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Godoy, Waldo Set Tussle For Heavyweight Mat Belt

The result probably will mean mayhem this Saturday night at the Roseburg Armory.

Chile's Pedro Godoy, the current titlist, and Ricky Waldo, an Ohioan, are the principals in the mat tangle this weekend. Last week, they carried their semifinal bout past the bounds of good manners.

Referee George Drake called the melee a draw after it took several armory police and officials to tear the duo apart after the bell rang. That set up this weekend's title match.

Both men are 230-pounders. Godoy favors the backbreaker and Boston crab as the holds with which he has risen to the heights in wrestling circles.

Waldo is a former schoolmate of Luther Lindsey, and it's apparently that part of the schooling was in wrestling techniques. Waldo, as does Lindsey, has a stock in trade in his head butts with which he softens up opponents. He uses his 18-inch biceps to good advantage in applying his favored full Nelson.

The match will go for two out of three falls, with an hour limit. In the semi-windup, Rito Romero returns to the local ring against Bill Fletcher of Boise. Romero, a 200-pound Mexican, will be seeking his fifth straight win here. Last week, he upset Karl Gray.

Fletcher stopped George Drake last week. The match promises to be fast, scientific and clean. Two falls will win the match inside a 30-minute limit.

Judge Studying AAU Injunction

NEW YORK — It's a brand new ball game, as they say. First, Wes Santee had his innings, then the Amateur Athletic Union came on fast and today the contest between the two is deadlocked.

Right now, Santee, America's premier miler, is out of the Chicago Daily News Relays this Saturday. Justice Walter A. Lynch of the New York State Supreme Court saw to that yesterday when he refused to continue a temporary injunction which barred the AAU from enforcing its lifetime ban on Santee.

The jurist, however, can — and probably will — make a ruling in the case before Saturday, if he decides in Santee's favor and grants a permanent injunction, then the skinny Marine Corp's lieutenant is free to run anywhere, any time.

If he rules in favor of the AAU, the ban—imposed by the Executive Committee Feb. 19 Santee was found guilty of accepting excessive expenses for some meals last year—goes back into effect for good.

Then Santee's only redress would be an appeal to the AAU Board of Governors, the supreme power in the organization.

Justice Lynch heard arguments by Charles P. Grimes, Santee's attorney, and Louis Nizer, representing the AAU, yesterday. When he called a halt to the proceedings, he said he would hear further pleas today.

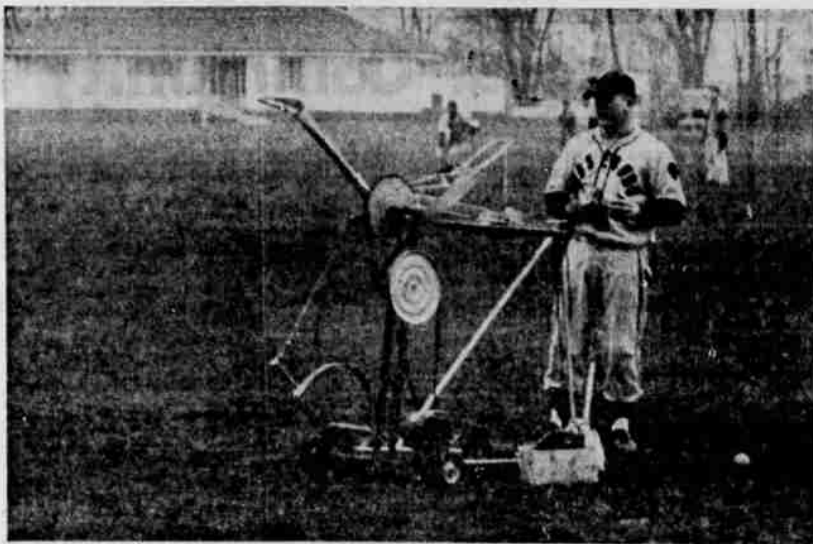
California Boxer Admits Throwing Three Fights

LOS ANGELES — The Governor's Special Committee Investigating California Boxing Tuesday heard testimony from boxer Tommy Campbell that he was instructed to throw three fights.

Babe McCoy, matchmaker at Los Angeles' Olympic Auditorium, was accused by Campbell of instructing him to take a "dive" in his May 16, 1950, bout with Art Aragon at the Olympic. McCoy denied the charge.

"I was supposed to look good until the fourth round, then get hit and that was all," Campbell told James Cox, special consultant to Gov. Goodwin Knight in the investigation.

Campbell knocked Aragon down in the second round. Aragon knocked him down to stay in the third. Aragon, in training at a ranch near here, said it was hard for him to believe the fight was "fixed."

They are Lloyd Hoffine, an OCC first-team all-star from Coos Bay, and Bill Hollingsworth, Ashland, who rolled in 502 points in 26 games for a 19.3 average. Hollingsworth was high among the basketball scoring leaders in the Pacific Northwest, as tallied by The Associated Press.

Should Biddington be placed by Coach Ted Schopf on next year's starting team, he'll have Hollingsworth as a teammate. Hollingsworth, recently returned from the service, is a freshman. Hoffine completed cage chores for SOC as a senior this year.

ANOTHER ATHLETE at Southern Oregon is Chuck Plummer, who's out for the tennis team which last year won the OCC net title. The Roseburg High grad lettered in the sport last year. Coaching the squad is Dr. Alva Graham.

NEW YORK — Dayton's top-seeded Flyers are still alive in the National Invitation Basketball Tournament only, says Coach Tom Blackburn, "because of an act of God."
