Kefauver Says U. S. Is Again Near War Brink

DULUTH, Minn. (AP) — Sen. Estes Kefauver says "there are ominous signs that we may be walking up to the brink again." The threat of war this time, says the Tennessee Democrat, is in North Africa and the Middle East.

Campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination, Kefauver told a rally of the United Steelworkers in West Duluth last night: "I do not think that it was Secretary of State Dulles who brought us back from the brink of war. I think we came back by the grace of God."

Kefauver said Dulles had boasted that during the three years the Republicans have been in power, he had "taken us to the brink of war three times and brought us back again."

The senator also said he favors outright repeal rather than amendment of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

"Then we can start fresh with a clean slate and a clean bill," he told an audience of United Steelworkers. "Labor must be free from the disruptions of labor-management relations which have been the heritage of this act."

Kefauver, subject of an attack by Adlai Stevenson yesterday, told newsmen he would not comment on the episode.

"You will not hear one word from my lips, not one word of criticism of Mr. Stevenson," Kefauver said. "He is a man of high principles."

Malenkov Joins Londoners' Rush In Britain Visit

LONDON (AP) — Former Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov smiling and gay, joined Londoners' morning rush hour Friday for his first real look at the teeming British capital.

From the Soviet Embassy he was driven through jam-packed streets past Hyde Park to Oxford St., London's busiest shopping area. He even made a slight detour past the U.S. Embassy in Grosvenor Square, the district Londoners call "Little America."

Malenkov, now Soviet minister of power stations, ended up at the offices of the Central Electricity Authority.

Stevenson Attacks Administration, Jibes At Kefauver

EVELETH, Minn. (AP) — Adlai Stevenson last night accused the administration of "a deadly drift" while a chorus of Madison Avenue hucksters cries peace-peace and prosperity.

Stevenson jokingly likened Vice President Nixon to a "national calamity," and rebuked Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), with whom he is contesting in next Tuesday's Minnesota primary for delegates to the Democratic presidential nominating convention.

Terming this a "time of great decision, of great danger and great promise," Stevenson said: "Abroad we can see the fires of nationalism flaming across Asia and Africa. We can hear the voices from the Kremlin pronouncing a new foreign policy, aimed at capturing the uncommitted third of the world — the third that controls the delicate balance of peace."

At home, he said, there is a farm depression and racial unrest in the South that threaten a constitutional crisis. "And with all this," he said, "comes a sense of drift in Washington, a deadly drift that goes on."

Stevenson, endorsed by the state Democratic — Farmer — Labor (DFL) party, said yesterday at Nashua, N.H.: "I regret that your congressmen, John Blain, and other DFL leaders should be attacked by my distinguished and respected friend Sen. Kefauver, merely because they saw fit to endorse me."

"We all know the unrelenting purpose of the Republicans is to fight among ourselves. Certainly the Republicans should not have the assistance of Democrats in that mission."

7-Man Highway Interim Group Coming Monday

A seven-man Legislative Highway Interim Committee will be in Roseburg at 1:30 p.m. Monday to hear discussion on several items of proposed legislation.

It will be one of seven public hearings to be conducted in southern and eastern Oregon and set up by the Legislative Highway Interim Committee.

One of the most controversial subjects to be discussed will be that of establishment of a separate state parks department. The state parks now are administered by the State Highway Commission.

Another will be on farm license plate registration problems. Legislation has been proposed to place vehicles or vehicle combinations in excess of 20,000 pounds, and carrying farm plates under the jurisdiction of the State Public Utilities Commission. It would then be required that such vehicles pay weight-mile tax fees.

Other subjects will be the proposed transfer of the weighmasters from the State Highway Dept. to state police and problems in the acquisition of right-of-way.

The chairman of the committee, Sen. Warren A. McMinimee, Tillamook, said other matters which should properly come before the committee will be heard. Written comments are welcomed, he said.

Other members of the committee are: Rep. Robert L. Elstrom, Salem; Rep. William W. Braden, Burns; Sen. Charles W. Bingner, LaGrande; Sen. Walter C. Leth, Monmouth; Rep. E. A. Little, Medford; and Rep. Fred McKee, Portland.

McMinimee was chairman of the Senate Roads and Highway Committee and Elstrom was chairman of the House Highways Committee.

Senator Morse Stopping Weekly Radio Broadcast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse will stop making his weekly recording for broadcast over Oregon radio stations.

The Democratic senator said he is discontinuing the broadcasts in view of protests of Republican officials against his weekly public service radio broadcasts and in fairness to radio stations which have provided the people of Oregon with these broadcasts as a public service.

His statement Thursday said "it is obvious that the Republican officials fear the truth, and the facts." He said the protest was a compliment to the effectiveness of the broadcasts "in telling the people of Oregon the truth about legislative happenings in the Senate."

Earlier, Wendell Wyatt, state Republican chairman, had asked Oregon radio stations to provide GOP candidates with the same amount of time Morse had for his broadcast.

The Federal Communications Commission said Thursday, however, that radio stations carrying the senator's broadcasts could be required to provide equal time to Morse's opponent in the Democratic primary race—Woody Smith, Hood River.

Republican candidates would not be entitled to equal time.

Yoncalla Pioneer Dies At Eugene

Segregation Debate Hits Eisenhower's Attitude On Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's attitude toward segregation was both criticized and defended as debate over the controversial issue flared again Friday in the Senate.

Sen. Lehman (D-N.Y.) quoted the President as having advocated moderation and as having warned against "the extremists" in the segregation dispute. He asked whether Eisenhower is "a neutralist."

Sen. Case (R-N.J.) described this as an "unwarranted and unfair" suggestion and pleaded that there be no more "suggestion of politics" in debate over the school integration issue.

Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told the Senate it was Vice President Nixon who first injected politics into the issue. He said this was in a New York speech asserting that a "Republican chief justice," Earl Warren, delivered the Supreme Court's unanimous ruling against school segregation.

Case said he regards that reference by Nixon as "unfortunate" and believes the vice president feels the same way. The flurry of debate was touched off by a speech in which Lehman called upon the President to "assume the responsibility" for enforcement of the Supreme Court school integration decree. He said he could not "stand above the battle, like President Eisenhower, and say with fine impartiality that both sides must show restraint."

Case said in reply that "any suggestion that the President of the United States is a neutralist or stands above this quarrel (segregation) is unwarranted and unfair."

to said city to levy a continuing annual ad valorem tax of not to exceed .8 of 1 mill for the support of the Roseburg City Library be canceled and revoked; and in lieu thereof shall said city be authorized annually hereafter to levy an ad valorem property tax of not to exceed .5 of 1 mill outside the 6 per cent constitutional limitation, to provide funds as a contribution of said city to the support of the Douglas County, Oregon, Library."

The council discussed relative merits of the ordinance for some time. Sidney Moon expressed belief the council should not present an issue to voters it was not fully convinced was right. Another member, Ross Myers, thought public vote was a "good method for getting people's feeling."

Councilman Rudolph Ritzman thought more attention should be taken in how any such monies were spent. And so, the discussion ranged.

Councilman James Knudson, also chairman of the library committee thought "people ought to have the right to vote on the levy."

His committee had recommended the original ordinance. Knudson said the council could always vote down city support (estimated at around \$5,000).

The brief session Thursday apparently closes another chapter in the lengthy discussion on pros and cons of partial city support of the county library.

On Feb. 20, by the vote of 4 to 3, the council approved preparation of the ordinance. On Feb. 27 the ordinance received its first reading without comment. March 14 reading was completed and the levy was fixed 4-2.

Joining Harris in voting against the levy Thursday were Moon and Ritzman. Councilman George Lumma was not present.

To allow vote on the ordinance, the council invoked the emergency clause.

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"I fear we may begin another pile up of butter, cheese and dairy products in government storage," he said.

Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.) has an amendment to knock out a proposed two-price plan for rice. But Ellender said he understood Dirksen was less inclined to push it since the Senate had voted 54-39 for a "domestic parity" plan for wheat.

The wheat and rice plans both contemplate high supports for grain consumed in this country while allowing exports to find their price in the world market.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) and other dairy state lawmakers contend the provisions to which Anderson objects would add some 120 million dollars to annual incomes of dairymen who market milk used for manufacturing butter, cheese and similar products.

Dairy state senators claimed more than enough votes to retain the provisions even if Anderson pushes his amendment.

ered to declare war and President Eisenhower has said he has no intention of engaging U.S. forces in military operations abroad without consulting Congress.

Parliamentary assent similarly is required in France.

Algeria, Cyprus and the Holy Land are interlinked in a holy pattern of trouble, actual and potential.

The British used the curfew against the Cypriot port of Limassol, which they described as always a bad trouble spot in the terrorist campaign of a union-with-Greece advocates. British troops isolated Limassol and launched an intensive search for fugitive guerrillas.

The Greek Orthodox Church of Cyprus, in its first official statement since the British exiled its Archbishop, Makarios, declared "our will is not broken."

In Jerusalem, an Israeli army spokesman reported a fresh exchange of fire on the Gaza frontier. He said Egyptian positions in the Gaza strip opened up four times at Israeli outposts in the Kissufim and Beeri area and the outposts returned the fire. He said there were no Israeli casualties.

TROOPS ARRIVE
