

Fresh Snow Hits Heavily Burdened Eastern Areas

The Northeast, barely recovered from last weekend's paralyzing snows, was hit Saturday by a spring snow storm.

Five to 10 inches of snow was predicted for New England. This third storm in nine days started in most areas Friday night with rain, then changed to snow. It brought highway crews out with plows and sand. The snow was expected to end late noon Saturday.

By mid-morning five inches of snow had fallen in northern Connecticut, three inches in Rhode Island and Boston.

Eight inches fell at Jamestown, N.Y., and a 5.1 inch fall by Syracuse, N.Y., brought the season's total there to a record 131.4 inches. Just before 9 a.m. in New York City the temperature dropped from 40 to 30 degrees and the rain changed to snow.

With the city's streets only just cleared of last weekend's 18.1-inch fall, the Weather Bureau cheerfully predicted this snow would melt quickly. It said 2 to 4 inches probably would fall in the metropolitan area.

Snow fell in parts of New Jersey and Pennsylvania while rain pelleted other sections of those states.

Wintry weather, with snow and falling temperatures, returned to northern section of the country Saturday all the way from the Plains to New England.

Fresh falls of snow measured up to 10 inches in parts of Michigan. Temperatures dipped to around zero in Minnesota and North Dakota.

Meanwhile, the southern and Western areas reported fairly pleasant early spring weather.

Newspaper Starts Fund For Negro Minister's Fine

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — As Negroes continued a mass boycott of segregated buses, a New Jersey newspaper launched a fund drive to pay the fine and court costs of a Negro clergyman convicted of leading the boycott.

The Asbury Park Press started its campaign with a page 1 story and editorial by Editor Wayne D. McMurray.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church at Montgomery, was fined \$500 Thursday after a four-day trial on charges of conspiring to boycott city buses.

A spokesman for Montgomery City Lines Inc. said that "there might have been a few more" Negroes patronizing the bus line than there have been in the days preceding King's trial.

The Asbury Park Press editor last night sent this telegram to King: "We of the Asbury Park Press, outraged at the conviction of a fellow American for asserting a right our Constitution guarantees to all, want to help you in your fight for justice. We are starting a fund drive among our readers for money to pay your fine and court costs."

The Press itself is contributing \$50. Checks will be drawn in your name and forwarded to you, or to your attorneys if you prefer."

Mrs. John A. Hart Dies Here Following Prolonged Illness

Mrs. John A. (Lillian Alice) Hart, 56, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at her home at 1138 SE Stephens St. on March 23 following a prolonged period of ill health.

She was born Oct. 12, 1900, at Hoxie, Kan., and moved with her parents to Oakesdale, Wash., where she resided until 1917 when she moved to Eugene.

She was married on May 24, 1919, in Eugene, to John A. Hart. They came to Roseburg in 1931, where Hart has been manager for the New Service Laundry for many years.

She was a member of the First Christian Church and the Roseburg Lady Lions Auxiliary of which she was a past president. She had been active in church and PTA affairs.

Surviving are her husband, John A. (Jack) Hart of Roseburg; a daughter, Mrs. Charles E. (Gladys) Hart of Burns; four sisters: Mrs. William Boqua of Eugene; Mrs. D. MacDonald, Wenatchee, Wash.; Mrs. Robert Johnson of Florida; and Mrs. Earl DeFreese of Coos Bay; one brother, Russell W. Lenhart, Eugene; two grandchildren, Donnell Arlene Hart and James Alan Hart of Burns.

Her body has been removed to Long & Orr Mortuary and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Mayor Peterson Recall Attempt To Be Dropped

PORTLAND — There apparently will be no recall attempt against Mayor Fred Peterson after all.

Some East Siders, who want a proposed eight million dollar city sports center built in East Portland, had voiced the threat earlier this week, but decided against it in a meeting Friday night.

Joe Dobbins, a leader in the group and a candidate for mayor, said he wanted to apologize to Peterson for voicing the threat.

The fight over the sports center involves the Exposition-Recreation Commission, appointed by the mayor. The commission selected a west side site for the center.

35 Killed, 60 Injured In Pakistan Stampede

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan — Thirty-five persons were reported killed last night in a stampede of holiday crowds milling across an overpass bridge to celebrate the inauguration of the Pakistan republic.

More than 60 other persons were injured in the crush as the celebrants trampled each other trying to get across the overpass to a fireworks display in this northern Punjab City. Many women and children were reported among the dead.

OPPOSE U.N. CHANGES

ALBANY, Ore. — A resolution opposing any changes in the United Nations charter which might "lead to any form of world government" was approved here Friday by Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution.

The organization, holding its 42nd annual conference, elected officers at Saturday's closing session. Delegates from 21 state chapters attended.

Pope Pius Gets Artistic Gift Of Palm Leaves

VATICAN CITY — Pope Pius XII received an artistic gift of palm leaves Saturday as the Christian world prepared to observe the Holy Week anniversary of Christ's suffering, death and resurrection.

The palms, worked into the shape of a monstrance and decorated with a painting of a singing angel, were brought to the pontiff by the superior general of the Camaldolese religious order in Rome.

Since the days of Pope Leo XIII, who reigned from 1878 until 1903, the nuns of this order have decorated palms for popes and cardinals here. About 50 other palms, fashioned into the form of crosses, were delivered Saturday to cardinals and other high prelates of the Vatican Curia.

The Roman Catholic observance of Holy Week throughout the world, by Vatican decree that becomes effective Sunday, will be more austere and solemn than in the past. The decree, issued by the Vatican's Congregation of Rites upon the express orders of the pontiff, returns some Holy Week observances to their more ancient procedure.

The Lenten fast, for example, will continue until midnight of Holy Saturday instead of ending at noon Saturday as it has for years.

The change is designed to emphasize the sorrowful aspect of Holy Saturday, the day that the body of the dead Christ lay in the tomb before His resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Burning Model A Blocks Traffic Friday Afternoon

A burning Model A Ford blocked traffic on Diamond Lake Blvd., about four miles east of Roseburg, Friday afternoon, but the driver and his three young children escaped without serious injury.

Vernon Robinette, Box 121 Idlewild Rt., was returning home with the youngsters. The rear car seat was filled with family clothes just picked up from the cleaners.

According to a relative, they lost all their clothing in the car fire "except what was on their backs." Robinette and his wife have five children.

Roseburg rural firemen were called to the scene. They said the car was a total loss and placed estimate on its value at \$35.

Although the fire was small in size, the story was not. Robinette is said to have been driving down the road when flames shot through the car's floorboards and began licking at the upholstery. He stopped and pushed the children out. Unable to get out the driver's door, Robinette was forced to push out the burning seat and clamor out the opposite side. His clothing was scorched and he suffered minor burns, according to Mrs. C. E. Cudadeck, a relative.

The car was owned by the Cudadeck, who live at Box 121, Idlewild Rt.

Roseburg firemen also were called out Friday. Reason was smoke in the Theo Bond home, 869 SE Chadwick St., at 10:39 a.m. Firemen found finally the cause of the smoke: A toaster failed to pop up. Loss: One slice of bread.

Jerry Ricker, 71, Glendale Resident Passes On Friday

Jerry Ricker, 71, of Glendale, died in the Josephine General Hospital in Grants Pass on March 23.

Ricker was born April 9, 1885, at Matley, Minn. He married Nelle Pimpe on Aug. 8, 1906. He lived in Eastern Oregon for many years, and near Klamath Falls for 10 years. He came to Glendale eight years ago.

He was known as an expert saw filer and had worked at the Robert Dollar Company in Glendale, where he was head filer, up to the time of his fatal illness. He annually had given a paper on some process of filing at the convention of the West Coast Lumbermen Assn.

He was a member of the Elks Lodge, Masonic Lodge, Al Kader Shrine Temple and of the Commandery of Royal Arts of the Masonic Lodge.

Surviving are his wife, Nelle Ricker; two daughters, Mrs. Beverly Fuller of Grants Pass and Mrs. Phyllis May of Klamath Falls; three grandchildren: Terry and Jerry Coleman of Glendale and Donna May of Klamath Falls.

Meantime, another name cropped up as a possible "dark horse" candidate. An informant close to the administration of Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler of Kentucky said in Frankfort yesterday friends of the governor believe this would be the logical time for Chandler to say he is available.

Chandler declined comment on the report, but the Cincinnati Times-Star said it had learned the Kentuckian "is in the process of setting up a nationwide organization to support his candidacy."

Kefauver, in the midst of a hand-shaking swing through parts of Southern California, said in Los Angeles yesterday he saw "a lot of work to be done here." But he added: "I am confident we will carry the state." California will have 68 delegate votes at the Democratic convention.

Stevenson — unsuccessful Democratic standard-bearer four years ago — yesterday criticized Eisenhower administration opposition to proposals for broadening certain social security benefits.

Stevenson came out for the proposals, which call for lowering from 65 to 62 the age at which women may draw social security retirement benefits, and for payments to disabled persons 50 years of age or older.

New York Legislature Rebuffs Gov. Harriman

ALBANY, N.Y. — The New York legislature wound up an election-year session Friday night with a series of rebuffs to Gov. Averell Harriman.

The Republican-controlled Legislature rejected proposals by the Democratic governor on highway finance, taxes, telephone rates, judicial posts and funds for the State Commission Against Discrimination.

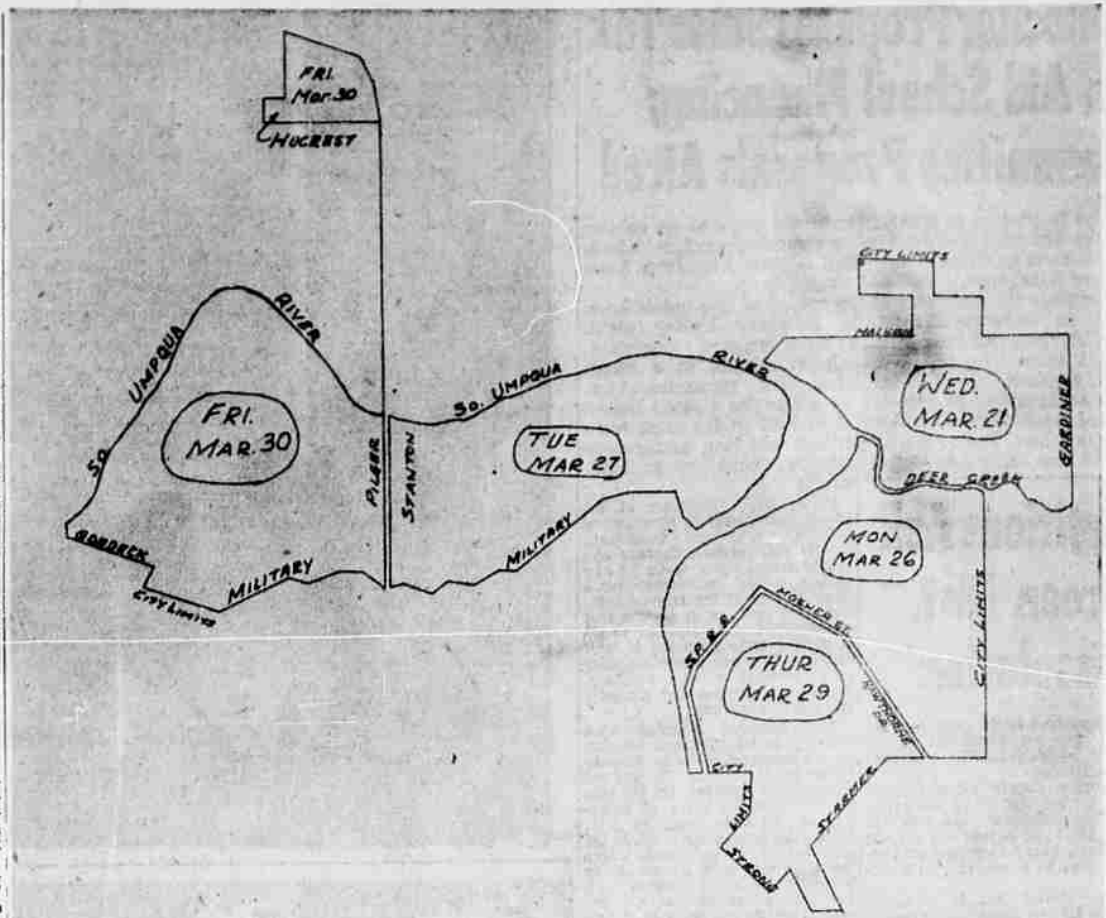
Despite the end-of-session discord, the Republicans and Democrats had cooperated in the passage of major legislation for an increase of state aid to education and a compulsory motor vehicle insurance law.

All Commercial Planes Banned To, From Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus. — Cyprus authorities Saturday banned all commercial plane flights in and out of Cyprus Sunday as part of the strict precautions against possible violence on Greek independence day.

Sunday will be the 13th anniversary of Greek independence from Turkey.

Only a few minor incidents have been reported in the past 48 hours, but observers said they feared pro-Greek Cypriotes were preparing for widespread moves Sunday against British rule.

Air Force Places \$3 Billion Cost Tag On System

WASHINGTON — The Air Force Friday placed a three billion dollar cost tag on its two new warning systems to flash the alarm in event of enemy air attack across the north polar region.

The estimate was disclosed by Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) after a closed door meeting between high Air Force officials and members of a Senate Armed Services subcommittee at which Jackson presided.

"It represents a tremendous investment," Jackson said, "but a small insurance premium, after all, for the intelligence information this detection system would provide."

The figure, he said, embraces: 1. An estimated billion dollar overall expenditure for the radar Distant Early Warning line (known popularly as DEW line).

2. About two billions for operation SAGE, the semiautomatic network of communications that will link all aircraft warning systems for a speedy defense against any attack from the north against the North American continent.

The DEW line figure was about twice as high as the top figure previously mentioned. The SAGE cost had been announced earlier Friday.

The subcommittee meeting, Jackson said, dealt only with DEW line, and concluded formal hearings on the companion projects. The group is considering legislation affecting authorizations for the projects.

Jackson said dates for completion of the companion projects still are a defense secret, but the Arctic construction phases will be complete this year.

Carol Huston, 31, Winston, died Friday in Portland at the Veterans Hospital. He is survived by his wife and three children. Mrs. Huston works at the Winston Emergency Hospital. Funeral services and arrangements will be announced by Long & Orr Mortuary.

Man Held For Shooting Escaped Former Jail

PORTLAND — A check of police records showed Friday that a man arrested after a shooting was the same man released on bail last October before being sentenced to 180 days in jail in absentia.

Leroy Jones, 35, was jailed on a charge of assault with intent to kill. He was accused of wounding Lawrence J. Campbell, 36, with a shotgun Thursday night.

Police said later that Jones had been fined \$100 and sentenced to 180 days in jail in absentia last October after conviction on a charge of drunkenness and trespassing. However, Jones had been released on bail beforehand and never served the sentence.

Municipal Judge J. J. Quillin ordered him to start serving the sentence Friday, before he is tried on the new charge.

ASKS NEW PERMIT

PORTLAND — The Rose City Transit Co. Friday asked the City Council for a new two-year operating permit for city buses, and a financial scale to assure a 5 per cent profit.

The proposal would allow automatic fare increases when net profits of the company fall below 5 per cent of gross operating revenue in any three-month period.

Miss Kelly Cops Limelight During Friend's Wedding

NEW YORK — Film star Grace Kelly, without meaning to was very much "in the act" Friday at the wedding of her actress friend, Rita Gam.

Miss Gam, 27, was married to publisher Thomas Guinzburg, 29, in what was scheduled to be a quiet, simple ceremony at the Sutton Place home of the bridegroom's parents.

About 40 personal friends were present, including Miss Kelly, who will be married April 18-19 to Prince Rainier of Monaco in a regal two-day ceremony. Miss Gam will be an attendant at Miss Kelly's wedding.

Some 50 newsmen and photographers pounced on the bride and groom and Miss Kelly as they emerged from the house after the nuptials.

Miss Kelly smilingly responded to numerous questions. Asked about "no more movies" after her marriage, she repeated what she said Thursday: that she's under contract for four years to MGM, that the decision to go back in pictures will be made later.

It was a first marriage for Guinzburg. Miss Gam divorced television producer Sid Lumet in Mexico last year.
