that they feared his Olympics chances might be jeopardized by such a race. Bailey is an Australian.

The race is to be held at New York Saturday night.

Big Ten OKs Bowl Pact 'Conditionally'

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — The Big Ten has approved continuing the Rose Bowl football pact with the Pacific Coast Conference, but not without further negotiations.

The approval came at a joint meeting Friday of Big Ten faculty representatives and athletic directors. It was by "conditional vote" and by majority rather than unanimously.

The matter now reverts back to the faculties of each institution for vote.

The current 3-year Rose Bowl contract expires with the 1957 game. The PCC wants the new pact to be a permanent one which would bypass the formality of renewing extensions. Such an agreement could be discontinued by either conference upon serving notice at least two years in advance.

Bill Reed, assistant Big Ten commissioner said that among things to be negotiated with the PCC is the matter of ticket allotment. The Big Ten would like more tickets and in better locations for the Rose Bowl games.

The first Rose Bowl contract, starting with the 1947 game, was for five years. Then followed two 3-year extensions.

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Ukes Cinch Tie In PCC; Ducks Win

The Bruins of UCLA, with a share of the Pacific Coast Conference basketball crown already in pocket, go after an untarnished championship Saturday night.

The unbeaten Westwood quint cinched at least a 50-50 share of the title Friday night by turning back California's second-place Bears, 85-80, on the 39-point performance of Willie Naulls.

The UCLA victory, although not too much of a surprise, overshadowed the 105-84 shellacking Washington administered to Southern California. It was the third highest score ever run up by a Husky team.

In the only other conference game Friday night, the University of Oregon Ducks whipped Washington State's Cougars, 80-63.

Two Teams Rest

Idaho and Oregon State are idle this weekend. Stanford took Friday night off and steps outside the conference for a contest with San Jose State Saturday night.

Playing on their home court, where they are extremely tough to beat, the Huskies simply overwhelmed Southern Cal and eliminated El Toraja from title contention.

Bruno Boin hit for 28 points as the Huskies went over the century mark for the first time in PCC play. In games in the dim, dark past Washington teams have rolled up scores of 112 and 106, both outside the conference.

Four other Huskies and four SC players hit in the double figures, with Jack Dunne's 14 the high Trojan effort.

Washington Hot

Washington rolled into a 50-55 lead at the half and finished the game with a good 516 shooting percentage on 33 good tries in 64 attempts from the field.

Washington State entered the Oregon fray with gusto and promptly went into a lead that held good until early in the second period.

On the short side of a 33-31 score at the half, the Ducks sprang for the Cougars for the first three minutes of the second period and then went into the lead for Jerry Ross' jump shot from the key, which gave Oregon a 39-38 advantage.

With Ross and Max Anderson showing the way, the Ducks scrambled into a 9-point lead, staved off a late WSC rally and cinched the victory with a flurry of insurance baskets at the end of the contest.

Anderson Gets 21

Anderson wound up as the game's high scorer with 21. Ross got 15. Larry Beck topped Washington State with 16.

Even a special defense cooked up by California coach Pete Newell in an effort to stop Naulls couldn't hold down point-making Willie the Whale, a third-teamer on this year's AP All-America.

Naulls' 39 points topped by one the former UCLA single game scoring record set by the great Eddie Sheldrake back in 1951.

Willie collected 13 points in the first half, even against the tight defense set up against him, and ran the Bears ragged in the second period when he tipped in 26 points.

The schedule for Saturday calls for the same pairings. The UCLA-California game is an afternoon, televised affair and the rest are night contests.
