

### Two Power Dam Projects Opposed By Sportsmen

EUGENE, Ore. — Opposition to two proposed Oregon hydroelectric projects was expressed here this week by directors of the Isaak Walton League of Oregon.

Representing 32 chapters in the state, the directors went on record against Eugene's proposed Beaver Marsh project on the upper McKenzie River and against the Pelton dam project on the Deschutes River, contemplated by Portland General Electric.

The directors expressed support for initiative legislation to prohibit salmon netting in coastal streams south of the Columbia and supported amendments to the Metcalf bill which would return to Congress authority to grant oil exploration leases on wildlife refuges.

At present, this authority has been delegated to the Interior Department.

Rollin Bowles, state Isaak Walton League president, said he will go to Washington to represent his group at the March 21 congressional hearing on Senator Neuherr's bill to revoke Eugene's license to build Beaver Marsh. The license was granted by the Federal Power Commission.

### U. S. Protestant Clergymen Get Soviet Welcome

MOSCOW, U.S.S.R. — A delegation of American Protestant clergymen has arrived in Moscow for the first formal talks with representatives of the Russian Orthodox faith.

The 10-man group was greeted at the airport by bearded Metropolitan Nikolai, who welcomed them on behalf of Patriarch Alexei, head of the church in Russia. Nikolai expressed the hope their visit would "result in better relations."

Dr. Eugene Carson Blake of Philadelphia, president of the National Council of Churches, took the Metropolitan's hand and replied while American and Russian television cameras whirred.

"We bring a greeting to all the people of your churches from the Christian people of the United States. We hope to have interesting and fruitful conversations."

The talks will hinge on a seven-point agenda including what the churches of the two countries are doing to promote world peace.

A group of Russian clergymen is to repay the visit in June.

### School Project Money Up For Yoncalla Meet

A meeting for all persons in Yoncalla Union High School District 9 will be held March 19 in an effort to find ways of raising money for a stage and music room, correspondent Mrs. George Edes reports.

Plans for the meeting were outlined at the last school board session.

County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg and architect Lyle F. Glenn, both of Roseburg, will be present to discuss the problem, it was announced.

In other board affairs, it was announced that bids have called on purchase of a new 48-passenger school bus, to be delivered before next school year, Mrs. Edes said.

### Lt. Governor Initiative Signing Need Increased

SALEM, Ore. — The State Grange will have to get 49,933 signatures if they expect to put their lieutenant governor initiative on the ballot.

Last week, it was announced that 32,000 signatures are needed, but Dave O'Hara, chief of the number of people who voted for supreme court justices at the preceding election. The requirement for initiatives that merely would amend laws remains at 8 per cent.

Since the Grange measure, which would provide a lieutenant governor for the state, would amend the constitution, the 10 per cent requirement applies.

### Students Given Penalty In Negro Co-ed Riot Case

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — One student was expelled, four others suspended and a score more less severely punished by the University of Alabama Monday for participation in rioting which drove Negro co-ed Autherine Lucy from the campus Feb. 6.

Leonard Wilson, 29-year-old sophomore from Selma, Ala., was called from class and expelled. His was the only name announced in the disciplinary action by the university's Board of Trustees.

Three other students, the trustees announced, have withdrawn from school during the investigation and will not be allowed to return unless they are able to clear themselves of charges against them.

Wilson had forecast his dismissal. He addressed two rallies of pro-segregation students and called for a "top-to-bottom housecleaning" at the university in a speech before a Birmingham White Citizens Council last Tuesday.

The trustees said Monday he had made "unwarranted and outrageous public attacks" on the integrity of the president and faculty and officers of the university.

These attacks, it added, "represent far more than the mere exercise of his right to freely debate the question of segregation."
