

McKay Accuses Neuberger Of Trying To Embarrass Him During Hearing On Dam

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Interior McKay Wednesday accused Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) of seeking to embarrass him at a hearing on a bill to revoke a license for Beaver Marsh power dam in Oregon. Neuberger denied it.

The incident occurred when Neuberger asked McKay on what date he had written a letter to the Federal Power Commission, expressing his personal opposition which his department had endorsed.

McKay said he didn't recall. "But I know why you ask it," the secretary declared. "You want to embarrass me because the letter was not sent up until after the report of the Interior Department."

Neuberger said he was not trying to embarrass McKay. "You're the one who used the word, 'I didn't,'" the senator said. "You've been very handy at trying to embarrass me," came back McKay, "but you haven't succeeded."

The exchange came at a Senate Public Works subcommittee hearing at which McKay supported a bill by Sens. Morse and Neuberger to revoke the Beaver Marsh license.

The project in the Willamette National Forest 15 miles east of Eugene would produce 30,000 kilowatts of power for the Eugene Water and Electric Board.

It is opposed by various conservation groups on the ground it would despoil one of Oregon's major scenic and recreation areas. McKay described the "upper McKenzie River" upon which the project would be located, as one of the three places in Oregon "I'd like to see preserved in their original state." He said the others are the Rogue River and the Columbia Gorge.

"There are some things that aren't worth spoiling for a commercial project," the secretary said.

Asked by Neuberger why his department had supported the project although he personally said he was opposed, McKay said the department's report was based on its legal obligation to report on the project's effect on fish life.

He said he was without jurisdiction as secretary of Interior to report on the project's effect upon scenic or recreational benefits.

McKay suggested that Congress should suspend the license for two or three years and keep the site in its present condition, pending a study of the area.

Morse referred to the "almost unique" fish runs and white water rapids of the McKenzie River and the "crystal clarity" of Clear Lake, and said:

"These outdoor marvels would be disrupted by Beaver Marsh Dam. The level of Clear Lake would be changed repeatedly and roll its waters. The famous falls would be adversely affected and the famous sports fish runs severely damaged."

He said Eugene's "logical source of inexpensive power"

would be the Bonneville Power Administration, but that the municipal utility has preferred not to enter into a Bonneville contract.

Neuberger told Sen. Kerr (D-Okla.), subcommittee chairman, that "sacrificing the grandeur of the upper McKenzie for 30,000 part-time kilowatts would be just

about as wasteful as buffalo hunters on your own Oklahoma plains, who once slaughtered whole half-ton beasts just to get the tongue."

Byron K. Taylor and Windsor Calkins, both of Eugene, represented the municipal power system in opposing the bill.

Taylor said it was "an ill-

advised and entirely unnecessary obstacle" to the utility's efforts to meet its customers' needs.

He said the project is one of the few in the Northwest in which there is no fish program.

Although the utility could now obtain power from Bonneville, Taylor said, impending power

shortages in the area may preclude that in a few years.

Calkins questioned the wisdom of congressional action to revoke the license after it was issued by a commission created by Congress for that purpose.

The hearing will continue Thursday.

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Nehru Sharply Attacks SEATO, Baghdad Pact

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru again sharply attacked the SEATO and Baghdad Pact Tuesday. His strongly worded statement served notice that India and the West are no closer as a result of the Western Big Three foreign ministers' recent visit.

Nehru disclosed to Parliament that his government has protested formally to the SEATO powers about the mention of Kashmir at the SEATO Council meeting in Karachi.

Nehru's statement dispelled hopes among Western observers that he would moderate his public attacks on Western military pacts as a result of the visits this month by U. S. Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Pineau.

Reporting to Parliament on the three Westerners' visits, the Prime Minister made no mention of Soviet policies except to reiterate that he thought the recent Moscow Communist Party Congress represents a new realistic Soviet policy.

When Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party boss Khrushchev visited here, Nehru signed a joint communique with them. There were no such joint statements by the Indian leader and the three Western ministers.

Nehru in his report to Parliament accused the SEATO powers of taking sides with Pakistan against India in the Kashmir dispute. He asserted the Western-sponsored Baghdad Pact "is partly responsible for a good deal of the present trouble plaguing West Asia" and charged it "has rent asunder Arab unity."

American Churchmen Go Back To Moscow Tuesday

MOSCOW (AP)—A delegation of American Protestant churchmen returned to Moscow Tuesday after a one-day visit to Leningrad and talks with religious leaders there. They were told their visit was contributing much to the following of a course of peace and justice. Their sightseeing in Leningrad was limited because some of the top attractions were closed for repairs.

The Americans also visited the residence of Metropolitan Elvethy and received a welcome from him at a luncheon reception. The Metropolitan told the visitors their tour of the Soviet Union "opens possibilities for forging ties for further intercourse."

The churchmen left for Moscow after attending opening day Lenin services and touring the Leningrad Theological Academy. They leave Russia for home Wednesday returning by way of Warsaw and Prague.

Bulldozer Cuts Through Buried Telephone Cable

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP)—A bulldozer knifed through the buried telephone cable circuits south of here Tuesday and knocked out most of the Puget Sound area's communications links.

Radio networks, television audio, news wires and other services were out for about 50 minutes.

The Pacific Telephone Co. reported that microwave circuits southward from here continued to provide service. Emergency routing restored service for radio, television and news wires.

The company said full restoration of services was expected by mid-afternoon.

SEATO Said Obligated If Pakistan Attacked

TOKYO (AP)—A high American source said Tuesday the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) in his opinion "would have to act" if India attacked Pakistan in their dispute over the state of Kashmir.

The statement came less than two weeks after U.S. Secretary of State Dulles said at a New Delhi press conference that if Pakistan were to attack India, America would side with India.

The source here, who refused to be quoted by name, acknowledged the SEATO agreement is directed only against "Communist" aggression but said, "I think if there were a clear case of aggression by India against Pakistan, SEATO would have to act."

He said the future of the SEATO organization would depend on it. There was no further elaboration.

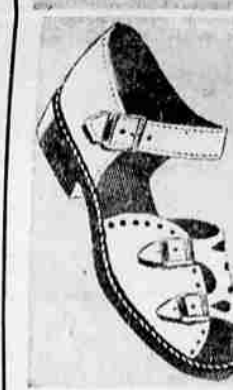
