These are the classes about to start:

Upholstery, drapes and slipcovers.—Instructor: Mae Frye. Starts Monday night at 7 p.m. at the Fairgrounds. Runs each week night from 7 to 10 for two weeks.

Tailoring in the Home.—Instructor: Margaret Brubaker. Starts March 19 at 7 p.m. in Library Arts Room 7. Runs once a week. Fee \$7.50.

Bookkeeping.—Instructor: John Searle. Starts March 19 in Room LA-8 at 7:30 p.m. Runs Monday and Thursday. Fee \$12.

Typing.—Instructor: Ronald Burge. Starts March 20 at 7:30 in Room LA-10. Runs Tuesday and Wednesday weekly. Fee \$12.

General Sales Training.—Instructor: Hal McCall. Starts March 20 at 7 p.m. Runs each Tuesday in Room SA-4. It is a new class designed for sales persons who have been employed in selling jobs during the last year. It involves techniques of selling.

Practical Nursing.—Instructor: Sister Nivard, superintendent of nurses at Mercy Hospital. Starts March 21 at 7 p.m. in Mercy Hospital. Runs each Wednesday. Designed for people presently employed or wishing employment in home or hospital nursing. Fee \$5.

Industrial Mathematics.—Instructor: Hugh Macaulay. Starts March 19 at 7 p.m. in high school shops. This new class will involve trigonometry and logarithms. Fee \$7.50.

Speed Reading.—Instructor: Richard Gates. Starts March 20 in Room SA-1 at 7:30 p.m. Runs each Tuesday. It is designed for business managers or experienced sales people because of their volume of reading. Involves speed and comprehension of reading. Fee \$7.50.

Personal Finance Management.—Instructor: Ralph Snyder. Starts March 22 at 7 p.m. in Room SA-4. Runs each Thursday. Designed for those wishing instruction in management of personal finances, including stocks, bonds, banking, insurance, programming, legal aspects of finance. Snyder is coordinator of course, but guest consultants will be used during the course. Fee \$6.

Know Your Car (for women only).—Instructor: R. L. Madsen. Starts March 22 at 7 p.m. in Room SA-6. Runs each Thursday. Covers mechanical operation, care of cars, buying used cars and simplicity of operations. Fee \$6.

Traffic Mishap Victims Reported On Recovery Road

Two of five people injured in traffic accidents between Myrtle Creek and Canyonville Saturday night were reported improving satisfactorily at hospitals today. The others were treated but not hospitalized.

At Myrtle Creek Hospital with a broken left leg is George Larson Moreland, 30, Canyonville. At Forest Glen Hospital in Canyonville is Patricia Ann Harris, 15, Glendale, who received bad cuts and bruises in the same mishap.

Treated and released at Forest Glen were Loren Wade Duncan, 22, Days Creek, and Betty Harris, 14, Glendale. The Harris girl has a broken left wrist bone. Two others in the same car, Loren J. Smith, 32, and Opal Britt, both of Canyonville, were not injured.

State police said a car driven by Duncan missed a detour near the Riddle Junction late Saturday night, crashed through a barricade and rolled over.

In another mishap about 10 o'clock the same night, Barney Lee Hobbs, 60, of Herman's Addition, Myrtle Creek, received a broken nose when the car he was driving hit another near Ganz Mortuary south of Myrtle Creek, state police said.

Officers said the accident occurred at the scene of a prior minor accident. The car driven by Hobbs hit one driven by Joseph R. Allbritton of Peell, Wash., which in turn rammed a station wagon driven by Emma Mildred Strom of Oakland, Calif. Mrs. Strom, Allbritton and his wife Betty escaped injury.

Police said flagmen were stationed on each side of the scene of a minor accident, but Hobbs was unable to stop in time. He was cited for violation of the basic rule.

State Police Remind Trailer Lights Needed

Sgt. Robert Keefe, officer in charge of the state police office at Roseburg, today reminded that signaling devices are now required on all trailers where the ends of loads extend back more than 14 feet from the steering wheel of the vehicle pulling it.

The spring season will soon be here, Sgt. Keefe noted, and many boats will be moved. Boat trailers and other small trailers must be outfitted to conform with the new law.

Sgt. Keefe said his officers will enforce the requirement for signaling devices and the use of them, about the law may call the state police office.

Loyal Wife Dies In Snow In Effort To Aid Husband

MISSION, S.D. — "She wasn't wearing overshoes or warm clothing, but she insisted on going with me," a heartbroken farmer sobbed Sunday night as he told how his wife died of exposure during a howling blizzard.

Mrs. Ruth White, 30, wouldn't let her husband, Cornelius, walk for help alone after their car stalled near here Saturday.

The husband, 32, was subject to fainting spells and Mrs. White feared he might collapse.

So, leaving their four children with five other persons in the car, the farmer and his wife set out afoot. As they trudged through the heavy snow against strong wind, Mrs. White told her husband, "Keep praying, we'll make it."

But, when they were only three-fourths of a mile from the Adolph Buettner farm, Mrs. White was exhausted. "I'll wait here," she gasped. Her husband went on alone; Mrs. White stayed behind and died.

White related the ordeal here in the village jail, where he, his children and the others, all relatives, are staying until snowplows can break through to the White farm, five miles south of town. The road was still blocked by the 15-inch snowfall.

ger at the British in other actions. It suspended indefinitely the teaching of English in elementary and high schools. It closed the British Institute and four other British-subsidized agencies. It canceled horse races and all athletic meetings "as a precautionary measure."

Greek trade unions demanded the expulsion of British Ambassador Sir Charles Peake, whose presence in Athens they called a "dangerous provocation." Greece has already recalled her ambassador from London.

Nicostia shops opened for business today but closed again when word spread that workers had stayed away from factories. Security forces patrolled the city.

War Hero Badly Injured

British Maj. Tony Dean-Drummond, a hero-author of World War II, was in serious condition. A mob stoned his car Saturday night while he was driving through Kyrenia, Cyprus.

A 17-year-old Cypriot youth died when a hand grenade he was about to throw at a military ambulance exploded in his hand. He was with a group of rebels in the Troodos Mountains.

The British deported Archbishop Makarios Friday as he was preparing to leave for talks with the Greek government on his failure to win self-determination for Cyprus after five months of secret talks with the British.

British authorities on Cyprus said an analysis of seized documents indicated that Makarios had been under the thumb of the terrorist Eoka organization during the negotiations.

U. S. Bomber Reported In Algerian Explosion

RABAT, French Morocco, — A Strategic Air Force B-47 jet bomber is missing in Western Algeria and U.S. planes from North African bases are searching for it, an Air Force spokesman said Monday. A B-47 normally carries a crew of three.

Headquarters of the U.S. 11th Air Force here said they only knew there had been an accident and the plane was down. No details were available. A spokesman said the plane probably was from Macdill Air Force Base at Tampa, Fla.

The French news agency reported Sunday night the plane exploded in flight near Port Say, an Algerian coastal village near the Moroccan frontier.

Wildlife Policies Receive Praise From Gov. Smith

Management policies which have operated so successfully in preserving Oregon's exceptional resources are possible only through public understanding and cooperation, Gov. Elmo Smith said Monday in calling attention to National Wildlife Week March 18 to 24.

"Observance of National Wildlife Week affords me as governor of Oregon, an opportunity to commend and thank the organized sportsmen and all true conservationists of this state for their interest and cooperation in the field of wise use of natural resources," Governor Smith declared.

The theme of National Wildlife Week is "Save Endangered Wildlife."

"This theme calls attention to the fact that, while many birds, mammals and fish of the United States face extinction because of inadequate protection and management, Oregon's wildlife, with

but few exceptions remains, in abundance despite rapidly increasing hunting and angling pressures," the governor explained.

Organized groups of sportsmen, particularly those affiliated with the Oregon Wildlife Federation and the Oregon division of the Izaak Walton League of America, have made valuable contributions in educating the public in an appreciation of the importance of preservation and wise management.

Clubs and chapters in all parts of Oregon throughout the week will emphasize various phases of conservation as a means of stimulating greater public interest in the problems of natural resource management.
