Peron's Successor Dies Of Hemorrhage

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Argentina prepared highest military rites Friday for the funeral of Maj. Gen. Eduardo Lonardi, anti-Peronist leader who was ousted after serving less than two months as the fallen dictator's successor.

Lonardi, 59, died Thursday night after a cerebral hemorrhage. He had been in ill health since his ouster and was treated in the United States last December for high blood pressure.

Lonardi was sworn in Sept. 23 as president of the provisional government that succeeded the Peron regime. He "resigned" Nov. 13 in another military coup that put Maj. Gen. Pedro Aramburu in the presidential post. Aramburu had been army chief of staff in Lonardi's government and a chief leader in the army-navy revolt against Peron.

Neuberger Lashes Appointment Of Tribe Supervisor

WASHINGTON (AP)—The naming of William L. Phillips of Salem, Ore., to a \$1,000-a-month property supervision job with the Klamath Indian tribe drew criticism Thursday from Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.).

Phillips has been appointed by Secretary of Interior McKay to manage McKay's campaign for the Republican nomination to the U. S. Senate.

Neuberger said on the Senate floor that McKay gave Phillips the job as "managing specialist" supervising property of the Klamath Indians.

McKay said in Salem that Phillips was one of three men he had recommended for the job. The three were screened by a committee of Klamath, he said, and Phillips was chosen last May.

McKay said the Indian council set the salary and the money came from tribal funds.

Phillips resigned this tribal position in a letter posted last Friday, shortly after he was named to manage McKay's campaign. McKay said he will accept the resignation.

Neuberger's accusation in the Senate was quickly challenged by two Republican senators, McCarthy of Wisconsin and Schmeidler of Kansas. McCarthy said Neuberger had made "a completely unwarranted attack" on the secretary.

Westinghouse Concentrates On Holdouts

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Westinghouse Electric Corp. concentrated today on settling a 150-day strike of 10,500 members of the Independent Electrical Workers Union (UE). Although no progress was reported in yesterday's negotiations—first since March 9—another session was called for today (10 a.m. EST).

Meanwhile, the company reported upwards of 20,000 of 44,000 members of the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE) were back on the job following settlement of their 156-day strike. The returnees included many workers at the Sharon (Pa.) transformer division where a rebel local of the IUE had failed to go along with the national strike agreement.

The big issues between the UE and Westinghouse are length of contract, wages and a change in the wage payment plan in the south Philadelphia plant of Westinghouse where about 6,000 UE members are employed.

Senate Extends Corporation Tax

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Finance Committee voted unanimously Friday to extend corporation income and major excise tax rates for another year.

This step, recommended by the administration, will save the Treasury more than three billion dollars as expected Congress finally approves it.

The committee acted after hearing Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey estimate that both revenues and spending in the current fiscal year will jump a billion dollars over his January estimates. This would not upset the precarious 200 million dollar budget surplus he forecast previously.

Humphrey, testifying in closed session, reiterated his stand against an income tax cut this year in view of the revised estimates. Chairman Byrd (D-Va.) reported.

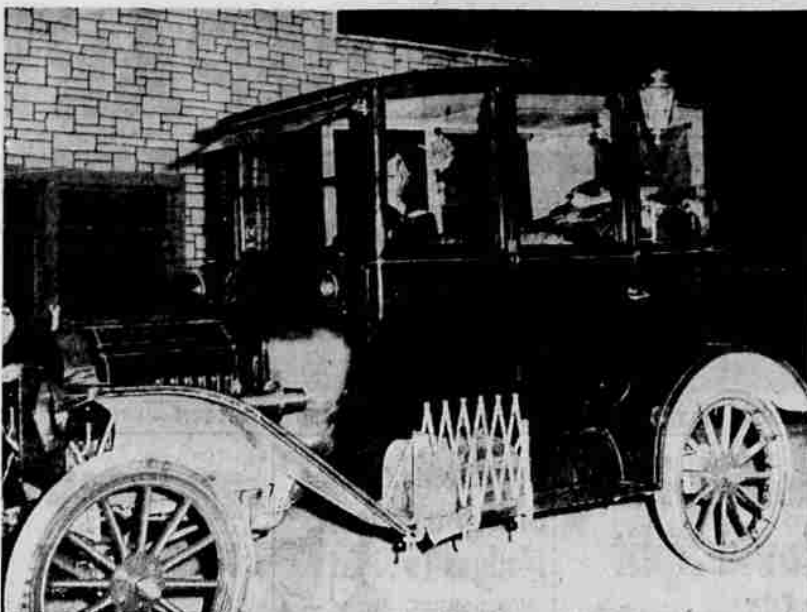
The House already has passed a bill to extend the corporation and excise rates. Byrd said the Senate probably would follow suit next Monday or Tuesday, sending the measure to President Eisenhower.

William L. Josselin Is Convention Candidate

Charles H. Martin. He was twice elected Democratic state chairman. He headed the 1952 campaign for Estes Kefauver in Oregon and was delegate-at-large that year.

Ike Standing Pat On Decision Farm Bill Won't Work

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower was reported officially Friday to be standing pat on his decision that the Senate-approved farm bill won't work.

Some of his Senate supporters, however, appeared willing to accept a temporary defeat on the price support issue in the hope of a victory in later battles on the House and Senate floor.

James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said he knows of "no change at all" in the President's view, expressed at a news conference last Wednesday, that the bill passed by the Senate is "unworkable."

Hagerty denied a published report the President met Thursday with Secretary of Agriculture Benson and now is willing to accept provisions of the Senate measure aimed at higher price supports on cotton and wheat in order to get some sort of bill passed.

So Aiken (R-Vt.) indicated meanwhile that administration forces are reconciled to a temporary licking on the price support issue when a Senate-House conference committee makes its recommendation on a compromise bill.

This group will meet Monday in an effort to reconcile wide differences between Senate and House versions of farm legislation. It is generally conceded the decision will be in favor of the flexible support plan favored by the administration.

Dulles To Tell Nation Of World Trip Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles tells the nation tonight about his current ideas for blocking efforts by Russia to penetrate the free nations of Asia politically and economically.

He will broadcast a public version of his report on a 27,000-mile Asian trip—a report described by several Congress members yesterday as moderately optimistic from the free world viewpoint.

Dulles gave such a report to three separate groups in secret sessions yesterday, and arranged to do so twice more today. First on his schedule was a Cabinet meeting then a session with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

WCTU Members Prove Themselves As Fire-Fighters

A group of WCTU members proved themselves stalwart fire-fighters Thursday afternoon as a blaze threatened to break up a meeting near Azalea.

The meeting was in the Bob Gaedecke home on Cow Creek, an area unprotected by fire-suppression facilities.

When fire broke out around the chimney, members of the group boosted Mrs. Gaedecke onto the roof and passed up pails of water until a garden hose could be connected to douse the flames, according to Mrs. G. B. Fox, News-Review correspondent.

A hole was burned in the roof and the living-room ceiling, and there was some water damage to the house and its contents.

Pilot Brings Blazing Bomber To Field Safely

SPOKANE (AP)—An Air Force pilot brought a B36 bomber in safely Thursday after the huge plane caught fire as it was preparing to land.

Maj. Victor H. Reeder, the pilot, alerted the crew for a possible bailout when smoke started belching from one of the 10 engines, then skillfully guided the giant bomber to the Fairchild Air Force Base landing strip.

Waiting ground crews put out the flames but not until after they had done extensive damage to the plane.

None of the crew was injured.

Eugene Speaker Apologizes For Implications Timing Of Hearing Was Deliberate

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Eugene, Ore., Chamber of Commerce official Thursday apologized for describing as "most strange and non-coincidental" the timing of a hearing on legislation to revoke the license for a Eugene power project.

Fred M. Brenne, chamber manager, made his apology to a Senate Public Works Subcommittee in testifying against the revocation bill, introduced by Sens. Morse and Neuberger, Oregon Democrats.

In his prepared testimony, Brenne said the timing of the hearing—one week before Eugene residents vote on bonds to finance the project—appeared to be a "further" attempt by the Oregon senators to defeat the municipal undertaking.

Neuberger said at Thursday's session that he wanted to "correct an inaccuracy." Then he went on to say that the date for the hearing had been set by Chairman Kerr (D-Okla.) after consultation with Republican and Democratic members of the committee. Neuberger, a member of the subcommittee, added:

"So far as I know, none knew when the election would be held." Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.), acting chairman at the moment, said he was unaware of the forthcoming election.

"I'm confident your implication of impropriety on the part of Sens. Morse and Neuberger is without foundation," he said. "I apologize, sir," Brenne replied.

The city holds a license from the Federal Power Commission to build a Beaver Marsh power dam. Conservation groups oppose the project on grounds the dam would destroy scenic and wildlife areas. Principal witness Thursday for cancellation of the license was former Gov. Charles Sprague, publisher of the Oregon Statesman, Salem.

He told the subcommittee the "prime value" of the Upper McKenzie River area, where the dam would be built, is recreational.

"The alleged rape is said to be of minor dimension," Sprague said, "but in view of the beauties of the area even rape of a minor degree is wrong."

He said it was true that the Beaver Marsh project had been approved by various government agencies, but added:

"Unfortunately there is no government body with jurisdiction in the area of recreation values." He said the lake would have an area of 65 acres, of which 20 to 25 acres would be subject to daily withdrawals in the dam's operation.

This, he said, would leave the shoreline "a mess of mud flats."

Dr. Karl Othman of Eugene, speaking for the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs, emphasized his organization was not opposed to all dams. He said he had not opposed Cougar Dam, in the same area, because its flood control benefits would offset its damage.

But he said that in the case of Beaver Marsh the "puny amount of power this project would produce is of vastly less value than the loss it would cause."

Also supporting the revocation bill as the subcommittee wound up its public hearing were spokesmen for the Wildlife Management Institute, the Wilderness Society and the National Wildlife Federation.

Green C. Powell Dies Wednesday

Green C. Powell, 83, early settler of Douglas County, died March 21 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Elwin DeGrath, at Loom Lake.

Powell was born July 22, 1872, in Jackson County, Ken., to Edwin and Jane Powell.

In 1892 he came with his family to Douglas County, by way of San Francisco by train, to Portland by boat and to Roseburg by train. The family settled in the Kentucky Settlement near Kellogg, and moved to Tye in the late 1890's.

Powell was married to Maud Clayton in 1892. She preceded him in death in 1954.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Woodmen of the World.

Surviving him are six children: Warren Powell, Harold Powell, Mrs. Kenneth Sweet and Jessie Powell, all of Roseburg; Mrs. Elwin DeGrath of Loom Lake, and Mrs. Roy Cobb of Beaverton; 11 grandchildren; a brother, William Powell of Umpqua and two sisters, Martha Clayton of Roseburg, and Anna Sabrique of Portland.

Graveside services will be held in Oakland at the Odd Fellows Cemetery Saturday at 2 p.m., with Masonic rites. Unger Mortuary of Reedsport is in charge of the arrangements.

said showed "serious deficiencies with respect to policy guidance... unconsiderable delays in making formal contracts, 'unrealistic' delivery schedules, diversion of production funds into research and development, inadequate stock control, 'flagrant deficiencies' in procurement and contract operations and reports of 'political pressure' in contract dealings.

Secretary of Defense Wilson replied: "I do not excuse these kinds of things if they are true. There is some explanation of it, probably, because people do not purposely do such sloppy things. That is, they sort of drift into it... all I can tell you is that one way and another we are trying to get hold of the thing."

He made it clear the British government does not envisage acting on its own, however, and he called attention to American, British and French consultations under way in Washington on the Middle East situation.

"We have plans which could be put into action very rapidly in such a contingency when it has been decided to do so," the spokesman replied.

Smelt Making Big Runs Into Cowlitz, Kalama

PORTLAND (AP)—Commercial fishermen reported Friday that smelt were making their annual runs into the Cowlitz and Kalama rivers of Southwest Washington.

They have not yet appeared in such other streams as the Lewis River of Washington or the Sandy in Oregon, the fishermen said.

The smelt, a small fish that is caught by nets, annually migrates into the streams.

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
