PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Feed and Seed Dealers Assn. was told Friday that the Eisenhower administration's soil bank program is designed to solve problems created by unwise agriculture policies of past years.

E. L. Peterson, assistant Agriculture secretary and former director of the Oregon Agriculture Department, said the plan is intended to cut production, reduce surpluses and make price supports more effective.

Gov. Elmo Smith addressed some 300 dealers at an afternoon session. He promised the cooperation of the state in helping solve feed and seed problems.

NEW YORK (AP) — Six Oregon high school newspapers won high honors in the 32nd annual Columbia Scholastic Press Assn. contest, Columbia University, sponsor, announced Friday.

The Lantern, Pendleton High School, won a medalist award for printed newspapers in schools with 301 to 500 students. The White Buffalo of Madras Union High School won a first place rating in the same classification, and the Umpqua Chief, Reedsport Union High School, received a second.

The Hummer, Beaverton Union High School, took a first place award for printed newspapers in schools with 1,001 to 1,500 students. The MAHI-Times, Marshfield High School, rated in second place in the same category.

The Jeffersonian, Jefferson High School, Portland, received a second place award for printed newspapers in schools with 1,501 to 2,500 students.

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Elkton School Principal Turns In Resignation

Louis E. Price, principal of the Elkton Grade School for the last 10 years, has resigned. His resignation becomes effective in June.

Price said he would not be able to qualify for his administrator's credentials and therefore could not continue as an administrator next year.

He told correspondent Ariel Hubbard that his plans for the future are indefinite. He said he and his wife will probably seek teaching positions in some other school system, preferably in Douglas County.

Price said he felt fortunate in having few changes on the Elkton school board during his tenure there. Board members Norman Weatherly and Eugene Fisher have served continuously on the board while Price has been principal.

He said he enjoyed "wonderful support and cooperation from parents, teachers and other employees" during his time in the system.

Storm Damage Re-evaluations Now Being Made

A re-evaluation of storm damage done Douglas County roads is being made now by a Bureau of Public Roads representative and the Douglas County engineer, reports County Judge Carl C. Hill.

At the request of the governor, the county sent an estimate of between \$30,000 and \$35,000 damages after the first storm in December, but this was only the beginning of the damage, Hill said.

Other high water followed in January and February and continued bad weather made it "one big storm" for almost three months. The damage continued to compound during that time.

Now another claim has been sent to the federal government for disaster aid totaling \$220,000. As a result of this claim, the BPR representative is making a survey with the county engineer.

Judge Hill said the \$220,000 figure was only what was considered by the county as "re-imbursable" damage. The actual damage he said, is being estimated at between \$200,000 and \$280,000.

He cited one example of Bullock Road between Sutherland and Elkton near Highway 225 where the whole road on a rock bluff dropped into the Umpqua River. Actual damage cost on this and other mishaps as a result of the ravages of weather won't be known definitely for another two or three weeks he said.

FAMED CHURCH BURNED
CHICAGO (AP) — Fire burned out the interior of one of Chicago's oldest and most elaborate churches, the St. Paul's Episcopal Church on the south side, Friday night causing an estimated loss of a half million dollars.

Raymond J. Daley, acting chief fire marshal, who estimated the damage, said the cause of the special-alarm blaze had not been determined.

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Weary Senators Take Saturday Off From Farm Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Weary senators took the weekend off today for St. Patrick's Day speeches and other political duties before tackling the omnibus farm bill again sometime late Monday.

Before recessing, the Senate approved without a record vote an amendment to provide 500 million dollars — instead of 250 million — for federal purchase of beef, pork and other perishable farm products not eligible for other types of price support.

Senators estimate the farm bill, once enacted, would add from 3 1/2 to 5 billion dollars to farmers' incomes this year.

Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), who directs the legislative machinery, called for the recess last night after another nine hours of wrangling and voting failed to bring final passage.

Johnson told newsmen he could not guess when the Senate would complete action on the omnibus bill. That has been its main business since Feb. 22.

"I think we're making good progress," he said cheerfully. "About 60 amendments still are pending although many of them probably will not be pressed."

One possible battle was averted yesterday when Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.) announced he would not challenge the bill's provision for a two-price plan for rice. He noted the Senate already has added a similar program for next year's wheat crop.

Mme. Irene Curie Passes In Paris

PARIS (AP) — Mme. Irene Joliot-Curie, Nobel prize winning physicist and daughter of the discoverers of radium, died today. She was 58.

She was the daughter of Pierre and Marie Curie, who gained world renown with their discovery of radium.

She and her husband, Frederic Joliot-Curie, were awarded the Nobel prize in 1935 for the discovery of artificial radioactivity.

After World War II both Mme. Joliot-Curie and her husband were widely criticized for alleged pro-Communist activities.

The French government ousted her from its atomic energy commission in 1951. Her husband had been removed as head of the body a year earlier because of his Communist associations.

In 1954, the American Chemical Society rejected Mme. Joliot-Curie's application for membership on belief she was a Communist.

When she was detained briefly at Ellis Island in 1948 upon her arrival in the United States for a lecture tour she said she was sympathetic to communism "in many things," but she denied she was a Communist.

Louis Lambert Reportedly Takes Own Life Today

A 67-year-old semi-retired Reedsport pile layer, Louis Joseph Lambert, apparently committed suicide Saturday about 9:30 a.m.

Coroner L. L. (Jim) Powers said Lambert's body was discovered about one mile west of the Reedsport city limits on the old highway.

There were no notes near the body, the coroner said. Details concerning the incident were vague, but Lambert appeared to have used a shotgun. The coroner said death from the shotgun blast through the heart was instantaneous. Lambert had apparently been in poor health.

Investigation on the matter is continuing, Coroner Powers said. Lambert is survived by his wife. His is the first apparent suicide in Douglas County in 1936.

Eugene Peckham Pleads Innocent To Assault

Eugene Donald Peckham, 28, 1067 Myrtle Ave. Roseburg, pleaded innocent to an assault charge when he appeared before acting Municipal Judge John Horn Saturday morning.

He was released on \$50 bail and has been scheduled to appear in court for trial June 13.

Peckham was arrested Friday night in front of a tavern in West Roseburg by city police. He was charged with assault after the arrest. His wife, Gwen, signed the complaint early Saturday.

The apparent theft of miscellaneous hand tools and other small logging equipment has been reported to state police by Winston logger D. B. Fox.

Fox said the items were removed earlier this week from his log land about four miles east of Cow Creek Junction. He listed as missing: Hand tools, chain saw, two grease guns and one double-bitted ax.

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Thousands Cheer Rhee As Dulles Visits In Korea

SEOUL (AP) — Thousands of demonstrators, demanding the reelection of President Syngman Rhee, converged on South Korea's presidential mansion today as Rhee conferred with U.S. Secretary of State Dulles on "present tactics of the Communist rulers."

Three thousand war veterans, labor union members, school children and gray-robed Buddhist monks formed outside the gates. All marched to the scene in tight military columns.

The demonstration appeared timed for Dulles' appearance following his arrival at Seoul airport from Formosa.

Many of the demonstrators' banners urged Rhee to accept a third term nomination as a step toward uniting South and Communist North Korea.

Dulles, in a prepared arrival statement, said he was eager to meet with Rhee and discuss present Communist strategy. He called Rhee one of the world's outstanding figures and spoke of America's commitment "to resist here any future Communist aggression."

Dulles, appearing tired from his 10-nation swing through Asia following the SEATO conference at Karachi, was given an uproarious welcome. Both sides of the broad boulevard leading from the airport to Rhee's home were lined with flag-waving children.

Estelle Conover Passes Friday

Estelle Vaughn Conover, 85, resident of Roseburg for the last 14 years, died at the Riverside Sanitarium March 16, following a prolonged period of ill health.

She was born at Flint, Mich., May 15, 1870. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Roseburg and the Roseburg Women's Club.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. C. H. (Charlotte) Bailey, and a nephew, William H. Bailey, both of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary, Monday, March 19, at 10 a.m., with Dr. James Miller of the First Presbyterian Church officiating.

Concluding services and interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Denunciation Of Stalin Stirs Riots In Georgia

pose of convincing the West that Russia now is ruled by more reasonable men.

Information reaching London said student groups paraded through the Georgian capital of Tiflis carrying banners and portraits of the once-revered leader and touching off disturbances. The riots rapidly erupted March 7, two days after the third anniversary of Stalin's death went unning in the Soviet press.

U. S. officials in Washington said they had unconfirmed reports that a number of persons were killed in rioting.

Diplomats leaving the Soviet Union say the country is seething with suppressed excitement over the reported savage attack on Stalin by Soviet party boss Nikita Khrushchev.

Khrushchev is said to have told the Communist party Congress that Stalin butchered his comrades, and committed blunders both in politics and war.

Reports reaching London said tight Russian censorship had been clamped on the story.

Khrushchev's reported denunciation of Stalin climaxed the anti-Stalin theme of the recent congress.

First hint the Kremlin leaders were planning to discredit Stalin came in a speech by Deputy Soviet Premier A. I. Mikoyan at the opening of the congress. Mikoyan lashed out at Stalin's political works as behind the times and not in touch with the Marxist-Leninist line.

Since then, the destruction of the Stalin myth has increased in tempo.

London newspapers splashed the Khrushchev story across their front pages in bold type. Early editions were rushed to the Soviet Embassy and translated for former Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov, now touring Britain as minister of power stations.

Soviet Ambassador Jacob Malik stayed up much of the night translating the stories for Malenkov who was reportedly implicated in Khrushchev's remarks.

The Mail quoted Khrushchev as saying that during the early World War II days he tried to appeal to Stalin for more guns for the Ukraine but was told by Malenkov by telephone Stalin was not available. Khrushchev was also quoted as saying Stalin was sitting next to Malenkov when Malenkov denied he was in the Kremlin.

The embassy had no comment.

Dan Henderson Named Drain City Councilman

Dan Henderson has been appointed Drain City Councilman to replace William Chatham, who has resigned because he has been assigned to California by his insurance company.

Henderson will serve until the end of the year when election is scheduled for new city officials, according to the Drain Enterprise.

Kefauver, Stevenson Spar In Minnesota's Primary

MOORHEAD, Minn. (AP) — Minnesota's presidential primary moved toward its Tuesday climax with Adlai Stevenson and Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) making simultaneous pitches for votes for their Democratic delegate slates here today.

Stevenson said he would deliver a major farm policy address in the Concordia College fieldhouse as part of a Greater Moorhead Days celebration.

Kefauver, whose supporters were turned down in pleas that their candidate be invited to address the same audience, said he would be "out handshaking while the former Illinois governor is speaking."

Kefauver first had announced he would speak in the Moorhead Armory four hours before the set-off.

Phil Hitchcock, Senate Seat Seeker, Visits Here

in all the bigger counties, with the exception of Douglas.

He'll be back through Roseburg early next week, he revealed.

Hitchcock explained that he and Morse were fairly close in "most thinking" in 1950. That was the year he was elected to the first of two terms in the Oregon Senate. In 1954, he resigned to become affiliated with Lewis & Clark College, Portland, in public relations and church work and as an instructor in political science.

The issue after the May primary will be whether Oregon people favor the Eisenhower administration and a man to support it, or whether they will prefer an anti-Eisenhower man, as Hitchcock sees it.

The issue, he said, will be highlighted by a statement of Morse's which he said was published in a 1953 issue of the New Republic: "In my judgment, he (Eisenhower) is the most dangerous man who will ever have been in the White House."

"I believe," said Hitchcock, "that as a Republican candidate, I can have a campaign on that issue."

He also said he expects to make his views clear on major issues of interest to Oregon. He named these as being the farm problem, power, timber resources and conservation.

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
