

Early Chinook Migration Tallied At Winchester Dam

Five spring chinook salmon were spotted crossing the counting board at Winchester Dam the first part of the month, marking another early migration of the species into the Umpqua River.

William O. Pitney, field agent for the Oregon Game Commission, notes that fish of the species were seen at the dam in the early part of the season through March 15.

Pasadena Crew Gains AAU Hoop Round, Draws Bakers

DENVER — Two talented collections of college men from the deep south and the Far West challenge veteran AAU clubs in Thursday's annual AAU Basketball Tournament.

The Pasadena, Calif., Mirror Glaze five, featuring Pasadena Nazarene College players, advanced Wednesday with the meet's biggest upset—an 86-75 conquest of the Peoria, Ill., Cats, 1954 champions and seeded No. 2 in the current meet.

Thursday night Pasadena plays the Seattle Buchanan Bakers, the Pacific Northwest AAU champions, who moved into the quarterfinals with a 71-57 win over Denver Central Insurance.

Almost matching the Pasadena college performance, seniors from the University of Alabama South-eastern Conference champions moved ahead with an 85-77 triumph over seeded Akron, Ohio, Goodyears.

The Alabamians, flying the colors of Ada Oilers of Mobile, clash with Wichita, Kan., Vickers Oilers in the quarterfinal features.

Other quarterfinal games send defending champion Phillips 66 of Bartlesville, Okla., against the all-Negro Rainer Comets of Chicago and the Denver Central Bankers against the Milwaukee Allen-Bradleys.

Peoria, three-time champion of the meet and Olympic representative in 1952, held 8-point leads late in the first half and early in the second half. The Cats were in front by 5 points with eight minutes left when Clyde Cook, who

hit 18 points in the second half, touched off a Pasadena surge that caught Peoria at 67-all. With four minutes left, Cook and John Davis, who bagged 25, pulled Pasadena in front to stay.

Pasadena used speed and clever ball handling to outmaneuver the Cats, led by such former college greats as Don Schlundt of Indiana, B. H. Born and Dean Kelley of Kansas and Russ Lawler of Stanford.

Whitworth Hoop Coach Returns To Alma Mater

SPOKANE — Basketball Coach Art Smith is leaving Whitworth to return to his alma mater, Alma College.

Dr. Frank Warren, Whitworth president, announced Wednesday night the Pirates' coach for the last three seasons will leave in August to become Alma's athletic director and football coach.

A graduate of Alma, Smith once was a freshman coach at the Michigan school and later was freshman basketball coach and an assistant in football and baseball at Idaho.

In three seasons at Whitworth, Smith's basketball teams have won 60 and lost 22 games, capturing the Evergreen Conference championship in 1954-55. The team was runner-up to Pacific Lutheran this season.

Appointment Of Coach At Colorado Predicted

BOULDER, Colo. — Russell (Sox) Walseth, head basketball coach at South Dakota State College, is expected to report in about 10 days as coach mentor at the University of Colorado.

Appointment of the 29-year-old former Colorado athlete was announced Wednesday by CU athletic director Harry G. Carlson, after confirmation of Carlson's choice by the school's regents.

Salary terms were not announced but Walseth was expected to draw about \$7,000 yearly. He received a four-year contract.

Walseth is expected on the campus about April 1, the date Coach H. B. (Bebe) Lee departs to become athletic director at Kansas State.

Boxer Seeking Battle With Tony DeMarco

ST. LOUIS — Virgil (Honey) Akers says he isn't afraid of welterweight champion Johnny Saxton but he'd like a shot at second-ranked Tony DeMarco because "I'm entitled to it and it'd be a great fight."

Akers needed a last-round flurry for a close but unanimous decision over smart Hector Constancia of Trinidad here Wednesday night in a 10-rounder.

It wasn't a sensational victory and the crowd below the decision although Akers is a St. Louis boy. But it kept him in the running for a bout with Saxton, who is looking around for opponents before he gives Carmine Basilio a return crack at the title.

A veteran pitcher who helped Seattle win the Pacific Coast League baseball pennant last year showed Wednesday the winter lay-off didn't hurt that throwing arm.

Manager Luke Sewell kept Elmer Singleton on the mound for five innings—his longest stint of the spring training season—and got near perfect ball as the Rainiers bounced Los Angeles, 10-8, in an exhibition game at Pasadena, Calif.

Singleton allowed but three hits, walked one Angel and struck out five before he was relieved by lefty Fred Baczewski, who did all the damage to the Seattle cause.

The Angeles reached the south-paw for eight hits, including Steve Bilko's 400-foot homer, and eight runs in the final three innings.

San Diego beat Hollywood, 8-6, in a marathon exhibition game at Anaheim. There were 23 base-hits and 11 errors in the 2 hours, 49 minutes it took to complete the game. San Diego's Joe Macko, purchased from Seattle last winter, hit two home runs.

Portland's Beavers met Vancouver Thursday with Bob Alexander nominated to start. After four or possibly five innings he is scheduled to be relieved by Red Adams.

With no game Wednesday the Beavers concentrated on hitting as they have for many days, plus practice on sending two infielders to handle the relay from the outfield on extra base hits. The deep man takes or passes the throw on the basis of a call from the other.

Luis Marquez, outfielder, and Rene Valdez, pitcher from St. Paul, are to report shortly. Marquez has been held in Puerto Rico by his wife's illness.

New York Kegling Team Tops In ABC Standings

ROCHESTER, N.Y. — The Meade Flour Covering team of Syracuse, N.Y., continued to lead the team division Thursday as the American Bowling Congress moved into the 20th of its 79-day schedule.

The Syracuse bowlers came out of nowhere Tuesday night with a 2,997 to dethrone St. Louis' Beer of Detroit and survive an assault by 27 regular division and booster teams Wednesday night.

4 Teams Creak To Semis In National Invitation Meet

NEW YORK — The two-week interval between the end of the regular basketball season and the start of the National Invitation Tournament virtually makes a new season out of the oldest postseason court extravaganza.

Tonight's semifinal games could mean another fresh start for the four teams involved.

It's Louisville against St. Joseph's of Philadelphia and Dayton against St. Francis of Brooklyn—three seeded teams and one outsider. Only one of the four, St. Joseph's, played a game in two weeks before the tournament opened last Saturday.

The long layoffs were reflected in the shabby performances of the top-rated teams. Dayton and Louisville, on their regular season form, when each won 23 games and lost three, these two should meet in the nationally televised final Saturday afternoon. Off their tournament performances so far, it could be third-seeded St. Joseph's (21-5) against unranked St. Francis (21-8) in the final.

These two, which had to hustle all season, apparently weren't bothered by rustiness as much as the nationally ranked teams. Dayton was third in the final Associated Press ranking poll and Louisville sixth. St. Joseph's didn't end its regular season until March 10, when it lost to Temple. St. Francis, idle for three weeks, has had two tournament games to regain its form.

Dayton Coach Tommy Blackourn, disturbed by his team's showing in a fluky 72-68 victory over Xavier (Ohio), sent the Flyers through a stiff workout yesterday and mulled over possible lineup changes.

"I don't know much about St. Francis because I've been scouting the wrong teams all through 'But I'm more concerned about Dayton."
