Farm Director Says Picture Not Bright In Oregon

Oregon's agriculture picture isn't too rosy, and it will probably get worse before it gets better. However, Oregon's farm income decline hasn't been as severe as in other parts of the nation.

This was brought out by James F. Short, state director of agriculture, in a talk Monday noon before the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Short, who owns a cattle ranch near Redmond, told his listeners in the Hotel Umpqua Civic Room that Oregon's farm income is declining "quite seriously" and will probably show another slight decline for 1956. Gross income is down 5 per cent in the last two years. The downward trend has existed five years.

Hardest hit is the eastern Oregon wheat rancher. Wheat production has dropped 40 per cent in two years, and ranchers have no outlet in diversifying crops. Short blamed the fate of Oregon's biggest agricultural crop on wartime production stimulation being continued too long, coupled with the U.S. practice of encouraging foreign nations to increase production while we held an umbrella over them.

Short said he believes the soil bank plan and other artificial aids have brought damaging conditions, that no price support program can assure the farmer his share of the national income.

New Markets Needed
He did say, however, that the federal government has been of aid in one respect—in taking steps to relieve temporary market gluts.

The speaker pointed out several things which can be done, individually and collectively, to alleviate the plight of the farmer. Among others, he said we must find more industrial uses for surplus crops, find new markets for products and reduce marketing costs. He also mentioned that the farmer is willing to carry his share of the tax burden, but we must make sure farmers are not carrying an extreme portion of the tax load.

In a question-and-answer period, Short reviewed the work of his department, which operates primarily in an inspection and regulatory capacity.

Short was introduced by chamber President J. Roland Parker. Earlier in the program, Roseburg Mayor E. M. Barker Jr. introduced Sharon Strode, queen of Plant-A-Rose Month. Sharon, a Roseburg High student, will serve the remainder of the year as an "official representative" of the Chamber of Commerce, Barker said.

McKay Plans To Resign Prior To Primary Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House said here that Secretary of the Interior McKay, a candidate for the U.S. Senate from Oregon, plans to resign from the Cabinet prior to the state's May 18 primary.

McKay announced last week he would seek the Republican nomination for the Senate seat now held by Wayne Morse, who was elected as a Republican but later switched to the Democratic Party.

At the time of McKay's announcement the White House said he would resign from the Cabinet about June 1. In reply to questions Friday Murray Snyder, assistant press secretary, said he now understands McKay will leave the Cabinet before the Oregon primary.

Another Bumper Harvest Seen For American Farms, Unless Plans Are Changed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unless farmers change their plans before planting time, they are likely to turn in another bumper harvest this year.

This prospect was painted by an Agriculture Department report. It indicated that farmers planned on March 1 to plant 332 million acres to commercial crops. That would be about three million acres less than last year.

But the Eisenhower administration has expressed hope of getting a cutback of at least 35 million acres. It is trying to reduce production and to make openings in the market for government-held surpluses which, officials say, are depressing farm prices and incomes.

Such a reduction is the goal of a soil bank plan recommended by President Eisenhower early this year and included in an omnibus farm bill now before the Senate.

In forecasting this year's acreage, the department said, however, that there still is a possibility of getting a larger reduction if the soil bank legislation is enacted before spring planting is completed. Planting gets into full swing next month.

Under the soil bank plan, the government would make payments to farmers for reducing plant of surplus crops.

Former OSC Instructor Suspended At Dickinson

CARLISLE, Pa. (AP)—Dr. Laurent R. LaVallee, former Oregon State College instructor, was suspended Monday as an assistant professor of economics at Dickinson College here. LaVallee invoked the Fifth Amendment last month in testimony before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

A hearing on the suspension will be held before the executive committee of the Dickinson board of trustees, said president William W. Edel. He explained that a faculty member can be dismissed only through action by the board. He said reasons for the suspension will be made public at the hearing.

LaVallee used the Fifth Amendment protection which provides against self-incrimination when questioned on what the committee said were reported Communist activities from 1942 to 1944 when the professor was a member of the War Labor Board in Denver, Colo.

LaVallee was dismissed from Oregon State in 1949. He asserted at that time he was let go for his active membership in the Progressive Party of Oregon.

Tax Write-Off Permits Given Copco, S. P. R. R.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The California-Oregon Power Co. Sunday obtained government authorization to write off in depreciation 65 per cent of the cost of new power generating facilities in Klamath County, Ore.

The quick tax write-off will apply to \$13,870,869 in power development projects in the county, the Office of Defense Mobilization reported in issuing a certificate of necessity.

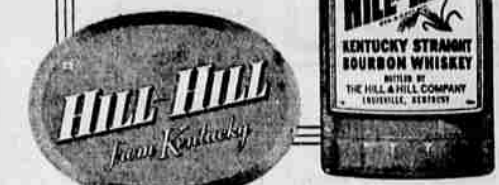

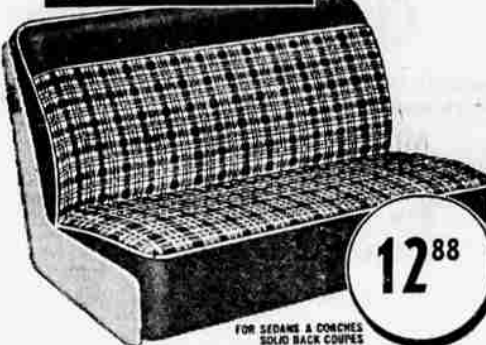
