

Eisenhower Advises Against Arguments Of Uninformed

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Tuesday cautioned against putting stock in "ignorant, uninformed argument that only in armaments are we going to find a solution to our foreign problems."

The President made his statement in a brief informal talk to about 250 members of the Advertising Council, an organization which helps the government promote public service programs for better understanding of the American way of life.

In speaking out against what he termed "ignorant, uninformed argument" in favor of armament, Eisenhower noted the United States now is spending about \$6 billion dollars each year for defense.

MANY SEEK SMLT.
TROUTDALE (AP)—An estimated 7,500 persons were dipping for fish in the Sandy River Tuesday night as the annual smelt run continued.

James C. Miller, Game Commission officer, reported that most fishermen easily caught their 25-pound limit.

The President placed great emphasis on the need for trade, and industrialization of overseas countries, with the view to raising their standards of living.

That, he said, "is something constructive." He also emphasized the need for organizations such as the Advertising Council to spread abroad the idea that the United States is interested only in helping such nations.

This country, the President said, should sustain its position "by helping everybody else."

The Communists, Eisenhower said, are able to paint for nations with other forms of government a glowing picture of how they can be aided through the Communist system.

"The man who listens doesn't understand that underneath this great facade of industrial organization there is slavery, misery and no opportunity for a man to realize his own aspirations," Eisenhower said.

Eugene Estimates Census Now At 44,406 Persons

EUGENE (AP)—A city population estimate of 44,406 persons has been forwarded to the state census board, which will set new estimates next month for all Oregon cities. City Manager Robert Finlayson reported.

The estimate, somewhat below the Eugene Chamber of Commerce count of 45,000 persons, was made by City Recorder Dan Potter and planning consultant Howard Buford. Their figure is an average obtained from three different estimates—based on counts of electric hook-ups, water meters and telephone connections within the city.

Eugene currently shares state apportioned revenues on the basis of a population of 38,074. This figure includes Eugene's 1930 official census of 35,672, plus a state count of residents in areas which had been annexed into the city up to January, 1955.

BEND (AP)—Frank Gilchrist, 53, president of the Gilchrist Timber Co., died unexpectedly in a hospital here early Wednesday.

Forestry Dept. Directing Crews

SALEM (AP)—The State Forestry Department is beginning a program to train men to direct fire fighting crews. State Forester Dwight L. Phipps announced Wednesday.

Phipps said the need for trained men to direct crews was demonstrated last fall, when 20,000 acres of forest lands were burned. He said the fire crews were handicapped to tell the fighters what to do.

The training course will last two weeks. The courses will be given in all state and forest fire association units.

"A team of experienced men will be organized in each district," Phipps said, "and these men will go through a period of instruction and intensive training that will fully equip them to carry out the work of the overhead personnel on large fires."

"All groups will then be available upon call for other districts that are faced with serious fire conditions. Consideration will be given to conditions in the home district and the distance to the unit having trouble."

Hot Geyser Develops During Drilling Of Well

LAKEVIEW (AP)—Lake County rancher Charles Crump, drilling for water on his ranch east of here recently, found a geyser. The hot water shoots up out of the hole every four hours.

Crump said that a cloud of steam mixed with near boiling water erupts out of the 100-foot hole regularly.

No other hot springs have been reported in the area of Crump's ranch, just north of the community of Adel, but the county has another at Hunter Hot Springs near here.

Heirs Claim 'Father' No Relation To Them

EUGENE (AP)—Three heirs to a Eugene woman's estate will go to court Wednesday to try to prove the man they thought was their father is actually no relation to them.

Plaintiffs in the case are Thelma G. Gordon, 29, of North Bend; Carl F. Wilske Jr., 31, Roseburg; and Gerald N. Wilske, 27, Eugene.

They allege that Edward J. Phillips, Eugene, was never married to their mother, Corrine Phillips, who died in April, 1954. They claim in their suit that Phillips, the estate's administrator, perpetrated a fraud to deprive them of an estate they believe is worth \$100,000.

The man who the three now believe to be their real father was brought to Oregon last January to give deposition testimony for the case. He is Carl F. Wilske, of Champaign, Ill., who was located by Portland attorney Donald Hershiser, representing the plaintiffs.
