They'll give two special afternoon shows, one at the Veterans Hospital at 2:30 p.m., and another at the Douglas County Home. Sometime during the busy afternoon, they'll sandwich in appearances on the local radio stations.

As explained by Moose publicity chairman Vernon M. Murdoch Sr., the youthful youngsters are traveling around Oregon. Their schedule has been set up by the Oregon State Moose Assn. Chaperones accompany the troupe, which carries its own makeup, wardrobe and lighting facilities. "It's a complete unit," Murdoch noted.

Many present-day entertainers got their start with the "Juniors," among them is Jane Powell, Murdoch said.

Adlai, Kefauver Disagree On Health Issue; Knowland Says Ike Should Campaign

Adlai Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver have taken conflicting positions on making President Eisenhower's health a campaign issue. And Republicans have begun talking about the kind of campaigning Eisenhower should wage.

Kefauver said Saturday he doesn't plan to make an issue of the President's health. The Tennessee Democrat added that he has "never questioned anyone's physical condition or his looks."

Stevenson, one of Kefauver's rivals for the Democratic presidential nomination, has said he views Eisenhower's health as a "compelling issue."

Talking to newsmen at Man-

chester, N. H., Kefauver said he doesn't think Stevenson is wrong in taking this position — "It's just that I'm running my own campaign."

Another Democrat, Sen. Fulbright of Arkansas, said today he fears discussion of Eisenhower's health will overshadow what he called "the really important issue" — foreign policy.

"While we talk about the President's health and whether there is lasting prosperity, we may be losing Asia to the Russians," he told a newsmen.

Ike Urged To Campaign

The question of how much Eisenhower should campaign was discussed in separate television interviews by three Republicans — National Chairman Leonard Hall and Senators Knowland of California and Goldwater of Arizona.

Knowland, the Senate GOP leader, said he personally would urge Eisenhower to "get out beyond merely television broadcasts from the White House." He said Eisenhower should make a few campaign appearances in areas where Republican candidates might be in trouble.

Eisenhower has rejected a suggestion of a "barnstorming" campaign and Knowland said he wasn't recommending that type of vote seeking.

Goldwater, however, predicted Eisenhower would do some "barnstorming" because "he's a campaigner at heart."

Hall said he believes any presidential campaign trips would "be at a minimum" — limited perhaps to a few flying visits to major cities. He said he foresaw no cross-country train trip.

Home State Boosts Nixon

Since Eisenhower said "yes" to a second term bid, a big question among Republicans has been who his running mate will be. Eisenhower has been noncommittal.

Hall said everyone seemed concerned about this except Vice President Nixon. And he predicted, as he has before, that Nixon will be re-nominated.

In Nixon's home state, the California Republican Assembly Saturday approved a resolution which "enthusiastically endorses" re-election of both Eisenhower and Nixon. The assembly is a volunteer party organization.

An Associated Press poll of GOP governors, state chairmen and national committee members showed that 35 per cent of those responding favored re-nomination of Nixon. An additional 9 per cent were for Nixon if Eisenhower wants him and less than 3 per cent favored another candidate. Fifty-four per cent did not comment or were noncommittal.

There was about 1½ inches of snow on Camas Mt., on Highway 42, but the Highway Dept. was keeping it cleared away.

Snow sprinkled the ground in the lower parts of the county, but the Highway Dept. advised chains for motorists attempting to drive south to Grants Pass. Snow was heavy on the passes south of Canyonville.

Depth At Other Points

In Roseburg, there was about an inch of snow in most places, with heavier amounts lying around the city. There was two inches at Hildreth, one at Canyonville and Myrtle Creek. Lookingglass had up to four inches.

Eight inches of new snow fell in 3½ hours this morning at Glendale between 7 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. By the latter time, it had piled up to 11 inches.

The U.S. Weather Bureau here said the snow was a "backwash" of the storm which blew through the county Friday night.

The immediate result Saturday night and early Sunday morning was heavy rain. In the 24 hours ending at 10:30 p.m. Sunday, 1.12 inches of rain fell. Most of it in about four hours late Saturday and early Sunday.

The heavy rain was reflected in a rise in the South Umpqua River, but only of about a foot. It was falling again today after having reached a stage of about 11½ feet, well below flood stage.

Truck Slams Into Home, Killing Two Women

PITTSBURGH — In a few terror-filled seconds a happy Sunday afternoon turned into one of horror near here when tons of steel rods from a careening truck slammed into a combination store and home and killed two of the three women in the dwelling.

The truck driver, 46-year-old Anthony Marsilli of Pittsburgh, escaped unhurt.

Killed instantly were Mrs. Helen Clark, 32, of R. 1, Sutherland, and Mrs. Susan Druga, 40, of Imperial, visitors in the home.

Mrs. Francis Kaelin, 49, who lived there, suffered lacerations and shock.

Construction Camp Has City-Like Appearance

Between 475 and 500 workmen have made a small-sized town out of the Morrison-Knudsen construction camp at Clearwater, according to Glile correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

A company spokesman on the California Oregon Hydroelectric project high in the Cascades told her that 70 carpenters are working in the day shift and 14 at night on the Clearwater Hydro project about four miles from the M-K camp. Carpenters are putting in 10-hour days, he said.

Other employees are working on the Lanes conversion feeder dam seven miles from the Clearwater camp.

Stalin Death Date Ignored By Red Press

LONDON — Joseph Stalin was an all but forgotten man in the Communist world Monday on the third anniversary of his death.

Soviet newspapers, which seldom miss a chance to remember such historic events, ignored with studied calculation the man Communists the world over had exalted as a demigod during his 25-year reign.

In early broadcasts Moscow Radio made no mention of the anniversary. It was more concerned with shortcomings among party workers on collective farms.

Reds in Soviet satellite countries seemed confused in the Kremlin's destruction of the myth of the man who had brought many of them into power.

A few leaders have joined in the repudiation of Stalin, but more are being extremely cautious, taking no chances on another switch in Kremlin policy.

The body has been removed to The Chapel of the Roses and will be taken to Portland for funeral services and interment.

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Contempt Rap Jails Attorney S. W. Yates

Yates to jail. That doesn't mean in the sheriff's office or any place but the jail, he admonished.

Earlier, the judge noted that in his 21 years on the bench and 46 years around Roseburg, he had never yet seen an attorney held in contempt of court.

Yates answered that in his 17 years of practice he had "never been in difficulty in any court" for contempt or anything else.

How Case Generated

Before proceeding with the matter, Judge Wimberly backgrounded the situation by reviewing how the contempt charge came about:

A State Industrial Accident Commission employee, James R. Grady, was being examined on the witness stand by defense attorney Robert G. Davis in regard to the safety of a trailer hitch.

Grady had been referring to a state board as "we" instead of giving his own personal testimony, the judge reviewed.

The trial transcript shows the judge then said: "I am getting tired of this man giving evasive answers. I want the question read to him. I want him to give a responsive answer if he can. If he can't, let him say so."

Yates: "May it be if it please the court, may I object to the court's irascible tone. I mean, you can tell him that without."

Wimberly: "I don't care to hear you make any remarks about the tone of my voice."

Yates: "I have entered my objection. That is all I have to say. Wimberly: 'Yes, sir. Let that be the last one you ever make of that kind in this court.'"

Monday, after sentencing, Yates asked the judge to postpone the trial for one day so that he could appear at the City Council meeting tonight. He pointed out that he was the only one prepared to present certain matters in connection with discussion of renewal of a five-year lease.

When the judge indicated the sentence would be carried out forthwith, Yates asked if he would be given a chance to call an attorney.

The judge said that would depend on the policy of the sheriff's office in operation of the jail.

State Aeronautics Head Dated By Flying Club

The director of the State Board of Aeronautics will be the guest of the Umpqua Flying Club Tuesday evening.

He is Earl Snyder, Salem, who will address club members meeting at 8:30 p.m. at the Hamlet Club. Snyder will show a motion picture, "Flight Decisions," and will tell how searches for missing aviators are conducted.

As director of the aeronautics board, Snyder supervises such searches. He personally led the successful hunt for two fliers lost in the Blue Mountains recently. They were found alive.

Man Carries Out Threat To Cut Off Own Finger

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Hullen H. Watkins, 34, a long record of forgery convictions but he meant it when he wrote Judge William F. James he was going to cut off his writing finger.

Judge James hurriedly checked the jail here after receiving this note.

"I know you won't believe a thief like me but to show that I'm sincere I'm going to cut off my writing finger. P.S.: When you receive this, the finger will be off."

Jailers said Watkins, 31, walked into the kitchen, cut a meat cleaver and lopped off his right index finger at the first joint.

SKIDDER REPORTS

Clarence Raymond Cardew, 27, Portland, reported to city police that his car skidded onto a lawn at the corner of Flint and Oak in Roseburg Saturday afternoon.

He says he was traveling east across the Oak Avenue bridge and applied his brakes to make a turn at the intersection. He says he skidded, hit the curb and came to a stop on the lawn of a residence on the southeast corner there.

JAILED — PER REQUEST

Edd James DeLapp, 45, of Roseburg, was jailed at his own request Sunday night "to keep out of trouble." He didn't say what trouble he expected to get into.

City police report he was standing in the rain and snow near the police station at Oak and Main Sunday night when he was questioned by an officer. DeLapp asked to be locked up. He was.

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Yates To Appeal Jail Sentence

Spencer W. Yates, one of the county's leading trial lawyers, has given oral notice he will appeal a contempt of court sentence handed down this morning by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Late this morning, Yates was happily pacing back and forth in his jail cell awaiting the posting of a \$500 bail bond. The judge put Yates there for one day after saying Yates abused the authority of the court.

A brief has been filed in the case in which Yates outlines his side of the matter. He attempted to read the brief into the record at the contempt hearing, but the judge would allow only a short statement including the first two points mentioned.

In the brief, it is contended (1) the proceedings were not timely, (2) the judge was not qualified to pass upon the questions involved, (3) the judge should not influence a jury by conduct or remarks which indicate his opinion of the case or the credibility of witnesses, (4) since the tone of voice which a judge uses in making remarks may influence a jury as much as one constitutes an error, (5) an objection to the tone of voice must be made if counsel is to represent his client properly and (6) it is necessary that the objection be as specific as possible and it is for that reason that "reference was made to the particular quality of Your Honor's tone."

Yates was bailed out of jail at 11:55 a. m. today. He had been in jail about two hours.

TRUCKER DODGES INJURY

The unidentified driver of a truck loaded with bales of alfalfa escaped injury Sunday afternoon when his vehicle skidded in soft snow on Highway 99 near the Glendale Junction.

The mishap sent the baled alfalfa cascading over the highway, neatly blocking three lanes of traffic temporarily, reports Correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox. Some 175 bales fell from the California truck. State police investigated the uncommon accident, but issued no citations.

The Roseburg Revival Center drew a big crowd Sunday for its grand opening, and meeting will continue nightly this week, except Monday at 7:45.

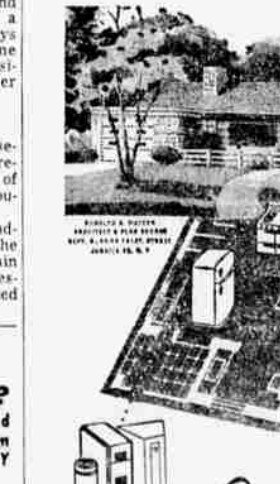
Meetings are being conducted in the former Skyroom at Washington and Jackson in Roseburg. They are open to the public.

a move starting in Roseburg requesting President Eisenhower to run for the second term, had met with good success. Several other states picked up the idea and organized committees for the same purpose.

Bernau, along with Robert Grant and Dr. V. J. Anderson of Roseburg, named themselves late last month as the national committee for the "operation." They sent a sheet of plywood, marked like a postcard, to the President urging him to decide to run, which he subsequently did.

Two organizations passed applauding the organizational and finance planning of the Oregon Republican Central Committee and granted permission to aid in reorganization of the Klamath County Young Republican chapter.

Two new directors were elected. One was Miss Jane Arthur, Portland, as director from the Third Congressional District. The election came over the protests of the Multnomah County chapter, which had nominated Robert Loman, Portland attorney.

The other was Mrs. John Smithson, Oswego, daughter of the late Gov. Paul Patterson. She will represent the First Congressional District.

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
