Arbitration Of Strike At Lumber Mill Asked

ST. HELENS — Arbitration of a strike nearly a year old at a lumber products plant here was recommended Wednesday by the Oregon State Conciliation Board.

The recommendation by two of the three members of the board followed a study of evidence presented at a two-day hearing last month. Guy Haines, employer representative, declined to join H. H. Harrison, labor member, and J. L. Jennings, public member, in approving the proposal. Neither the striking Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union members nor the Fir-Tex Insulating Board Co. is bound to abide by the board's recommendation.

The 400 workers have been picketing the plant since April 1, 1955. The plant is operating on a limited basis with non-union help.

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Ike Asks Deliberations On Civil Rights Issue

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower, in a message to the eighth annual Conference on Civil Liberties, called Thursday for "deliberations which will increase public understanding" of the subject.

The conference is sponsored by the National Civil Liberties Clearing House, which includes representatives from various national church, civic and other groups interested in the subject. Its chairman is Dr. Earl F. Adams of the National Council of Churches.

Eisenhower sent his greetings at the opening of the two-day conference. He said "I am glad to know that this meeting will emphasize the importance of upholding the individual's right to equality under the law and of preserving individual liberty while safeguarding the national security."

Among speakers is Sen. Morse (D-Ore).
