

Dons Stop UCLA, 72-61, Clash With Utah Tonight

CORVALLIS, Ore. — San Francisco, having disposed of the Pacific Coast Conference champions, UCLA, 72-61, move on against Utah Saturday night, favored to win in another playoff step toward its second consecutive NCAA basketball title.

The teams meet in the finals of the NCAA Far West regional playoff after UCLA and Seattle tangled in a preliminary game at 7:30 p.m. (PST). Utah downed Seattle Friday night, 81-72.

UCLA had been expected to provide San Francisco with its toughest competition of the year so far, but with 6-10 All-American Bill Russell smothering UCLA's ace, 6-5 Willie Naulls, and about three other players at the same time, it became merely another game in San Francisco's record string of victories. It was the 52nd straight.

Sub Scores Points
The nation's No. 1 team also gave the answer to doubters who thought the absence of guard K.C. Jones might be disastrous against a polished team like UCLA, ranked No. 8 in The Associated Press poll. Jones' eligibility ran out last month.

His replacement, Gene Brown, a slender 6-2 sophomore, flitted about the court, intercepting passes and shooting baskets as if he had been playing all season.

He wound up with scoring honors at 23 points, long applause from the sellout crowd of 10,000 and praise from the rival coaches and his teammates.

Best Sub On Coast
"We all knew Brown was the best substitute on the coast," said Russell, who scored 21 points, 13 of them in the first half when San Francisco romped to a 39-21 lead. After that San Francisco coasted.

"Brown's fine performance was not at all unexpected," said Phil Woolpert, San Francisco coach. John Wooden, UCLA coach, added, "he was not as strong as Jones defensively, but perhaps better offensively."

Utah and almost all the way in downing Seattle but midway

that preserved the margin. Center Art Bunte again was Utah's high scorer, compiling 24 points, mostly on push shots from the key. Bergen had 16. Dick Stricklin had 16 for Seattle.

Jack Gardner, coach of Utah, which was ranked No. 18 in the AP poll, said of the game: "We have a great deal of respect for San Francisco, of course, but we're going out to win. Being idle for the past week hurt us. Our edge was gone and we were sluggish in our play. I hope the game against Seattle will help ready us."

Woolpert said he believed the key to the win over UCLA was Russell's guarding of Naulls.

"He completely neutralized Naulls," Woolpert said.

In fact, Russell neutralized almost everyone. He blocked so many shots that the sharpshooting UCLA team could sink only 20 per cent of its shots from the floor in the first half, when San Francisco took an 18-point advantage.

UCLA made only five field goals in the period. Only two of those were on shots from out in front. The other three were tips that Naulls managed when Russell was busy on the other side of the basket.

Billy Maxwell Leader In St. Petersburg Open

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Billy Maxwell wants the big slice of the \$12,500 St. Petersburg Open golf prize money as a wedding anniversary present. And he's a good bet to collect it.

The 26-year-old former National Amateur champion shaved seven strokes off a par in the second round with a 34-31-65 and had a three stroke lead going into Saturday's third round.

Maxwell, married five years ago Saturday, never strayed over par. His 133 total at the midway mark gave him a good working margin over a trio tied for second at 136.

Maxwell, who has been worth his weight in money. He was plucked off the Michigan State campus in 1948 and given \$25,000 to sign by the Phils. Since then he's compiled 160 victories against 102 defeats.

Moore, a San Diego disc jockey, is tuning up to defend his world title against Yolande Pompey next June 5 in London. He's expected to scale around 190 Saturday night — about 10 pounds more than Daniels, a member of the U.S. Olympic Games boxing team in 1948.

Medford, Franklin Win, Meet For Title Tonight

EUGENE — Franklin of Portland and Medford—the second and fourth-ranked teams in the final Associated press poll—are the showdown teams in the finals of the 38th Oregon state high school basketball tournament here Saturday night.

Franklin, No. 2, earned its chance at the title by downing an old Portland Interscholastic League nemesis, Lincoln, 48-40. Medford, No. 4, earned its finalist berth by swamping Marshfield, 75-57, in Friday night's semi-final doubleheader.

Franklin and Medford square off in their championship game at 8:45 p. m. In Saturday night's other game, at 7:30, Lincoln and Marshfield meet for third place.

Afternoon Games Set
Fourth place will be decided at 2:35 p. m. when Eugene and Jefferson of Portland collide, and consolation honors (fifth place) will emerge from the Pendleton-Milton-Freewater engagement at 1:30 p. m.

Franklin has successively defeated South Salem, defending champion Eugene, and Lincoln in the tournament. But its victory Friday night was probably its most satisfying, for Lincoln twice had beaten Franklin in regular Portland league play.

And, ironically, Franklin now faces, for the title, the Medford team that handed Franklin its only loss in 8 pre-season games during the winter.

Medford Ex-Champ
In tournament history, Medford has won the title twice—in 1924 and 1929. It lost to Eugene in last year's championship game. Franklin won its only state title in 1921.

Both Friday night games were packed with surprises. Lincoln held Franklin's 6-9 center Bjorne Jensen to only 11 points—lowest in many a game—but failed to reckon with forward Jim Kuhn, whose 16 points were high.

Except for the first few minutes, Franklin led all the way. It was 13-11 at the quarter, 29-18 at the half, and 41-28 going into the fourth period. Lincoln outscored Franklin 12-7 in the fourth period, but never was able to come closer than six points, at 44-38 and 46-40.

Center Surrounded
Lincoln hounded Jensen throughout and the giant center—the tournament's leading scorer—got only four field goals and three free throws.

Ron Anderson was the only Lincoln player to reach double figures. He got 19 points.

It took Medford most of two periods to get "untracked" against Marshfield. Marshfield was in front, 21-18, at the end of the first quarter. Early in the second, Medford began finding the range, and with consecutive spurts of 12 and 9 points, gained a 43-21 halftime advantage.

Wide Margins Held
By the end of the third quarter, Medford was in front by 57-40, and twice during the fourth period the winners enjoyed 22-point leads. Only in the closing minutes did Marshfield pick up stride, but it never shortened the point spread by less than 17.

Guard Bob Tisdell, with 24, and forward Dick McLaughlin, with 20, carried the Medford scoring offense. Roger Johnson was Marshfield's top point-getter with 15.

In the afternoon games, Eugene disposed of Klamath Falls, 66-54, and Jefferson hurdled Milwaukie, 63-55, to keep alive their bids for fourth place.

Pendleton bounced Portland's Central Catholic, 64-57, and Milton-Freewater eliminated Beaverton, 46-42, to become contestants for the consolation windup, turning that game into an all-Umatilla County affair.

Tenley Albright Wins 5th Straight Ice Championship

PHILADELPHIA — Olympic champion Tenley Albright continued her reign as America's ice queen Saturday — winning the figure skating title for the fifth straight time — while the king, Hayes Alan Jenkins, appeared certain to capture his fourth consecutive crown Saturday night.

The vibrant Miss Albright, a 20-year-old pre-med student from Newton Center, Mass., who is as close to perfection as one can get while cutting a pretty figure on the ice, gained revenge Friday night from Carol Heiss, the brilliant New York youngster who de-throned Tenley as world champion last month in Germany.

Tenley, clad in a canary-yellow skating outfit, executed a series of jumps, turns and cross-step maneuvers to the music of Offenbach, that won the plaudits of the 5,000 spectators as well as the unanimous first place verdict of the five judges.

Tacoma Lass Champ
Joan Schenke of Tacoma, Wash., won first place in the school figures competition for junior ladies.

On the men's side in this 38th annual United States figure skating championship at the Philadelphia Arena, Jenkins appeared a sure winner, barring a serious fall in the five minutes of free skating to music Saturday evening.

His closest competition is Ronnie Robertson of Los Angeles, skater "under protest" while the U.S. Figure Skating Assn. conducts its investigation into charges allegedly brought by a foreigner that the 18-year-old high school graduate demanded — and was refused — "excessive expenses" for exhibition.

That compared with 4:10.5 at Milwaukee a week ago and 4:13.8 in New York earlier, but after Feb. 19 when he drew the AAU punishment on a charge of accepting excessive expense money.

It was the second fastest indoor mile run in the nation this year, a half second slower than Irish champion Ron Delany posted at Boston.

Troubles Hurt Form
