

Westinghouse Workers End All But One Strike

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Top officials of the independent United Electrical Workers and Westinghouse Electric Corp. have agreed on a five-year contract to end a 153-day strike.

Membership ratification is needed but James J. Matles, UE director of organization, says he is recommending acceptance. Terms of the agreement also would be applied to workers in Philadelphia once their local dispute is settled.

Westinghouse said economic clauses in the contract are the same as that signed with the 44,000-member AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers last Tuesday. That agreement ended a 156-day strike.

Negotiations aimed at bringing peace to the big turbine-producing plant in Philadelphia will be resumed there today.

Wage Boosts Granted
The union locals at the eight other plants will vote tomorrow on acceptance of the national agreement. It calls for a minimum hourly wage increase of 25 cents during the pact's life.

The workers formerly averaged \$2.10 an hour. The pact provides wage increases of from 5 to 17 cents an hour the first year and 12 to 15 cents an hour for each of the next four years. In addition, skilled workers will get an immediate hourly increase ranging from one half to 12 cents.

A coat of living clause calls for a 1-cent hourly pay increase for each half-point rise in the Department of Labor cost of living index. Improved pensions and vacations also are provided.

Unlike the UE pact the UE contract does not incorporate any provisions for setting production standards for day workers or salaried workers. No UE employee is subject to discipline for strike action.

Plants affected by the UE agreement are the Nuttall works in Pittsburgh; Derby, Pa.; Jersey City, N.J.; Bridgeport, Conn.; Detroit; Chicago; Emeryville, Calif.; and Seattle, Wash.

Illinois Demo Leader Switches To Kefauver

CHICAGO (AP)—A veteran Illinois Democratic leader says he has switched allegiance from Adlai E. Stevenson to Sen. Estes Kefauver for the party's presidential nomination.

John Asher, Democratic state central committee chairman from the 21st congressional district in Central Illinois, announced Sunday that he would form a Kefauver for President Club in the district. Stevenson, a former Illinois governor, now is the only one listed on the Democratic presidential ballot for the Illinois primary April 10.

He has planned only a handful of campaign appearances in his home state. Asher said he would write in Kefauver's name in the Illinois presidential primary. He said he switched his support from Stevenson after a tour of 30 downstate counties where, he said, he found strong voter support for the Tennessee senator.

Upper Columbia Project Involves Area Of Canada

WASHINGTON (AP)—A joint Senate committee Monday resumed its efforts to learn what can be done about the "impasse" in negotiations between the United States and Canada over development of the upper Columbia River.

As the hearing renewed, representatives were on hand from the Federal Power Commission, Army Engineers and Department of the Interior to give their views on the subject.

Because of the international nature of the mighty river, the hearing is being held by the full Senate Interior Committee and a special subcommittee composed of six members of the Foreign Relations Committee whose states border Canada.

Much of the hearing to date has concerned the status of U.S. plans for construction of Libby Dam on the Kootenai River in Montana. Canadian approval of the project is required because the dam would back water into Canada, but the dam has said it is prepared neither to sanction nor oppose the Montana project until it completes studies of possible development within its own borders.

Modern Education Hard On Child's Eyesight

FOREST GROVE (AP)—A San Diego child vision specialist told a meeting of optometrists Sunday that modern educational systems cause an overload on a child's eyesight.

Dr. Amoritz Treganza, speaking at the annual Portland meeting of the Oregon Optometric Assn., said the burden of close work causes many of today's visual problems in children.

Dr. Treganza also suggested two rules for children who watch television. They should not be permitted to look at TV while lying on the floor, but should maintain good posture, and they should sit no closer than six feet from a 21-inch screen, she recommended.

HITCHCOCK IS WILLING TO DEBATE SEN. MORSE

BEND (AP)—Phil Hitchcock, seeking Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate, said Saturday he would be willing to debate Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse "any time, any place."

"My only qualification would be that I have something to say about the issues at debate and the ground rules," Hitchcock said.

He told a meeting of supporters here that in his recent swing through the state he found enthusiasm and support for his campaign.

Consultations With Red Leaders Said Progressing

LONDON (AP)—The consultations of Gen. Ivan Serov, chief of Russia's secret police, on security arrangements for the visit next month of Soviet leaders Khrushchev and Bulganin, appeared to be well along if not completed Saturday.

Serov, a harassed visitor who has been called an "odious thug," "revolting butcher" and "murderous turnkey" by the British press, was not at the Soviet Embassy Saturday. He was reported to have disappeared somewhere in the English countryside.

A group of exiles calling themselves "Free Russians" swooped upon the embassy Friday night and scattered anti-Communist literature on the grounds.

Insurance Companies Pay For Missing Bank Note

NEW YORK (AP)—Insurance companies have paid a million dollars to the Chase Manhattan Bank to make up for its misplaced million-dollar U.S. Treasury note.

A Chase Manhattan official said yesterday the bank had entered a claim for the loss and that 18 insurance companies, acting as surety, came up with the money.

The bank spokesman said, "The insurance companies eventually can get back their money from the government." He did not elaborate.

The Treasury note was first missed March 6. The spokesman said a search through many millions of sheets of paper will continue until the note—which is theoretically negotiable—is found.

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Business Courses For Adults Slated At R. H. S. Unit

Two business courses are getting considerable attention in Roseburg this week, according to Adult Education Director Richard Ross.

One which starts this week is called General Sales Training. It will be taught by Hal McCall, a Roseburg salesman. It will involve phases of selling from an introduction, through merchandising, methods of selling, financing, customer relations and other techniques. The course will be conducted each Tuesday from 7 to 10 p.m. at the Social Arts Building at Roseburg High School. It is a 30-hour course and tuition is \$7.50.

The other business course is personal financial management, directed by Ralph Snyder, a Roseburg High School teacher. The course is designed to acquaint each student with relevant facts about management of personal finances. Several local experts will be available for lecture and discussion in the fields of insurance, stocks, bonds, estates and other financial plans. This course will also be conducted Tuesday nights, from 7 to 9 in the Social Arts Building. Tuition is \$6.

Other Classes Still Open
Two other classes in which openings are still available are "Know Your Car" and Advanced Welding. "Know Your Car" is designed expressly for women, in order to acquaint them about what to do in emergencies, how to diagnose car troubles and methods of car care. It will be instructed each Tuesday from 7 to 9 p.m. by Russ Madsen, high school auto mechanics instructor. Tuition is \$6.

Openings are still available also in the advanced welding course. The course started last week. It is held at the shop building at high school. It is designed for those who already know how to weld.

Emergency Board Nixes Funds For Ship Museum

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon State Emergency Board refused Friday to allocate any funds for the Battleship Oregon Museum in Portland. The board directed the State Department of Finance to study how much it would cost to store the museum articles.

The 1957 Legislature then would decide whether to close the museum permanently.

Last year, the Legislature refused to approve a bill to operate the museum. It has continued to operate, however, through private contributions.

Harry Williams, chairman of the Battleship Oregon Commission, said the Legislature does not have jurisdiction in the matter and cannot close the ship.

The battleship itself was moored in Portland harbor until World War II. It became a barge, and now is a rusting hulk at Guam.

The main remains as a monument along the Portland seawall. The battleship Oregon Commission asked the board Friday for \$7,532 to run the museum until the next Legislature.

Williams said the \$7,532 was given to the commission in a trust fund by the U. S. Navy, but that the Legislature ordered it transferred to the state general fund.

Fluoride Reduces Dental Decay, Claim Researchers

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A research team from the University of Chicago says additional evidence has been found that fluoridated water reduces dental decay.

Dr. Iden N. Hill, J. Roy Blayney and Walter Wolf of the Zoller Memorial Dental Clinic reported Saturday the fluoridation program in Evanston, Ill., started in 1946, has cut the rate of tooth decay for children 6 to 8 years old by 58 per cent.

In a paper delivered at the annual meeting of the International Assn. for Dental Research, the group said the tooth decay rate for 12 to 14 year olds was about 22 per cent less. The older children didn't start drinking fluoridated water until they were about 3 years old.

ADA Head Says Johnson Has Lowered Demo Party

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Joseph L. Rauh, Jr., national chairman of Americans for Democratic Action, charges that Senate leader Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) has brought the Democratic Party to "its lowest point in 25 years" by imitating rather than opposing the Eisenhower Administration.

Rauh's comment Friday night was the strongest attack the ADA has yet made on the Democratic leadership on Congress. The ADA, which defines itself as a liberal organization espousing New Deal-Deal principles, usually reserves such attacks for Republicans.

URGED TO ACCEPT OFFER
KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP)—Defense Minister Abdalla Khalid says Communist Czechoslovakia is urging Sudan to accept an offer of arms but that this country wants to consider the question fully. He added that Sudan does not need arms urgently.

Egypt, Sudan's neighbor, began receiving arms from Czechoslovakia last fall.

Immunity Law Given High Court's Support

refused to answer questions, claiming the Fifth Amendment's protection against self-incrimination. Ullman was promised immunity, but still refused to testify. He was then sentenced to six months' imprisonment for contempt.

Frankfurter said in Monday's majority opinion the history of the privilege against self-incrimination established "not only that it is not to be interpreted literally, but also that its sole concern is, as its name indicates, with the danger to a witness forced to give testimony leading to the infliction of penalties affixed to criminal acts."

Immunity said as is given by the 1954 law "displaces the danger," Frankfurter said. He added: "Once the reason for the privilege ceases the privilege ceases."

"The immunity act is concerned with the national security. It reflects a congressional policy to increase the possibility of more complete and open disclosure by removal of fear of state prosecution."

Dissenting, Douglas and Black said that under the immunity law "the privilege of silence is exchanged for a partial, undefined, vague immunity."

It means that Congress has granted far less than it has taken away, Douglas wrote.

The guarantee against self-incrimination contained in the Fifth Amendment is not only a protection against conviction and prosecution but a safeguard of conscience and human dignity and freedom of expression as well."

Negro Mob Beats Two Whites In Gun Use Sequel

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)—Two white men were beaten by a mob of angry Negroes before five carloads of officers scattered the attackers Saturday. The incident followed the shooting of a Negro man.

Police said the most seriously hurt were John J. Maloy, 39, a white, and Foster King, 34, a Negro whom Maloy shot in a leg. Maloy suffered a brain concussion and compound fracture of one leg.

The officers gave this account of the incident: Maloy and King were selling oranges from a truck in a Negro section. Maloy and King became involved in an argument when Maloy accused a Negro of stealing a crate of oranges.

The truck pulled a pistol and shot King in the leg. The shooting drew a crowd of Negroes and one of them, Love Andrews, 29, snatched the gun from Maloy. Then the Negroes attacked the two white men.

Charges are planned against both Maloy and King when they leave the hospital.

Andrews was jailed on a charge of affray, Calhoun was arrested on the same count and freed on \$100 bond.

Green School Students Study Polio Equipment

Green School fourth graders this week were studying the methods of rehabilitation of polio patients.

Thirty-four boys were at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital today and 28 girls will study the same equipment Tuesday in the physical therapy department of the hospital.

The Green School fourth graders have been studying muscles and muscle action at school, including the effects of poliomyelitis. Much of the attention of the children will be focused today and Tuesday on the methods of rehabilitation used for polio ravaged patients.

The children will see a respirator in action, hear how polio affects the muscles and the effects of the Salk polio vaccine. They will also have a demonstration of tank and chest respirators and rocking beds.

Persons at the hospital will also discuss why respirators are needed, physical therapy used and exercises used to restore and rebuild muscles after a polio attack.

BLM Employee Finishes Aerial Photo Course

J. M. Pedersen of Roseburg was among 21 foresters from the Pacific Northwest, Canada and Alaska who completed a five-day aerial photo short course at Oregon State College Saturday. He is an employee of the Bureau of Land Management office in Roseburg.

McKay's Return To Oregon, Campaigning By Hitchcock Highlight Oregon Politics

Douglas McKay's return to Oregon to get his Republican senatorial nomination campaign going, and the sharp campaigning by Philip Hitchcock that caused him to do it, highlighted Oregon politics in the week March 18-24.

Although McKay returned chiefly to get his organization set up, he issued a statement defending the filing which had been attacked as masterminded by the national Republican committee.

Hitchcock, campaigning with vigor, won an unprecedented endorsement from the executive board of the Oregon College League of Young Republicans; struck out at McKay's last-day filing by saying choice of a candidate should be made "by the Republican voters of Oregon and by no one else," and told why he considers himself the best man to beat Democratic Wayne Morse in the fall.

"If Morse should ever attack my stand on a particular issue, I am in the unimpeachable position of replying, 'Why, Senator? He is largely saying what you believe six years ago,'" said Hitchcock.

McKay issued a statement in which he denied the reports that national party leaders were responsible for his entry into the race. He said he hadn't planned to enter, despite urgent pleas from the party leaders, until he was shown results of a poll which listed him as the best man to beat Morse.

McKay agreed he had been told in Washington the others would withdraw from the race, but he added that had no bearing on his decision.

Twice in the week McKay and Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) had disagreements. At a hearing in Washington McKay accused Neuberger of trying to embarrass him by questioning. And later Neuberger said it became apparent when McKay named William L. Phillips of Salem as one of the management specialists for the Klamath Indians, that he was re-warding a political crony. Phillips is McKay's campaign manager.

This accusation is false, McKay said, adding that he submitted three names and the Klamath Indians did the choosing and set the salaries. Phillips said when he took the campaign job he resigned the tribal position.

There was much write-in talk during the week. Sen. Estes Kefauver said he'd be happy to have his name written in on the Oregon Democratic presidential ballot. Alf Corbett, backer of Adlai Stevenson, said he had always taken for granted since there were no filings that write-in campaigns would be asked. And William Healy, GOP secretary of state aspirant, asked his managers to urge a write-in of Vice President Nixon's name for renomination.

In the governorship race, Gov. Elmo Smith got in a few flecks although his primary opposition is negligible. At Newport he told a GOP group that the Republican Party had done much for the laboring man and that the state's tax situation, while unpleasant, was sound.

On the Democratic side, Robert Holmes said at Corvallis that the Republicans had got the state into its bad financial position by forcing 75 per cent of income taxes was sound.
