

Klamath Mayor Wants Automatic Rural Annexation

KLAMATH FALLS — Klamath Falls Mayor Paul Landry thinks annexation of suburban areas should be automatic when population in these areas reaches a certain point.

He told the Legislative Interim Committee at a meeting that the Legislature should pass a law with this provision.

This law should also provide for the automatic annexation if sanitary authorities certified that a health or sanitation problem existed in fringe areas, he said. No area annexed could be brought into the city without the consent of the city.

The mayor also asked the committee to consider some way in which the state could aid the suburban areas financially. He indicated that the state should find some means of providing additional finances for the fringe areas.

The Klamath Falls mayor also stressed that no area should be annexed without the homeowners in that area bearing an equitable share of the tax load for the entire community.

Commissioner Jerry Rajus also asked the committee for action to change existing laws which limit the use of county road funds to specific projects. He asked that five per cent of the road funds be allocated to the county court for use as it sees fit.

About 90 persons attended the hearing. Members of the committee in attendance included: Sen. Paul Giddes, Roseburg; Rep. Geo. Layman, Newberg, and County Judge Raymond Lathrop, Grants Pass.

First Time Voters Will Get Young GOP Guidance

Neuberger, Welker Tiff Over Name For Forest

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neu-berger (D-Ore.) said Sen. Welker (R-Idaho) is being "provincial and partisan" in opposing a suggestion that Clearwater National Forest in Idaho be renamed to honor Ber-nard DeVoto.

Neuberger recently introduced a bill to honor the late author and conservationist by renaming the Idaho forest. Welker objected.

Neuberger said he chose the Clearwater Forest because it is as-sociated in history with the Lewis and Clark Expedition about which DeVoto did much of his writing.

"I hope," the Oregon senator added, "Senator Welker now does not try to erase Captain Meri-welher Lewis' name from that part of Idaho, because the immortal Captain Lewis was a Democrat from the distant state of Virginia."
