

Bonds Purchased For Huge Bridge

OLYMPIA, Wash. — Union Securities, a New York syndicate, Tuesday purchased the initial \$3,300,000 bond issue to finance construction of the second interstate bridge at Vancouver, Wash.

The syndicate will charge the state an interest rate of 3.3288 per cent, lowest of three submitted by bidders. It means the state would pay out \$2,926,428 in interest over their 15 year life.

A subsequent issue of \$5,200,000 in bonds is planned when the funds are needed. They are not sold now to avoid paying interest on the money before it is needed.

Tolls on the new bridge and the one now standing will pay off the bonds. The tolls will not be imposed until both bridges are in use.

Guffy F. Atkinson Co., San Francisco, is expected to start work in the near future on the new bridge. It was awarded a \$6,681,940 contract for the work Tuesday by Oregon Highway Officials. The two states are building the new bridge as a cooperative venture.

Puzzled Doctors Dig Into Illness Of Train Riders

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va. — Puzzled doctors and investigators dug deeper Wednesday into the mystery of the illness of three persons who drank ginger ale aboard a railroad car which President Eisenhower rode three days later.

Physicians reported that one of the three "definitely has uremic poisoning" and that another, also still hospitalized, is "coming along nicely" after being quite sick.

The third person who was stricken was recovered sufficiently Tuesday to go out visiting.

All three became ill last Thursday evening after drinking bottled ginger ale aboard a private railroad car in which Eisenhower later traveled from Washington to Mexico and Canadian leaders. The President left the capital Sunday night and arrived here Monday morning.

So far, the doctors of all of the persons stricken have been unable to find the cause of their illness.

Meanwhile, Eisenhower arranged to travel back to Washington Wednesday aboard the same private railroad car.

The Secret Service and investigators for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad have launched an inquiry to try to find out whether the ginger ale was poisoned.

5-Year-Old Winston Boy Hurt Slightly In Mishap

A 5-year-old Winston boy was reported in good condition today following a Tuesday evening mishap in which he ran into the side of a slow-moving pickup truck on on Rose Street in Winston.

Treated and released at a Roseburg hospital was Gordon Holte, son of Mrs. Fran Holte, reports correspondent Mrs. Ted Peterson. The pickup involved is owned by Harold Martin, Winston Police Chief Ben Scheele told Mrs. Peterson. Name of the driver was not immediately learned.

March Weather Is Crazy Quilt Style For Nation

March's capricious climatic capers carved a crazy-quilt weather pattern across the nation Wednesday. Most every type of storm—snow, dust, rain, sleet and wind—was reported.

The most severe windstorm of the year struck six Western Prairie States Tuesday, swirling clouds of dust across an 800-mile path from Cheyenne, Wyo., to Waco, Tex.

Howling Winds, with snow and falling temperatures, brought back wintry weather from the Northern Plains to the upper Mississippi Valley.

Rain and thunderstorms, with gusty winds, swept across the lower and middle Mississippi Valley northeastward to the Ohio Valley. Freezing rain and sleet pelted the Western Great Lakes region. The blustery March weather missed most of the Southland. Temperatures were summer-like in many areas and mostly fair weather prevailed.

The dust storms, hitting areas in Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, caused extensive damage to crops, grazing land and range animals. Some relief was in prospect for Southern Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico.

Schools were closed, traffic stalled and air travel curtailed as the gale-like winds sent clouds of dust across the prairie lands. Gusts up to 85 m.p.h. were reported in Eastern Colorado.

A storm center in the middle Mississippi valley was blamed for the heavy fall of snow, thunderstorms, freezing rain and strong winds in mid-continent areas.

Up to 6 inches of snow fell in North Dakota and parts of Wisconsin and around 3 to 5 inches in Minnesota. There was much drifting of snow in the Northern Plains while the Southern Plains were plagued by dust storms.

Hounds Lead To Berserk Man's Arrest Today

CALLANDS, Va. — Police, aided by bloodhounds, early Wednesday captured a man who had held them off with gunfire for 10 hours and then escaped in the darkness.

Lum Harris, Negro, about 45, was found by the bloodhounds in some reeds just a little while after they were put on the trail near the farm home from which Harris had escaped. He fled when a police armored car smashed down the walls.

Harris, sought by police for battering his aged father critically with a hammer, wounded four police in the ensuing fight. Some 20 police were in on the siege.

Eight tear gas grenades fired into the house where Harris was holed up had failed to dislodge him, although witnesses said the house was so full of fumes it appeared to be on fire.

The bloodhounds took a bee line for Harris and stood over him as he lay sleeping in the tall grasses. He awoke and started for his four-pound hammer and chain with which he had beaten his father, but two state troopers grabbed him and shackled his hands behind his back.

After that the Negro, a former mental hospital inmate, was meek. He was suffering from a shotgun pellet wound in his right eye, and a wound in the right leg.

Beck Emerges Still Top Man Of Teamsters

HONOLULU — The top crust of the AFL Teamsters Union, largest in the nation, headed back to the mainland Wednesday after compressing a scheduled six-day executive committee meeting into two sunny sessions.

President Dave Beck emerges still the undisputed boss with resolutions giving him "full power" to:

1. Move in personally to clean up any corruption, with New York and Minneapolis mentioned as specific targets.
2. Carry out an organizing drive for 250,000 new members.
3. Smooth over with AFL-CIO a hassle about a proposed loan by the teamsters to the International Longshoremen's Assn.

The 61-year-old president said his move into New York City does not mean he plans to step into the current court battle over the joint teamster council there.

"In my opinion the New York election was 100 per cent honest. Whether or not there is anything to the allegations raised since will be decided in court," Beck said.

"My only interest in the ILA has always been the help they could give us in organizing along the South and Gulf Coasts. I have always opposed the loan," Beck told a press conference after the executive committee ended its sessions Tuesday.

UEW Ratifies Settlement With Westinghouse Corp.

NEW YORK — Members of the United Electrical Workers (IUE) Wednesday ratified the national strike settlement agreement negotiated with Westinghouse Electric Corp.

James J. Matles, director of organization for the union, said, however, the ratification does not settle a local strike of 6,000 IUE members at the Westinghouse South Philadelphia plant.

They walked out last Oct. 11 protesting a proposed change in wage payments plans. The UE said the change would cut wages an average of 50 cents an hour.

The contract covers 3,200 UE members at eight Westinghouse plants where the UE has representation.

The 5-year pact signed by the UE with Westinghouse was similar to one negotiated with the International Union of Electrical workers, ending a 156-day strike.

Hillsboro Man Dies At Age 110

HILLSBORO — James Rockwell, who spun many tales of adventure of his early life and who said he was 110 years old, will be buried here next Monday. He died, after a seven-month illness, Monday of this week.

He lived alone, was never married and so far as is known there are no survivors.

He said he was born in New York on May 1, 1845. He told many tales of his early life including having been a member of Morgan's Raiders in the Civil War. He said he was captured by Federal troops three times and that when the war ended he was in a Union prison at Rock Island, Ill. There were no records to bear this out.

He came to Oregon in 1901 settling in Portland. In 1928 he moved to Washington County where he lived at Forest Grove and later at Hillsboro.

He celebrated what he said was his 101st birthday in 1946 by taking an airplane ride.

Earl Isham, 60, Dies Wednesday

Earl Isham, 60, veteran of World War I, died March 28 in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He was born August 12, 1895 in Wheatland, Ore., and was a resident of Salem at the time of his death.

Surviving are his wife, Tillie of Salem; a son, Leroy Isham of Salem; two daughters: Mrs. LaReva Lindeburg of Vallejo, Calif., and Miss Bernice Isham of Salem; seven sisters, and three brothers.

The body has been removed to The Chapel of the Roses and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Russian Plan Omits Banning Atomic Weapons

LONDON — The Soviet Union has proposed a new plan for world disarmament omitting the usual Communist demand for renunciation of atomic weapons.

Emphasizing cuts in conventional arms, the Soviet proposal was reported to have urged only a ban or strict control on atomic tests. Demands for outlawing of nuclear weapons—immediately or eventually—had been high on the Russian proposal list during previous disarmament negotiations.

To some Western observers, the change seemed to indicate that the Russians believe they have reached nuclear parity with the West—and can depend on their atomic arsenal rather than enormous standing armies for protection and to carry out their policies.

The new Soviet plan was submitted to the five-power U.N. Disarmament subcommittee, where the United States already has proposed conventional arms cuts to reduce U.S. and Soviet armed forces to 2 1/2 million men each.

Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko presented the Russian plan and discussed it for an hour at yesterday's session.

Details of the Russian proposals were not made public. But informants said they included "substantial" suggestions regarding the limitation of conventional arms.

Conferees Reject Cotton Price Cut Provisions Of Bill

WASHINGTON — Senate House conferees Wednesday rejected a Senate-approved provision of the farm bill which opponents contended would lower cotton prices and supports from five to ten dollars a bale or more.

Sen. Holland (D-Fla.), one of 10 Congress members attempting to compromise different farm measures passed by the two branches, earlier had predicted the "death knell" may have sounded already for any farm legislation at this session.

Sen. Eastland (D-Miss.) and other advocates of the change removing the controversial cotton provision said Wednesday's action would help U.S. cotton to compete better in world markets.

Sen. Ellender (D-La.) said the five-Senate conferees were forced to drop the provision "because the House conferees were unanimously opposed to it and were adamant."

"If we wanted a farm bill we had to recede," he added.

Malenkov Back In London Today

LONDON — Georgi Malenkov returned to London Wednesday from a tour of power plants in north England and Scotland—and waxed enthusiastic about kids, scenery and the joys of friendship.

The former Soviet premier flew back from Scotland in a chartered Vickers Viscount turbo-prop airliner.

He waved to bystanders and smilingly posed for photographers at the airport.

"It's been a wonderful trip," he said via an interpreter.

Malenkov, now inspector of power stations, officially is here on a three-week tour of British electrical and power plants. Unofficially his main job has been to make friends as a front-runner for next month's visit by Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party chief Khrushchev.

Throughout his junketing, like a politician looking for votes, he has patted children on the head, talked to honeymooning couples, strolled along sidewalks, and visited the people in their homes.

Shivers Labels Johnson Buildup As Cynical Move

HOUSTON, Tex. — Gov. Allan Shivers last night labeled as "cynical and calculated" a proposal that Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson be named Texas' favorite son presidential candidate and head of the state's Democratic National Convention delegation.

The proposal was made by House Speaker Sam Rayburn, long a political enemy of Shivers.

The governor, who also is being boomed for Texas delegation chief, praised Johnson for his work as Senate majority leader but questioned his qualifications as "majority leader for Texas Democrats."

Rayburn's proposal, Shivers said in a speech, "was a cynical and calculated effort to divide the conservative Democrats of Texas and maneuver the senior senator into the Democratic Advisory Council-Political Action Committee camp, where he does not belong."

"It was and is their trump card in their game to take over the state convention, the Texas delegation—and Lyndon Johnson."
