NEW YORK — The Mutual Broadcasting System Monday granted the Democratic Party free radio network time to reply to President Eisenhower's speech last Wednesday announcing he would be a candidate for a second term.

John P. Poor, MBS executive vice president, sent a telegram to Paul M. Butler, Democratic National chairman, offering the period from 10 to 10:20 p.m., EST, Wednesday, March 7, "for a spokesman who is not a candidate for public office this year."

Poor's message was in response to a second request for equal time by Butler after the networks had rejected his first request. He said it was "because of public service considerations, to offer you the time period."

Court Upholds Right To Fire U. P. Newsmen

NEW YORK — A State Supreme Court referee has upheld the right of the United Press to dismiss newsmen Theodore S. Polubbaum for his conduct before a congressional committee investigating Communist activities.

Referee Carrol G. Walter yesterday said "the arbitrator's findings that there was just and sufficient cause of the discharge terminates the controversy."

The court dismissed a suit brought by the American Newspaper Guild seeking Polubbaum's reinstatement with back pay.

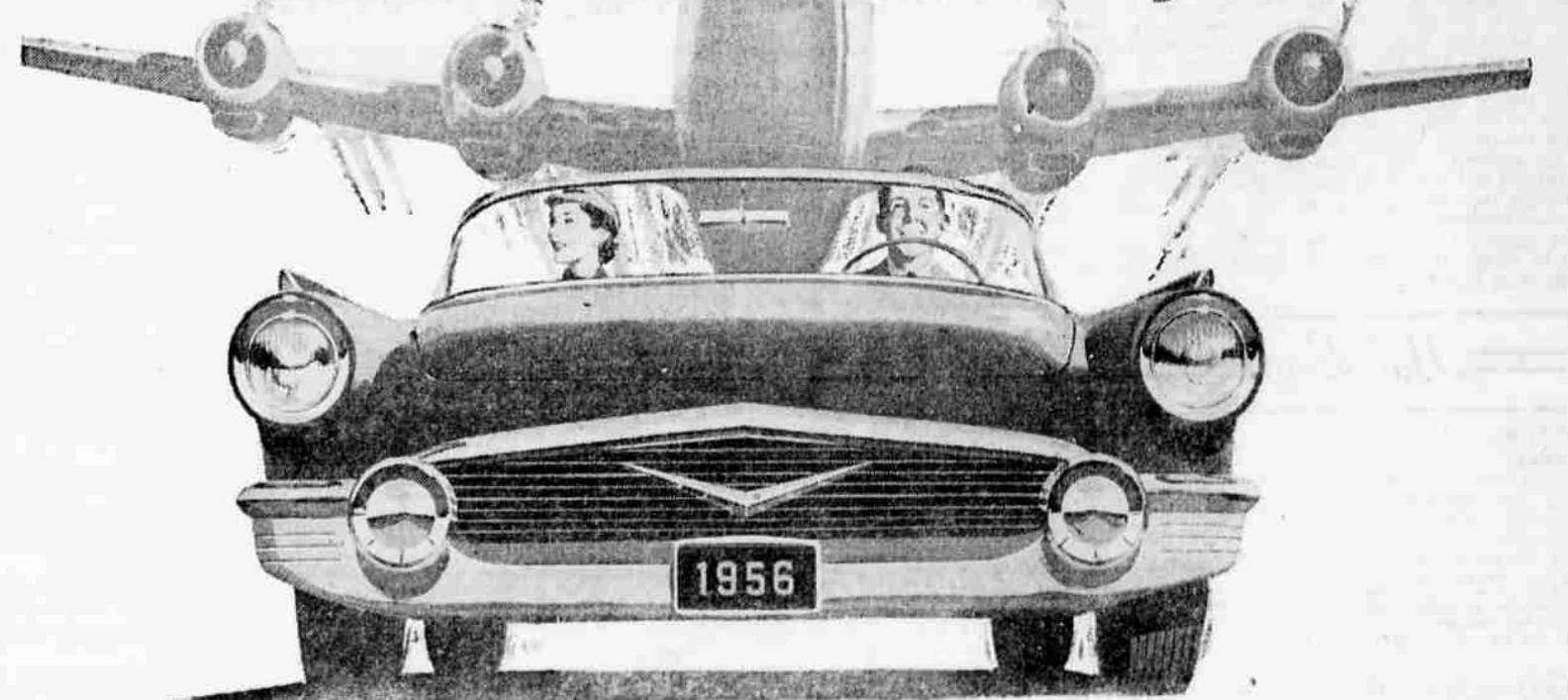
