Federico Rey, Pilar Gomez, Dancers Coming Monday

One of the foremost Spanish and Latin American dance teams of today, Federico Rey and Pilar Gomez will appear in Roseburg on the stage of the Central Junior High School auditorium Monday at 8:15 p.m. This will be the last in a series of five programs of the Roseburg Community Concert Assn.

Trained in technique at leading academies of the old world and the new, the pair have gone straight to the people for traditional folk rhythms, steps and movements, advance reports state. Their music is taken from original folk tunes and from works of the great composers in the Spanish idiom. Rey is also a noted stage and costume designer.

During the summer of 1955 they toured Europe for the fourth time. In America they have become favorites at leading dance festivals, including the famed Jacob's Pillow in Massachusetts, and at fabulous nightclubs such as the Thunderbird in Las Vegas and many more.

A native of the Basque country of France, Rey began dancing at an early age. He had his first lessons in castnet playing in Paris from the great dancer La Argentina, and studied in the academies of Madrid and Seville in Spain. Later he toured France, Belgium, Holland and England, lecturing on and demonstrating Iberian dances.

When he came to the United States he created the sets and costumes for the French Casino Revue. In New York, another famous Spanish dancer, La Argentina, invited him to join her troupe. He became her partner and for three years toured the country

March Of Dimes Effort Brought Total Of \$39,699

The 1956 March of Dimes effort in Douglas County brought net receipts of \$39,699.24, according to a final compilation reported today by Dr. V. J. Anderson, county chairman.

Although the total is a little under the 1955 figure, Dr. Anderson termed it "another outstanding drive" and said he believes the county will again rank second to Multnomah County, as it did last year.

The biggest area total, of course, was that of Roseburg, with \$24,243.93 net, about \$600 above 1955. City chairman was Joseph A. C. Haystead, The Winston-Dillard area gifts were included in the Roseburg total.

Other area totals and chairmen were: Reedsport, Paul Hurllocker, \$2,811.26; Myrtle Creek, Dr. Henry M. Goodwin, \$1,792.83; Oakland, Mrs. Fern Neas, \$1,777.48; Sutherlin, Fred G. Muir, \$1,491.32; Glendale, Mrs. Mary Wright, \$1,412.67; Riddle, Mrs. Elaine M. Stowbridge, \$1,372.54; Yoncalla, Mrs. Sylvia F. Meier, \$1,318.09; Drain, Thomas A. Myers, \$1,167.30; Glide, Mrs. Gustaf Schaefer, \$890; Elkton, Mrs. Darwin Pullen, \$638.47; Canyonville, Mrs. John Aaronson, \$511.75; Dixonville, Mrs. Jean Radcliffe, \$294.14; Tenmile, Mrs. Eva Russell, \$287.06; Toketee Falls, Mrs. Virginia Steele, \$270.01; Days Creek-Milo-Tiller-Drew, Mrs. Frank Pickett, \$230.10; and Umpqua, Mrs. Myrtle Swinehart, \$145.66.

County expenses totaled \$1,555.31, which was subtracted from a gross of \$41,254.55.

The Mothers March brought in \$10,182.80, and school collections raised \$13,545.75, the two highest categories. Roseburg totals were \$5,658.91 and \$10,624.24.

Other collections included \$3,365.57 from employers and business, \$3,814.04 from labor and employees, \$3,514.65 from special events, \$3,430.80 from clubs and organizations, \$1,725.53 from coin collectors, \$175 from U.S. Veterans Hospital, and \$1,279.91 miscellaneous.

and James W. Hamilton.

Bean succeeded James Finlay Watson, first circuit judge of the judicial district, which then included Benton County in addition to Douglas, Lane, Coos and Curry. Judge Bean went on the bench in 1882, and was elevated to the supreme court in 1888.

He was succeeded by Judge Hamilton, who served until his death in 1933, a period of 35 years. Bean's judicial career covered 49 years.

B. L. Eddy was appointed to fill the post vacated by the death of Judge Hamilton, and in 1934, Judge Carl E. Wimberly was elected to the circuit bench.

Wimberly, who presided at Friday's program, has been repeatedly re-elected since that time.

Lusk mentioned several other judges and lawyer-legislators from this area who have achieved distinction in public life and who did their part in carrying on "this institution of justice" brought by the settlers to the Umpqua Valley.

The dedication was held in Circuit Courtroom "A" in the west wing of the building, but both new circuit courtrooms and the new district courtroom were open for inspection during the afternoon.

Distinguished guests introduced by Roseburg's other circuit judge, Charles Hamilton, were Supreme Court Justices James T. Brand and William C. Perry, U.S. District Court Judge William G. East of Portland, Lawrence T. Harris of Eugene, former supreme court justice and circuit judge, U.S. Rep. Harris Ellsworth and George A. Rhoten, president of the Oregon State Bar Assn.

Others introduced at the ceremony included Circuit Judges Victor Guiver of Albany, Joseph B. Felton and Val D. Sloper of Salem, Frank B. Reid, William S. Fort and Alfred T. Goodwin of Eugene, District Judge Kenneth A. Poole of Lane County, and state legislators Sen. Paul E. Geddes and Reps. V. T. Jackson and John Amacher.

Earlier in the program, Commissioner Frank Ashley presented the courtroom keys to Judge Wimberly and County Judge Carl C. Hill welcomed the people to the new courtroom. District Judge Warren A. Woodruff of Roseburg responded with thanks to county officials and citizens.

Activities opened with invocation by Father Alfred S. Tyson of St. George's Episcopal Church and the flag salute, led by three Fullerton troop Boy Scouts. The courtroom was crowded during the one-hour program sponsored by the Douglas County Bar Assn., headed by George W. Neuner, James G. Richmond, Spencer W. Yates and Daniel R. Dimick served on the dedication committee.

Thousands Of Pilgrims Arrive At Vatican City

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Pius XII prepared to give his Holy Sunday message of peace to the world as thousands of pilgrims continued to arrive Saturday for the final solemn rites of Holy Week.

Pilgrims and tourists now in Rome were estimated at more than 200,000. Hotels were packed.

Despite a drizzling rain, thousands of pilgrims and residents came to St. Peter's Basilica for the third and final tenebrae (shadows) service held to commemorate the death of Christ on the cross. Similar services were held in many of Rome's nearly 500 churches.

Vatican sources said the Pope's Easter Sunday speech would doubtless touch on the subject of peace. In past Easter addresses, he has referred to the resurrection of Christ, and then usually developed a current theme. Last year he devoted much of his Easter speech to nuclear energy, urging world leaders to use it in peaceful causes and to improve the lot of men everywhere.

TV Station KPIC Goes On Air Sunday Evening

essary for PT&T to install the relay for KPIC.

Pierce said the station could have been on the air "earlier, but we thought it would be to the public benefit to hold off until we could go on with the best."

For the Douglas County public, the announcement meant the end of a three-month wait. It was originally planned to have the station on the air by the first of the year. But snags set back the date.

A series of technical difficulties arose, culminating in the installation of the microwave system.

The station initially will carry a duplicate of the Eugene schedule. At some time in the future, KPIC will carry local programming.

However, all network programs and shows emanating from Eugene will be relayed to Roseburg over the microwave system.

Programs from three networks will be carried here. They are CBS, NBC and ABC. Most of the test shows in television will be directly available to Douglas County viewers.

It's expected that the station will have a wide viewing range. It will telecast on channel 4, a low frequency peculiarly effective in mountainous country such as Douglas County.

Pierce and other Southwest Oregon Television Broadcasting Co. officials anticipate that programs will be sent into the Coos Bay and Reedsport areas.

Test patterns have been picked up as far away as Newport, and the KPIC signal is said to be very strong in Grants Pass.

The 100-foot TV tower is located atop Rose Mountain, just north of Roseburg and in full view of most residential areas.

Shortly after the announcement of the proposed advent of broadcasts from KPIC, Umpqua Radio and Television which operates the cable system in Roseburg reported it will convert its system to reproduce the KPIC signal.

Noble Goettel, an officer of the company, said the television cable system will be converted to drop KVAL-TV Sunday, so the signal can be picked up when the new station begins broadcasts. Engineer Eugene Roelle said there would be no interruption on service.

Glenora McMillan, who has been conducting the Teacher's Training class at the church, will be guest speaker during the evening.

The Olivet Presbyterian Church will hold a family church service at 9:45 a.m. with Sunday school classes for the kindergarten and nursery age children.

Special choir music will also be presented at the 11 a.m. service, and a nursery will be provided for children under school age.

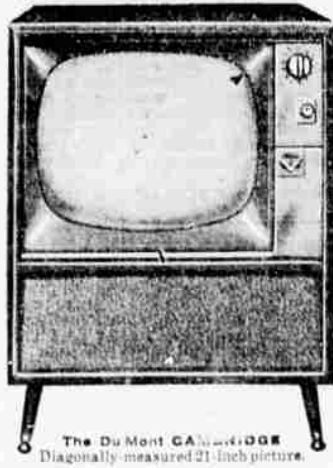
