High Water Over Infield New Problem Of Vancouver

VANCOUVER, B.C. — The Vancouver Mounties, newest Pacific Coast Baseball League entry, took on another cliff-hanging aspect Wednesday in the continuing "Perils of Pauline" history of the organization.

This time, the old homestead, represented by the city-owned Capilano Stadium, is in danger. The villain is water.

Phil Stroyan, parks superintendent, reported Tuesday night one-third of the playing field is under water and \$30,000 will be needed to get it out and in playable condition by April 27, first scheduled playing date.

"Something will have to be done," opined Mayor Fred Hume. But he didn't seem inclined to be the man to save the city's athletic stepdaughter.

Too Much Money
"We certainly cannot afford to spend \$30,000," he said.

Cedric Tallis, general manager of the Mounties, assumed the hero's role with the firm statement:

"Something will be worked out." Backstage, the water gurgled villainously, swirling like a long black mustache on the muddy surface of the deserted field.

The Mounties got into the Coast League via the back door, taking over the Oakland franchise when that California city declined to pick up its fallen Acorns. It was tough and go, with the franchise in and out so often even the league lost track of its whereabouts.

Then the city battled through a

special vote on whether to permit the Mounties to play Sunday baseball. It passed by the skin of the voters' teeth.

K-C Director Backs Santee

NEW YORK — Wes Santee, America's controversial miler who is fighting a lifetime suspension in the courts, has the director of the Knights of Columbus track meet in his corner.

Tom Harrigan, the K. of C. director, criticized the Amateur Athletic Union Tuesday for its "unfair" treatment of Santee.

"Punishment should never be banishment for life," he told the weekly meeting of the Metropolitan track writers.

"Proper punishment for Santee would be that he should be bound to return the overcharge and be suspended for one year. He should be given a just hearing, with a chance to be represented by competent counsel, and should be warned if he transgressed again he would be washed out."

Runner Wins Race
Santee, suspended by the AAU for accepting excessive amounts of expense money for meets last year, ran in Saturday's K. of C. meet under protection of a Supreme Court injunction which stayed enforcement of the AAU ban. He won the Columbian Mile in 4:13.8.

Dan Ferris, AAU secretary-treasurer, replied that he didn't think the penalty against Santee was too stringent and pointed out that the rule about allowable expenses had been altered several times.

Whether Santee will be allowed to run in meets later this month in Milwaukee, Cleveland and Chicago probably will be decided at a hearing in Appellate Court Friday.

Grace DeMoss Second In Florida Golf Test

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. — Wanda Sanches, unheralded medalist from Baton Rouge, La., faced Helen Benito of Miami Springs in the opening round Wednesday of the Florida East Coast Women's Golf Tournament.

Miss Sanches toured the 6,367-yard Ponce de Leon course Tuesday in men's par of 72.

This was two strokes better than the runnerup, Grace DeMoss of Corvallis, Ore., and St. Augustine, the current Florida State women's champion. Miss DeMoss has won this tournament for the past two years.

Miss DeMoss' opponent Wednesday was Mrs. Maurice Glick of Baltimore who qualified with an 83.

Los Angeles To Build Big Auto Racing Plant

LOS ANGELES — Plans have been announced for a multi-million-dollar auto racing plant on a 470-acre tract three miles east of the Ontario airport.

U.S. Automotive Testing, Inc., a San Marino closed corporation sponsoring the project, said Tuesday a 5 1/2-mile road course will be in operation by midsummer.

It will contain six paved race and test circuits, including a 4 1/2-mile road course, two oval tracks a mile and a half-mile long, a 3-mile perimeter speed test circuit and a drag strip.

Kenneth Pollack, president of USAT, said there is no plan now for an oval course similar to the Indianapolis speedway's 2 1/2 mile track.

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Chisox Hurler, Other Vets Work To Stay In Lineups

Perhaps the most bitter pill Manager Marty Marion of the Chicago White Sox had to swallow last season was the failure of Pitcher Bob Keegan to come through.

The White Sox finished five games out of first place and it seems fair to assume that had Keegan even approached his 1954 record of 16-9, the pale hose might have won the pennant.

As it was, his record stood at 2-3 at the end of the campaign with a paltry 59 innings pitched. Marion planned to send Keegan to the mound today for the first time in an intra-camp game at Tampa, Fla., and admitted he's been watching the big right-hander carefully. Keegan could be the key man in the Sox pitching department.

The pilot said that Keegan has been working well so far, although he has been under no strain.

"You never know about a pitcher, though," Marion added, "until he works under game conditions. If he can come back strong, that will help us no end."

Keegan isn't the only player in the majors desperately battling for a spot.

At Clearwater, Fla., where the Philadelphia Phillies are training, Wally Westlake, who was signed as a free agent by General Manager Roy Hamey, is working to shed 12 pounds from his 208-pound frame.

"If Hamey had enough confidence to sign me," he said, "I'll probably have to take over the right field job for him."

Irvin With Cubs
Then there is Monte Irvin, a 37-year-old flycatcher, who was with Minneapolis of the American Assn. last year, after being dropped by the New York Giants.

Louisiana Collegian Tops 1,000-Point Mark

EMPORIA, Kan. — Bill Reigel of McNeese State College, Lake Charles, La., boosted his season total to 1,001 points for 29 games and retained his position as the nation's No. 1 collegiate basketball scorer with a 34.5 average, latest figures released by the NAIA revealed Wednesday.

Reigel hit for 43 points against Centenary in the first game of the NAIA district playoff at Shreveport to maintain a comfortable lead over Joe Miller of Alderson-Broadus College of Philippi, W. Va., who has 928 points in 29 games for a 32.0 average. Third was Chester Webb of the Georgia Teachers' Statesboro, Ga., with 813-31.3.

Both Reigel and Webb will appear in the NAIA national tournament opening at Kansas City Monday.

Northwest Nazarene College of Nampa, Idaho, had the best team defensive record, limiting rivals to an average of 57.21 points per game. Next was California Poly of San Dimas, Calif., with a 59.2 average.

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
