## Nixon Feels Eisenhower Handled Situation Right

WASHINGTON (AP) — "Exactly right" is Vice President Nixon's word for the short-of-endorsement commendation President Eisenhower has given him, says chairman Leonard W. Hall of the Republican National Committee.

The GOP chairman, talking with reporters at the White House after a 30-minute conference with Eisenhower Monday, said Nixon had told him that "a couple of times."

Eisenhower at his news conference last week renewed his frequently voiced praise of Nixon as a man and an associate but stopped short of stating direct support of Nixon for a second round as No. 2 man on the Republican ticket.

Eisenhower said he had told Nixon to "chart his own course and tell me what he would like to do."

Eisenhower has made the point that picking a vice presidential nominee customarily waits on the selection of a choice for President. Hall said he and Eisenhower did not discuss the question of whether Nixon should be his running mate again.

For himself, Hall repeated what he has been saying all along—that he assumes the ticket will be Eisenhower and Nixon.

"It seems to me that everybody is concerned about the vice presidency except Dick Nixon," Hall said.

"Nixon feels that the President has handled the situation exactly right."

Asked whether he expects convention time will come around before there is any public word on Nixon's response to the Eisenhower request that he chart his own course, Hall said he doesn't know. The Republican nominating convention opens in San Francisco Aug. 29.

Another question was whether any Republican leaders have expressed to Hall any concern lest Nixon be a political liability on the ticket. Hall replied that he has no information on that except what he has seen in various polls.

"I would say that as far as the

(Republican) organization is concerned, Mr. Nixon rates very high," Hall said.

He said he visited Eisenhower to give "a general report on operations," including party financing.

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — The newly organized Oregon Metallurgical Corp. will open bids March 20 on construction of a titanium ingot casting plant here.

The structure is to be located on a 59-acre tract a mile south of the Albany city limits.

The company plans an initial payroll of about 60, which will be enlarged as the plant expands. Stephen M. Shelton, regional director of the U.S. Bureau of Mines, will be general manager of the new plant. He is resigning his federal post March 15.

### Primary Rivalry For Senate Gives McKay Surprise

PORTLAND (AP) — Larry Smyth, political editor of the Oregon Journal, said Monday that Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay thought, when he left Washington to file in the Oregon primary, that all opposition had agreed to withdraw.

Smyth said he had learned McKay was astonished on arriving here Friday to learn no one had been told he was going to enter in the effort to beat Democrat Wayne Morse in the fall.

McKay had been prepared to announce, on arriving here, that he was in the race. But when this came as a surprise to local candidates and party leaders, he began to hesitate, Smyth wrote.

It was only after a full morning of conferences that McKay decided to go ahead.

"It is no secret," Smyth wrote, "the people who have always gone out in the front of McKay's campaigns were completely in the dark about his trip home. No one in the nation's capital had discussed the situation with them."

This information, Smyth said, came from local Republican leaders rather than from McKay.

### Boost In Production Of Pulp Predicted
