Services Scheduled For T. Bowman

Thomas Jackson Bowman, 71, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at a Portland hospital March 31, following a brief illness.

He was born at Black Rock, Ark., July 15, 1884, and came to Myrtle Creek with his parents in 1891, where he resided until 10 years ago when he moved to Roseburg where he was employed by the U. S. Plywood Corp.

He was married at Portland on July 1, 1918, to Florence Reed. He was a member of the Methodist Church, Umpqua Post 16 American Legion, Douglas Bar, racks 176, Veterans of World War 1, and the Myrtle Creek Grange.

Surviving are his wife, Florence Bowman of Roseburg; two brothers: Jess Bowman of Roseburg, and Alva Bowman of Myrtle Creek; and a sister, Mrs. Arthur Dyer of Myrtle Creek. Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Tuesday at 11 a.m., with the Rev. Ellsworth Tilton of the First Methodist Church of Roseburg officiating.

Concluding services and a vault interment will follow in the IOOF Cemetery in Myrtle Creek.

Roseburg TV Relay System Said Unique

Roseburg marked up a "first" in Oregon TV circles when station KPIC went on the air Sunday.

The microwave relay system, installed for KPIC by Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., is the first of its kind in the state, according to local telephone Manager Jack McGuire.

Signals sent out on the air by KVAL-TV in Eugene are picked up by a special antenna at P&T's new microwave relay station at Harney Mountain near Cottage Grove. Special electronic equipment installed for this particular system then mixes the sound and picture signals picked up from the Eugene station.

From Harney Mountain the combined signals are beamed through the air to KPIC's tower, bounced off a 6-by-8-foot aluminum reflector, and directed to a dish-like microwave antenna lying face up on the ground.

By means of cable the TV signals are taken into the KPIC transmitting studio, unscrambled and then rebroadcast to be viewed in the Roseburg area.

Pacific Telephone television technicians spent some two weeks working on the system before it was perfected, McGuire indicated.

Special equipment was flown to Portland from the Midwest, assembled there and rushed here in order to get Oregon's new television outlet on the air as quickly as possible.

Embezzlements Force Firm Into Bankruptcy

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—The state is prepared to ask a grand larceny indictment against Minnie Mangum today.

The case of the mild-mannered 52-year-old spinster came before a Corporation Court grand jury more than three months after her arrest on charges of embezzling from a loan company.

Total thefts from the Commonwealth Building and Loan Assn., which "Miss Minnie" served as assistant secretary and treasurer, have been set at almost three million dollars.

She has been charged specifically with embezzling \$174,661.30. Since her arrest, Dec. 29, the company has gone out of business—bankrupted by shortages.

Attorneys for the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. have begun filing suits against individuals who allegedly received Commonwealth funds from "Miss Minnie."

The defendant denied, in answer to one of the suits brought in U.S. District Court here, that he had embezzled funds of the loan company.

Mrs. Garey was one of 173 such volunteers selected in the United States. Her name and those of the others were placed in a box. One was picked at random Sunday evening on the Ted Mack television amateur hour.

As a volunteer, Mrs. Garey has given more than 4,000 hours of service to the hospital. Since 1947, she has been active in the program. Mrs. Garey serves through the American Legion Auxiliary.

She has been rehabilitation and hospital equipment chairman for the auxiliary.

At the hospital, she assists in recreation, chaplain's and nursing service and works directly with patients. During her spare time, she helps her husband at his store on Stephens Street. The couple has four sons and one daughter. Each son served in a branch of the service.

Columbia Basin Snow Poses Big Flood Threat

WASHINGTON (AP)—An unusual heavy snow pack in the Columbia Basin threatens spring floods by "starting the process," two Oregon senators said Sunday in a letter to Army Engineers.

Democrats Morse and Neuberger wrote Lt. Gen. Samuel D. Sturgis, chief of engineers, the snowpack creates an "emergency situation (which) should be met with emergency measures, including any feasible works not now within the jurisdiction of the corps, by the federal government."

The senators asked that: "A report be prepared as soon as possible detailing what can be done and what funds and legislation, if any, are needed to do the job correctly."

Medford Boy Killed In Gravel Pit Collapse

MEDFORD (AP)—An overhanging ledge collapsed in a gravel pit near here Saturday, killing a 14-year-old boy digging a tunnel into the bank.

David Dunn, Medford, was buried under a shower of mud and rock. Two playmates, Gary Beach, 13, and Donald Cranston, 11, were thrown into nearby Bear Creek, but escaped serious injury.

The four-foot-thick ledge about 10 feet above the tunnel the boys were digging had been weakened by recent flood waters washing into the gravel pit.

Oregon Petitions Seek Lieut. Governor Office

PORTLAND (AP)—Petitions begin circulating over the weekend to put a measure creating the state office of lieutenant governor on the November general election ballot.

Sponsors, including the Oregon State Grange, the Oregon Farmers Union and the AFL-CIO, have until July 3 to get the 40,000 required signatures.

Train Kills Man Who Ignores Shasta's Horn

EUGENE (AP)—Joe Stevens, 55, Nampa, Idaho, was struck and killed by the Southern Pacific Shasta Daylight here Saturday night.

The train engineer said he saw the man standing on the track as the northbound streamliner approached the station here. He made no attempt to get out of the way, even after the train's horn sounded, the engineer reported.

WHARTON RANCH SOLD

Mr. and Mrs. George Wharton have sold their ranch near Glendale to H. V. Crook, owner of the Umpqua Florist Shop in Roseburg, according to a report from Glendale correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

The 29.68-acre ranch is located about 1 1/2 miles west of Glendale between the old and new North Umpqua highways. The property contains 20 acres of walnuts and a three-bedroom house. Crook said he expected to build greenhouses on the property.

BLAST DRAWS POLICE

Farm Vote's Trend Eyed In Wisconsin's Primary

The possibility it may show a trend in farmers' voting toward political attention today.

Wisconsin's primary election. Otherwises tomorrow's presidential preference voting there shaped up largely as a popularity contest between President Eisenhower and Sen. Estes Kefauver. Wisconsin voters are not bound by party affiliations in the primary and can vote for either a Republican or a Democratic candidate.

Kefauver has no opposition for the state's 28 convention votes, and Eisenhower has only to overcome what is generally regarded as a token entry to assure himself of the 30 GOP convention delegates. No write-in votes are provided under Wisconsin laws.

Democrats forecast a shift from Republican to Democratic ballots, especially among the 30 per cent of the state's voters who are farmers, as a protest against administration agricultural policies.

ST. HELENS, Ore. (AP)—Catalpa and jeers from pickets marked the first anniversary of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union strike at the Fir-Tex Insulating Board plant here Sunday.

Company officials said they had feared an effort would be made to halt non-union workers entering and leaving the struck plant, but no trouble developed.

Half a dozen state police cars were on patrol.

Union and company representatives deadlocked in a dispute, which arose over wages and working conditions. A state conciliation board recently recommended arbitration but the company refused.

year, more credit from the farm's home administration, expansion of market research activities, more liberal soil conservation payments, and a wide dispersal of industry to afford jobs for farmers as a supplementary labor market.

The subcommittee reported that as farm production capacity has increased, 600,000 farms have vanished between 1940 and 1954, with "factory in the field" commercial operations threatening to supplant entirely the family farm.

Rep. Clark W. Thompson (D-Tex.) headed the subcommittee study, which started last August.
