

Snow Pack In Oregon 50 Per Cent Over Normal

PORTLAND (AP) — Western states can look forward to adequate irrigation water supplies, the U. S. Soil Conservation Service reports. Only in the southwest, Arizona and New Mexico, are water supplies seriously short.

The forecast included: Idaho — Water supplies are expected to be normal to above normal with a serious flood potential threatening in the Kootenai River Basin.

Montana — Record season stream flows assure ample water supplies.

Oregon — The snow pack in Oregon is nearly 50 per cent above normal with record amounts in some areas. Reservoir storage is about normal. Some local flooding of farm lands from the spring snow melt is expected.

Washington — Record snow packs are reported in Washington and irrigation water supplies will be abundant. Local flooding is expected in some areas.

Errors And Waste Cited In Navy Jet Fighter Failures

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators said this week "large errors" and "waste of public funds" marked a half billion dollar effort to build a Navy jet fighter.

A government operations subcommittee said the Navy, the McDonnell Aircraft Corp. and the Westinghouse Electric Corp. "must share the responsibility" for this.

But it said in a unanimous report that "final responsibility rests with the Navy as the government procuring agency."

The subcommittee's report followed hearings last Oct. 24-27 on the \$1 1/2-year history of the "Demon," built by McDonnell, St. Louis, Mo., with jet engines from Westinghouse.

Over that period, there were 11 crashes and four pilot deaths. Sixty of the planes were grounded because their engines didn't have enough power.

Some 220 of the later-model Demons, fitted with more powerful Allison jet engines, are finally being delivered for fleet use, the committee said. But it said the planes are "now or soon may be obsolete."

The House group made various recommendations aimed at preventing such "failures" in the future and improving military aircraft procurement.

It made "no charge of impropriety in the strict legal sense" on a side issue involving retired Rear Adm. Lloyd Harrison.

Adm. Harrison was deputy and assistant chief of the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics from September, 1952, until July 31, 1955. Next day he stepped into a \$20,800-a-year job as vice president of McDonnell.

Both James S. McDonnell, president of the aircraft firm, and Harrison testified the retired admiral has not used his military connections to gain favored treatment for McDonnell.

Rural Health Problems Need Cited At Meet

PORTLAND (AP) — An Oregon State College educator proposed here Saturday that each state have at least one specialist to work exclusively on rural health problems.

Health conditions in the rural areas of the country, though improved and still improving, are a challenge to society, F. L. Ballard, director of the agricultural extension division at OSC, said. He addressed the closing session of the National Congress on Rural Health.

He suggested that the rural health specialist be attached to each state extension service.

A movement to do this is underway, he said, but is lagging because of a shortage of trained personnel and heavy demands on extension workers for other programs.

W. C. Voskuil, Wisconsin farm editor, reported on a poll on doctors his magazine conducted. He said 86 per cent of those questioned said in general they are satisfied with the service of the doctors in their communities.

James E. Davis, president of the Ferry County Hospital Assn., told how the community of Republic, Wash., built and financed a community hospital.

Other speakers were Robert Baker of Blackwood, Wash., who explained his town's health program; Jared Lewis, district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar Co., Nyssa, Ore.; and Dr. David M. Witter, director of the dental health section of the Oregon State Board of Health.

Ex-School Board Member Found Guilty Of Assault

HILLSBORO (AP) — A jury Friday night convicted Louis Forrest, 25, a former member of the Scofield district school board, of assault and battery.

The charge against him grew out of the Valentine's Day beating of Mrs. Essie Robertson, 54, in the district's one-room, six-grade school near here.

The maximum penalty is a year in jail or a \$500 fine, or both. Circuit Judge Glen Hieber said he probably would pronounce sentence next week.

Forrest, an unemployed logger, pleaded self-defense. He said Mrs. Robertson attacked him first.

The jury deliberated 3 1/2 hours and cast seven ballots before convicting.

TAKE OUT POLICIES

SALEM (AP) — The State Veterans Department reports that 7,408 veteran home and farm loan borrowers have taken out 26 million dollars worth of mortgage cancellation life insurance. The average policy is \$3,856.

The insurance pays off a veteran's mortgage if he dies. About 80 per cent of the borrowers are covered under the new program.

Sen. Morse's Request To Disqualify Sen. Eastland Recommended To Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) urged the Senate last week to disqualify Sen. James Eastland (D-Miss.) from the chairmanship of the Judiciary Committee, he was recommending a reprimand which the Senate has meted out on only three occasions in its history.

Eastland came in line for the committee chairmanship through death of Sen. Harley Kilgore (D-W.Va.), the only Democrat who outranked Eastland in point of service on the committee. When the formal order of Eastland's election as chairman came before the Senate, Morse and Sen. Herbert Lehman (D-N.Y.) protested on grounds that Eastland's avowed defiance of the Supreme Court's anti-segregation ruling disqualified him to head the Judiciary Committee.

"The seniority practice of the Senate is a custom and a tradition and not a rule," Morse pointed out in trying to encourage others to vote against Eastland.

He said history showed there are three precedents in which seniority was cast aside, one of them involving a former senator from Oregon.

Morse argued that Eastland had disqualified himself by his own words when he said the Supreme Court's integration decision "will justly cause (Morse emphasized the word 'justly') evasion and violation of law and contempt for law."

"The senator's use of the language 'it will justly cause' disturbs me very much," said Morse. "It would seem to imply an encouragement on his part to law evasion and violation."

From a campaign speech by Eastland in Mississippi last year Morse drew additional quotes on which to base his contentions about the Dixiecrat senator's qualifications.

Eastland told his audience that late in 1949 through seniority he became chairman of the civil rights subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee.

"Yes, Eastland of Mississippi became the boss of the committee that had all the civil rights bills," Eastland declared. "And ever since then the CIO and these organizations have been yapping and yapping that I was arrogant and high handed with them, and so I was; and they said that I broke the law, and so I did. You know the law says the committee has got to meet once a week; and there I was chairman of the subcommittee, and there were northerners up there, Yankees, who didn't know anything about the question, who were lined up against me. Do you know what happened? Why, for the three years I was chairman, that committee didn't hold a meeting."

Such a speech, said Morse, did "not instill in me any confidence that he would serve impartially as chairman of the Judiciary Committee."

The three precedents for bypassing the senior committee member to elect a chairman, Morse told the Senate, were:

1. In 1871 when Sen. Charles Sumner of Mass. was replaced as chairman of Foreign Relations by Sen. Simon Cameron. On this occasion, lengthy debate on the issue was climaxed by Sumner withdrawing his name. The Senate then elected Cameron 33 to 9.

2. In 1923 when Sen. Albert B. Cummins of Iowa was serving as chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee, opposition developed to him. The result was a dragged out floor fight in which none of three candidates for the chairmanship could muster a majority vote of the Senate to be elected for over a year. Finally, Sen. Smith of South Carolina won out over Cummins and Sen. Robert M. LaFollette, Sr.

3. In 1924 the chairmanship of the Public Lands Committee opened up. The top ranking senator, Sumner of Utah, was already chairman of the Finance Committee, so the second ranking senator, Ladd of North Dakota, was elected chairman. Next year opposition to Ladd developed and Sen. Stanfield of Oregon won out in a balloting with Ladd.

The Senate was unwilling to ballot on Eastland. He was elected by voice vote.

Neuberger Says McKay Agreeable On One Thing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) says he and Secretary of Interior McKay and Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) apparently have found something they all agree on: They are opposed to Eugene's proposed Beaver Marsh power project in Oregon.

Neuberger said McKay has indicated he will be on hand to testify against the project when the Senate Public Works Subcommittee holds a hearing on the matter March 21.

The hearing will be on a bill, co-sponsored by Neuberger and Morse, to cancel Eugene's license to build the project on the upper McKenzie River.

Neuberger and Morse said the project would destroy an outstanding fishing, recreational and scenic wild area.

McKay was not available for comment when the Eugene application was before the Federal Power Commission, but he notified an examiner of his personal opposition to the project, although it was endorsed by his department.

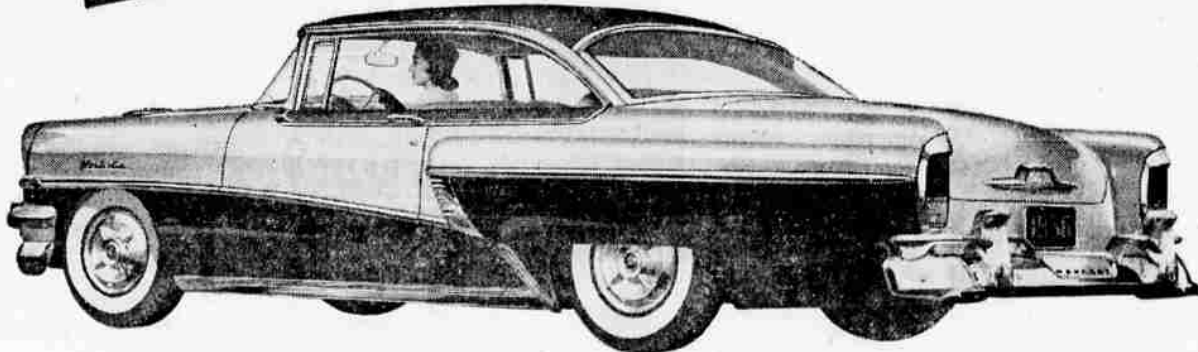

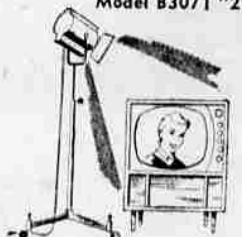
