

Tentative Reports Will Be Offered By 7 Committees Studying School Problems

Wed. Mar. 14, 1956—The News-Review, Roseburg, Ore. 3

Tentative reports by seven citizen committees working on school problems will be presented at two hearings in Roseburg next week, according to Kenneth F. Barneburg, county school superintendent.

An average of 10 lay people per committee have been working on the reports for four months, with each committee holding five or six sessions and one holding seven meetings. Members from all over the county met at Roseburg to make the studies.

The committees were set up by the School Board Convention, directed by the state Legislature to study organization finances and other matters which need perusal.

Dates Established
The SBC steering committee has set March 21 and March 23 as dates for the reports, at 7:30 p.m. on each date at Fullerton School. Chairmen or committee members designated by the chairman will report on the work of the following committees: State aid, county equalization, federal aid, school district organization, financing buildings, sites and equipment, the teacher shortage and the Douglas County School Office.

Barneburg emphasized that the hearings are being held before final reports are adopted. He invited and urged county residents to attend the sessions. After the reports are given, committees will meet to formulate final reports, which will be presented to the convention in Roseburg on April 4.

Convention Last October
The School Board Convention for Douglas County was called last Oct. 31 at Myrtle Creek. A legislative interim committee composed of three representatives, two senators and one lay person from each congressional district, was set up at the same time a joint resolution was passed which directed all county superintendents to call the conventions. Convention reports of recommendations to the state superintendent of public instruction must be transmitted to the interim committee on or before July 1 for presentation at the next session of the legislature.

Public Urged To Attend
It is important that people attend the hearings in Roseburg, Barneburg said, because the local recommendations may affect every school district in one form or another and may be the bases for new state laws.

Barneburg praised the "terrific" participation of the lay committee who took part at their own expense.

Committees on state aid, county equalization and district organization will report the evening of March 21; committees on the teacher shortage, federal aid, county school office and financing will report on March 23.

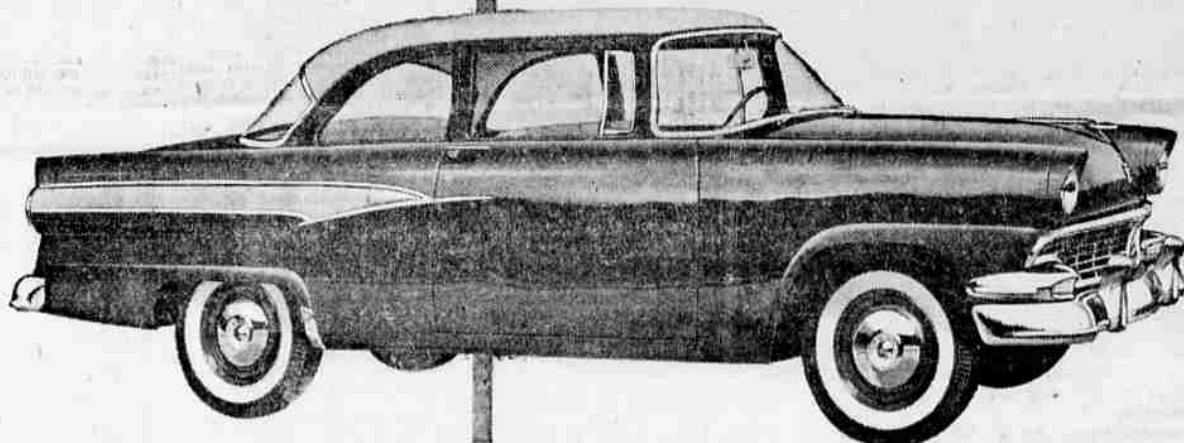
